In fact, it would break most country weeklies to send the paper free and make cuts of all in the service from their counties. Many country weeklies dont net more than \$2000 per year after expenses are paid, for their owners to live on.

We are glad, however, that practically all our people take a different view of the matter. Indeed, we have some 50 or 75 of the home boys on our mailing list now, being paid for by their parents, or in some cases by the boys themseves. These people are glad to pay for the paper going to their boys, and wish to put no burden on the Herald.





### Texas Could Become **Great Dairy State**

AUSTIN-Natural resources o Texas favor a substantial expansion of the dairy industry of the state, and could make the industry a major factor in increasing farm income, declared Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director of the University of Texac Bureau of Busness Research, in a bulletin, just off the press.

Natural factors favoring a large dairy industry are the capacity of Texas land to produce an abundance of forage crops at low prices, ample supples of water, and mild weather making winter grazing possible, Dr. Buechel reported. Unfortunatetly, development of this potential source of farm income has been hampered by traditional one-crop system of Texas, he wrote.

'The fact that Texas consumes more dairy products than are produced within the state is also significant," Dr. Buechel asserted.
