
year are the highest since 1929, as shown in the chart. Prices are near parity despite a drop in exports due to the war. Farmers are being protected through the AAA program, with its marketing quotas and price-supporting loans. Without a price-supporting program in 1936-37, surpluses piled up and prices dropped sharply. When marketing quotas were adopted in 1938, prices began to rise again.

GIVE

This year the program, plus marketing quotas, the 85-percent-ofparity loan and increased domestic demand, caused prices to double.

In the referendum to be held Saturday, December 13, cotton producers will vote for or against quotas. The decision will also affect loans, because, according to law, there can be no loans when quotas are rejected.

Our next meeting will be our Christmas party in the home of Mrs. W. G. Swain on December 17.


