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

Migratory Farm Labor To Get Gasoline

Migratory farm workers who use trucks in traveling from job to job and who are away from home are required to contact the District, Office of the Office o Defense Transportation on the proper procedure to procure their Certificates of War Necessity.

There are many such workers in this district who are planning to leave their jobs and return home in the fear that they would be unable to operate their trucks after November 20.

Everything possible will be done to expedite the handling of these applications so that trucks used by migratory workers will not be forced from the road. It will not be necessary for these workers to leave their job and return home in order to obtain a certificate. This would only be a waste of time and rubber and would probably delay rather than expidite the ssuance of certificates.

Any migratory worker who has not received his application should contact either the County Agent in Building, Lubbock, for detailed in- home. formation.



WASHINGTON, D. C .- Women At War Week, opening Nov. 22, during which women will seek to sell the greatest single week's volume of War Bonds and Stamps will serve to put the spotlight on the mighty contribution women generally are making toward financing the war. Six million women are on War Savings payroll plans. Their monthly deductions total \$70,000,000.

The customers of 300,000 newspaper boys who have sold more than \$50,000,000 in War Bonds and Stamps are mostly women.

Volunteer saleswomen run nearly all the Bond booths in theatres from Maine to California. They also are sparking the War Bond sales in retail stores.

Ralph G. Payroll savings plans are now in operation in 148,000 businesses and factories. Admiral Morrell, chief of the Navy's Bureau of Yards and Docks, in an address to the American Federation of Labor convention at Toronto, put the American workmen—and labor leaders -squarely on the spot.

Among other things, he told the workers that "you cannot have your cake and eat it too. You exist by virtue of the fact that this is a democratic country and, therefore, you have to preserve and protect democratic institutions. War To Speed The Scientific Development

AUSTIN-War speeds up scientific developments from five to fifty years ahead of normal peacetime progress, but science won't win the war, Howard Blakeslee, science editor for the Associated as journalism students.

"Social, moral, economic, political and scientific gains are bound to come from this war, as from any war," Blakeslee declared, "but science, regardless of its progress, won't win war alone. It takes human beings who are willing to fight and die to win any war."

Military censorship plus the inherent reticence of scientists is preventing the publication of scientific discoveries at present, he explained, but predicted that when the war is over writers will have a gold-mine of scientific news to write about.

"I put Texas at the top of the list," he said, "for you have an empire here with astounding nat ural resources-natural gas which yields innumerable drugs, cosmetics, explosives, etc., petroleum and agriculture."



Diphtheria Shows Seasonal Insrease

Austin, Texas- With the ineidence of diphtheria showing a seasonal increase in the state of Texas, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state Health Officer, is again warning parents to make sure that their children are protected against this killing disease by diphtheria im-

According to the State Health Department, records show that less than 50 per cent of the children in Texas are inoculated against diphtheria.

"Inasmuch as toxoid inoculation can and will prevent diphtheria, it seems incredible that so many of our children are allowed to remain open to attack," Dr. Cox said. "Diphtheria is a killer and a vicious one. There are few diseases which cause the victim more agony than does diphtheria, and it is certainly the solemn responsibility of parents to make sure that their children do not fall victim to this disease."

Dr. Cox advised that children be taken to their family physician for inoculation and stated further in the event parents are unable to pay for this service, county neakn units will administer the toxoid without charge.

All children should be immunized against diphtheria before each their first birthday, but i not, they definitely should have the inoculation before entering school, Dr. Cox said. There is always danger of diphtheria among school children and until every hild in Texas is inoculated before school age there will be no way preventing the incidence and spread of diphtheria among our Texas school children.



Why should that group of Congressmen be interested in me-an average citizen with only one vote. Having bolstered my courage with a sense of public duty, however, I faced that august body, determined to speak my mind and take the consequences.

My turn came toward the close of long weary day of hearings, and I was almost frightened to observe every member of the Committee following me closely, and apparently analyzing my every sentence. Having finished, I stood almost breathless, awaiting their reaction, and expecting criticism of my suggestions.

Then came the most astonishing moment in my life. Not a single question was asked or a single statement made for the purpose of confusing or embarrassing me. On the contrary, I was thanked for coming and the testimony was complimented. Sympathetic, intelligent, comprehensive questions were asked, demonstrating both their genuine deep concern in the general welfare of the Nation and their familiarity with economics and National budgets. They were thoroughly aware of the need for greater National economy, and interested in proper steps

That one experience completely revolutionized my opinion of Con-

Three months later, I appeared before the Senate Finance Committee. Again I was treated with unsurpassed courtesy. My growing esteem for Congress was further en-

Still more recently I appeared before a third group-a Senatorial subcommittee. This time one member of the group spent about an hour, apparently trying only to heckle, embarrass, confuse, or discredit me. His conduct was quite different from that of his colleagues, and I later found that he had not been elected at all. He was a recent appointee, who evidently had not yet become familiar with the dignity and honor which customarily characterizes the distinguished body of which he had suddenly become a member. He was the type I had heard so much about, the rare exception-not the rule.

During this most critical period in our history, national unity is of extreme importance. For the purpose of winning the war and protecting our National interests, it is imperative that Congress receive the respect and enjoy the confidence of the public to which it is justly entitled, and of which it is proving itself worthy.

In later articles I want to explain why I believe that Congress is the most important of our three branches of Government; why I believe a Congressional Committee is the best jury in the world; and why I believe a respected Congress is positively essential to the future of democracy in America. These statements will be proven by first hand factual information.


Red Cross News

The Terry-Yoakum chapter of the American Red Cross made a shipment of finished garments to headquarters on Manday. The shipment consisted of: 187 mens shirts, 143 ladies slips, 167 ladies and childrens blouses, 64 Army, Navy and refugee sweaters, 22 Army mufflers, 4 pr. Army gloves, 3 helmets, 2 pr. wristlets, 4 p: Navy socks, 2 Afghans, 5 quilts, 23 heavy bath robes, making a total of 656 garments.

The chapter chairmen wish to thank you that so willingly made this shipment possible by your whole-hearted cooperation. As the winter comes on your effort will be needed more and more in making refugee garments. Let more of us sacrifice a few hours each week to help in this work—it's not only our war-us that are workingit's yours and yours. Our boys are fighting for you as well as the rest of us. You may not be able to buy bonds, but you can help in this service. The materials are free for you to work up; come and get it and take it home with you. Our next shipment should top this one. Don't you want to knit a helmet, sox or muffler or sweater to keep! some boy warm at the front; you can do this in complete comfort in your home. Who knows; some one you love may get it to wearmay keep him warm in the front line trenches this winter.

Let us go all-out for the war effor in our Red Cross work. Let us not let our boys or our allies down. Let's hold their arms up with ammunition in buying bonds and keep their bodies warm with our knitted garments.
