And getting closer to home on the advertising idea, I do not think that there is a farmer in this or any other county who believing that he has a better horse or a better mule of a better hog or a higher type of any other farm proshowing it. Or any woman, who believes that she is a better cook. or more successful in jelly making or preserving or any other of the many acomplishments that are possessed by her that does not take pleasure in advertising her ability through an exhibit at a county or regional fair.

The educational part of a fair or anything else is not confined to the younger generation and the work of the county agent and the home demonstration agent is not confined to 4-H club boys or girls. In fact this work constitutes a very small part of the work that each of them is expected to accomplish or that each of them does accomplish and I think that Mr.
