

Mr. and Mrs. Hancock and their son moved here recently from living at 221 N. Second street here.


Mr. Hancock said there are still five teaching positions open for the next school year, including positions of band director, physical education teacher, and public school.

Says Rubber Shortage Excuse For **Gas** Rationing

AUSTIN-It is hard for Texans to understand why there should be reason for gasoline rationing in the State "when we are literally swimming in oil," Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson declared Wednesday night in a radio broadcast from Austin announcing his candidacy for reelection for his second full term to the office of Railroad Commissioner of Texas.

"I've been up in Washington! protesting long and loud against gasoline rationing in Texas, Thompson said in a broadcast announcing his candidacy for reelection to the post he now holds. "Such a proposal was disastrous to the economic life of Texas because more than one million people in the State of Texas derive their livlihood and make their living from the production of oil and gasoline and the sale and transportation of oil and gasoline. I don't want to see them go broke." However, Thompson pointed out, it was announced by Washington

authorities that gasoline rationing in the oil-producing states had been proposed only as a rubbersaving measure. The current order to stave off gasoline rationing- was then suggested.

For that reason, then, Thompson said, the people of Texas should do their best in the rubber collection drive. "This big drive up every bit of rubber you have

CANADIAN shoe factory is now turning out a product with a much more violent kick in it-guns. A Vickers machine guns and two-pounder anti-aircraft pom-poms are being assembled here in the same plant where the gun mountings are manufactured. Browning, Vickers and Sten machine guns are coming off Canadian production lines in increasing volume as part of the mammoth war production program totalling more than \$3,447,000,000 since July, 1939. The Canadian government has provided about \$660,000,-000 worth of capital assistance for the construction of new plants, extension of old and the installation of machines and equipment. Production of guns, mountings and barrels includes 22 different types ranging from field guns to safety fuse pistols. Output of Bren guns, for instance, is nearing 4,500 monthly. More than 100 types of ammunition, mines, bombs and pyrotechnics, 12 types of chemicals and eight types of explosives are included in the program, and other weapons will be in production soon. Canada's armament industry is in high gear.
