Scrap steel, cast iron, red and yellow brass, rubber, aluminum, zinc, copper, white metal and

Don't wait until the closing day metal and rubber about the place to begin bringing in your junk. Dropping on south two miles, is salvaged and brought to town Remember it cannot all be shipped out at once, but as soon as a car can be made up it will be Your local salvage committee is shipped to designated steel mills.

proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction \$1.00 of a State office building or buildings; providing for repayment to the Permanent School Fund; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State: and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.







Plane to Carry 80 Tons of War Material Planned

NEW YORK -- Planes are steadily growing larger under the compulsion of war. Already they transport parachutists, now called skyinfantry. One of the big aviation companies has developed and begun manufacture of a large plastic airplane for transporting freight as well as troops. Another aviation concern has plans for a huge 300 ton plane capable of carrying 80 tons of war material at speeds 25 to 30 times the rate of convoys ploughing the seven seas to distant theatres of war. Such a plane could make at least 25 round trips to one of an ocean freighter. Two of them would equal carrying capacity of an 8000 ton freighter and would cost not much more to build in less time with the marked advantage of quickly transporting troops or war supplies where vitally needed, free of submarine menace and danger of bombing while unloading at port of debarkation.

Commercial aviation has grown by leaps and bounds since the last war; particularly in past ten years. What can be expected of it after this war? On April 19th of this year Percy E. Bates, chairman of the Cunard Steamship Co., in a statement published in London, pointed out post-war possibilities of serious competition between airlines and transoceanic steamships for passengers. One of the foremost aeronautical engineers engaged in manufacture of wartime planes, Mr. Grover Loening, recently stated that airplanes must replace ocean-going vessels completely, not only for passenger traffic but also for heavy freight. He predicted

> Conservation penalty rates. Vance explained, are 10 times the payment rate and if the three acre overplanting is ten percent or more of the allotment, the penalty will wipe out the payment.

As an example, if the allotment is 30 acres and the farmer plants 33 acres, the penalty on the three acres will wipe out the payment on the 30 acres.

This provision, Vance explained further, in no way affects marketing quota regulations and the farmer will receive a red card if he overplants his allotment and will be subject to a marketing quota penalty if he sells cotton in excess of his farm market-

However, he concluded, farmers whose overplantings do not exceed three acres or three per cent, whichever is the larger, will be eligible for government loans.

Learn Rules Of Civilian Defense

R. E. Smith, Director of the Eightth Civilian Defense Region, today requested that all citizens of this defense region familiarize themselves with the official instructions from the U.S. Office of Civilian Defense as to how to fight fire bombs.

"These new instructions are based on exhaustive research by technicians of OCD and the Chemical Warfare Service, U. S. Army," said Smith. "They represent changes now adopted also by British officals after careful analysis of the results of both this and the old method during actual air raids. Both American and British tests prove that a jet! of water, will knock out the fire bomb in less than one minutebefore major fires can get started. Fire (not the bomb) is the chief danger, and a jet of water is the best weapon. Respect the fire bomb but do not fear it."

Mr. Smith called the following instructions to the attention of all citizens, explaining that the instructions that have been revised during July as a result of the research made by OCD technicians: Bring Your Fire-Fighting Equipment To The Scene Quickly:

The small magnesium bomb, which is dropped in great numbers, will go through any ordinary roof. Store your equipment where it can be reached easily, and keep it ready for instant

Shoot A Jet Of Water On The Bomb At Once:

Take cover behind a door, chair, or other furniture, if you' can, when you do this. The jet knocks the bomb out quickly. There will be a burst of white flame, most of which will be driven away from you by the force of the jet.

Quench Promptly The Remains Of The Bomb And Any Other Fires:

If any small fires are started the jet will put these out easily. Within a short time you will be free to attack any other bombs which may have fallen nearby. Be absolutely sure all the fire is out before you leave.

Jet May Prevent Action Of Burst-

Some bombs have a small buster attachment. When the jet is used promptly, the bomb may be destroyed before the charge goes

The Pump Tank Holds Enough Water To Put Out Two Bombs When Jet Is Used:

The Office of Civilian Defense will distribute a 4-gallon pump tank extinguisher to the air raid warden service in target areas. The tank can be refilled while the pump is being used.

Know Your Extinguisher:

All fire extinguishers that contain water solutions of chemicals can be used on the bomb. These include the soda-acid, foam, and gas cartridge types.

Other types of extinguishers should not be used on the bomb because they do not contain water, but they can be used on fires started by bombs. Remember that your garden hose is one of the best fire-fighting devices so long as there is water pressure.

Use and Only If A Bomb Falls Where It Cannot Start A Fire Or If Water Is Not Available:

This can be done by dropping bag of sand over the bomb, or by the shovel-and-bucket method.
