





Trade In Americas Must Flow Both Ways Commentator Warns

Commerce between North and South America must not be regarded as a mere war measure, but the United States must prepare for a lifetime partnership, Edward Tomlinson, expert on Latin-American affairs and dean of radio commentators in that field, writes in the current Rotarian magazine.

Economic conflicts are widely publicized. Such items as Argentine beef and corn imports to the United States draw widespread comment. But actually, Tomlinson points out, the two American continents really fit together better than any other group of nations in the world.

A striking example of this is tin. Although Boliv'a contains 60 percent of the world's supply of tin ore, Tomlinson emphasizes that "until now there has not been a single important tin smelter or refinery anywhere in the Americas. The British- and Dutch-controlled mines of Malaya and the Netherlands Indies . . . furnished the entire world with some 85 percent of its finished product." Now smelters and refineries are being built in the United States, and the flow of tin ore will be paralleled by the return flow of finished articles.


