

South Plains cotton ginnings for the 1941 season are still off to a low start, the total for the season tried to stop arguments and up to Nov.1, according to the U. S. bureau of the census, amounting to approximately one fourth that of a year ago. The previous comparison, as of mid-October, was one fifth.

PREDICTED FLU EPIDEMIC MAY BE HERE

Austin, Texas Nov. 17-Fuifilling a prediction made several months ago by the State Department of Health, an epidemic of influenza in Texas is represented by the 1392 cases reported for the week just ending, according to Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This total is 6 times greater than that shown for the same week in the preceeding 7 years.

KEEP THE FOOD IN THE CAN-A SAFE PLACE

AUSTIN, Nov. 12-"Keep it in the can," suggests Drr. O. B. Williams, University of Texas food bacterioligist who recently returned to the campus from six years of research for the National Canneries Association.

Out to shatter a superstition grown hoary through the years, Dr. Williams declared there is no reason for taking food from cans except to eat it. The can, when opened, is a perfectly safe place for storing the edibles, but it should be kept in a cool place.

Citing precedent for his stand, Dr. Williams points to a recent U. S. Department of Agriculture publication which declares cans are probably safer for food than kitchen utensils because cans are generally cleaner.



CAUSE OF ILLITERACY AMONG SLAVES

AUSTIN, Nov. 12 - Illiteracy among slaves in the Old South was principally due to fear of servile insurrections and lack of concern on the Negroes' part because literacy would not improve either their economic status or their value to their owners.

This is the belief brought out in a paper, "The education of American Plantation Slaves" by Dr. C. F. Arrowood, University of Texas education professor.

Although opportunities to learn to read and write were limited, some of the slaves were literate. Dr. Arrowood tells the story of a Negro man who taught himself to read by following the words in the Bible as his preacher read them. The same Negro learned to write by watching and imitating the man who owned him.

In the early 1800's some free states restrained Negro schools from operating. By 1834 Sunday schools for Negroes limited "their work to oral instruction." Their education was also limited by the extra-legal or illegal activities of mobs and patrols, Dr. Arrowood points out.

DAIRYING AND NATIONAL

Texas dairymen have been asked by Secretary Wickard and the USDA Defense Board to increase their 1942 production four percent over the 1941 production. The increase in Terry county according to R. N. McClain, County Agent, can be met by better management and feeding practices.

Cows must be properly fed to produce up to their capacity. Feed balanced grain ration at the rate of three pounds per gallon of milk. A concentrate or grain ration when fed with bundles as a roughage should contain at least 20 per cent protein. Make the best possible use of pastures. Plant sudan for summer grazing and barfor winter grazing. Supply needed minerals. Calcium and phosphorus are the two most important minerals. Calcium can be supplied by ground limestone and oyster shell flour; phosphorus by by bone meal. Where grain mixtures contain fair quantities of cottonseed meal and bran it is not necessary to feed bone meal. See that cows have plenty of fresh water and are protected from severe weather. Milk at regular hours and give each cow a six weeks dry period.

Improvement in management practices is wise under any situation; it is doubly wise this year when the long time outlook suggests caution in undertaking heavy development expenditures for stepping up production.
