Rife Among Mexicans

Dr. Arthur C. Delagoa is a staf physician at the Texas Tuberculosis Sanitarium, and we take from the name that he is of Mexican ancestry. In a late edition of The Chaser, official publication of that great Texas institution, the doctor had an article in which he lamented the much greater Mexican mortality from turberculosis than among the white race, and even much more than among the negro race.

He took for example the southern part of the state, where a large Mexican population is centered, San Antonio, for instance, with a white death rate from tuberculosis of 31 per thousand, Negroes, 96, and Mexicans, 209 in

He then broke down his figures for this area with only 2.3 percent Mexican, with the extreme south tip of Texas with 41.7 Mexican population.
