



> In this movement the Extension Service and the community and neighborhood Victory leaders will cooperate with the OCD and State and county nutrition committees, director Williamson said.

Briefly, the Share-the-Meat program is a campaign for voluntarily dividing the pork, beef, lamb and mutton which is available for civilians after the needs of the armed services and lend lease commitments have been met. The "sharing allowance" of two and one-half pounds per adult per week includes only the muscle meats, not fish, poultry, and the "variety meats" such as hearts, kidneys, livers, sweetbreads, and the like.

Since October 1, Director Williamson explains, deliveries of "muscle meats' 'for civilian consumption have been reduced considerably. That means homemakers who cannot shop early and "diners-out" who get to the restaurants late in the meal, may not be able to get their share of meat. Although families who are heavy meat eaters are asked to limit their consumption, no one expects a person now eating less than two and one-half pounds to cut his consumption.
