Incendiary Bombs Diifferent The incindiary bomb is vas ly different from the high explo ive bomb. While the explosi bombs vary in weight from se eral hundred to a few thousan pounds, they are designed to de molish whatever they strike. The more commonly used incendiar bombs weigh approximately tw pounds each and a large plan can carry hundreds of them, ar n a few seconds they can scattered over a wide area. The aerial incendiary bom most frequently used consists a magnesium tube filled with mixture of powdered aluminu and iron oxide known as "therm it." When this bomb strikes, th thermit is ignited and burn fiercely at high degrees of ten perature, melting and setting fin to the magnesium casing. When dropped from 5,000 ft. more this small bomb will pene trate any ordinary roof of woo tile, slate or metal and an un derlying plaster ceiling, but prol ably not a wooden floor below Burning incendiaries cannot extinguished, except by speci methods not ordinarily availabl in the home, but they can be con trolled by prompt action and th use of simple tools, with a min mum amount of damage resulting from the fires started. Although the incendiary bon should be put under control soon as possible, do not approa within 50 feet for approximate 2 minutes after it strikes. Son few bombs have a small explo ive charge timed to go off abo 2 minutes after impact. Furthe more, the violent phase of burning action last for about seconds after igniting.
