We have, in my department in the Office of Civilian Defense a number of divisions reaching out through the regional bureaus down to the community level. I am convinced, however, that we need one over-all planning group, and two other groups to meet those needs by the use of every available agency, public and private. This over-all planning group will tie in all the other divisions and use them to the best advantage, besides working closely with the civilian protection organization. The whole picture will be able to meet new needs and unexpected demands as well as those situations which already exist.

I have always held that a good organization should function in whatever way you planned it to function. In this particular case, I think it important for the heads of the Office of Civilian Defense to keep in close touch with the regional offices and to see as much of different localities as possible.

The day when I shall be satisfied that my small part of the Civilian Defense Office will go on, whether I am on hand or not, has not yet come. I feel sure that it will soon be accomplished, particularly with the able leadership heading up the various divisions, and all the people who have been my close assistants working with Mrs. Henry Morgen-

of great crisis, we have tried to reconstitute the past to the future:

"The physicists have discovered the possibility of penetrating the black fog of London with infra-red rays. Reason is, after all, a kind of infra-red ray."

We should use our reason to understand the meaning of the past and to shape our action in the future. We have learned what not to do. Have we the courage and foresight to begin to build a new order when this crisis is over?

TWO WAY PASSAGE

Since mentioning Mr. Louis Adamic's "Two Way Passage" I have finished the book. I thought it showed keen insight into the various strains which make up the United States. Whether his plan for a twoway passage is possible, just as he describes it, or not, only time will show. One thing is sure, this two-way passage must serve to interpret what we have accomplished in this nation by way of good will and better understanding.

This puts upon us in this country a tremendous responsibility to live up to our theories of democracy and make them a reality in every part of our own country. We must live down our prejudices, whatever they may be, and be sure that we make every act of ours conform to our Bill of Rights, and to the highest ideals of a democratic nation.

RELAXATION

A few people came in to tea one afternoon. The President worked right through with the prime minister and others, so we were late for an eight o'clock dinner. The President made up his mind that they had all worked enough and needed relaxation, so we had a movie, which apparently was just the right thing for the occasion. It was called "The Maltese Falcon." and as far as I could discover was a mixture between an old-fashioned melodrama and a detective story.

I had to work and wasn't quite sure that I was up to anything so exciting as this movie promised to be. I joined the party at the end of the picture and found everybody completely restored to working capacity. They had really been engrossed in the picture and were then able to turn back and to go to work for another hour or so.

IMPORTANT PROBLEMS

I spent nearly two hours one morning with some of the officials of the Bureau of the Budget over the estimates for the coming three months for the Office of Civilian Defense. A number of people came to lunch, among them Dr. John Studebaker, education commissioner.

He has such an extended program for forums all over the country that I wanted to discuss with him the possibilities which lie ahead in education through forum groups in matters relating to civilian defense.

Help For Low **Income Farmers**

For the six-year period ending December 31, 1941 collections by the Farm Security Administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in this region, were 87 per cent of loan maturities.

FSA's boad program of helpful May. service to low-income farm families, was made public by W. R. Mr. and Mrs. Milton Bell and McDuffie a member of the Terry County Advisory Committee, who with other local citizens works with this agency without pay in behalf of needy farm people.

Getting closer home, the county committeeman cited figures showing the proportion of maturities repaid over the six year period in Texas was 94 per cent.

He mentioned the fact that al money now being loaned to the low income farm families by the FSA is borrowed by this agency from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. As farmers repay their loans, the money is returned to the United States Treasury, thus this money does not come to the FSA direct appropriations by the treasury.

"I mention this fact," he said "because I fear that few taxpayers know that the Farm Security Administration is not a reief agency. Rather, it is a lending program, with low interest rates, made for a period of from one chartered in November.

Among the many methods helping needy families, the FSA has a program whereby groups of farmers receive the use of expensive farm machinery and breeding stock which they could not afford alone. At the present time 8,571 farmers are receiving benefits from 1,112 coop facilities and services in this region which were financed with funds borrowed from the RSA.

The farm Security Administraton's chief function now, in the opinion of Mr. Allen, is to help farmers raise the vast amount of food needed to win the war.

"For FSA", he said this means concentrating on continuing aid to low-income farmers in every section of this country. These small farmers cannot benefit from high prices as can the big operators and it is a mistake to think they can contribute to winning the war unless they receive help in producing and marketing their products, while at the same time protecting the health of their fam-

He said, in conclusion, that in his opinion the Farm Security Administration is the only branch of the Federal Government which has the machinery already set up to help low income and needy farm families to help themselves, and to provide these people a chance to enjoy some of the democracy which they are being called upon to defend.

Area Cooperatives Handle 28,000 Bales

The Plains Coperative Gins, Inc., the cotton growers' association of the Plains area, with headquarters at Lubbock, has made advances of two milion dollars to the cotton producers of this district. The association has received 28,000 bales of cotton from 33 local cooperative gins in the territory.

The Houston Bank for Cooperatives, a unit of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston finances this and other cotton growers' associations in Texas. Funds obtained by the cooperative cotton producers' groups, states W. J McAnelly, president of the Houston Bank for Cooperatives, are used by the associations to pay farmers when the cotton is delivered to warehouses, and to place cotton in position for loans from the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Loans made by the Bank for Cooperatives to the cotton marketing associations give the producer the maximum obtainable under the CCC program and permit him to retain his warehouse certificate in the associations' local office, where his warehouse receipts are available for immediate withdrawal.

of defense work training courses. In those lines of work closely allied with emergency medical care, those considered most important and which have therefore been given precedence in organization, are first aid training, nurses aides training, canteen service. motor corps, home nursing, disaster relief, and home service to assist with the problems of families of the men in uniform.
