



Are You Hindering National Defense?

Austin, Dec. 22-Whether they realize it or not, thousands of Texans are hindering the War department's national defense efforts, State Police Director Homer Garrison declared today.

The Highway Traffic Advisory Committee to the War Department of which Garrison is Texas chairman, sent inventory cards to all owners of trucks and busses in Texas several months ago. The survey was designed to provide the War Department with complete information on the availability of vehicles which might be used to transport troops, materials and

evacuees in case of need. The owners of about 100,000 vehicles still have not filled out and returned these cards, Garrison said today. Texas, which has the highest ratio of men in the armed services, is lagging far behind the other states in the simple matter of a truck and bus survey. If our

Everyone must realize by no that the Japanese-American war is not an isolated conflict in the Pacific, without bearing on the wars that are going on elsewhere in the world. When the Japanese attacked Oahu without warnings, they were simply carrying out their part of a tremendous plan for world domination that in all likelihood was framed in Berlin. The amazing efficiency with which the Jap blitzkrieg was delivered suggest a German High Command influence. Japan's war leaders have never been famous for surprise and subtlety. The Germans, on the other hand, have proven themselves masters of strategy, and it is very probable that German staff officers had much to do with laying out the pattern of attack.

As the President has said, this war is primarily a war against Nazism and everything else is incidental to that. The reasons for Germany doing everything in her power to provoke an American-Japanese war, are clear. First, actual American involvment in a major shooting war will mean that, for the time being at least American lend-lease aid to the Allies will be reduced. It may also be necessary for both America and Britain to transfer naval strength from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Second, if Japan can succeed in her drive to isolate this country from the Far East, the Axis powers will have control of immense quantities of vital war materials, if which oil is the most important. For example, the Dutch, rulers of rich Batavia, are putting up a fine fight but they simply haven't the manpower, the ships or equipment to fight on alone. 


