## Senator Max Sherman Addresses Clubs 'Cotton Production One-Third Off' City Receives New Fire Truck

north of the Sandhills is 98 percent complete on harvesting and 90 percent complete on ginning. He says harvesting is 80-90 percent complete in the southern part of the state and 70-75 complete with ginning.

"Another pretty week and cotton harvesting in Bailey County should be 100 percent complete as well as the ginning," he said. Tanksley says the yields are not near what it was thought they would be before harvesting began. The county agent said cotton looked better in the field, but it took a higher percent of cotton to produce a bale of cotton than was thought it would. The percent turnout is poor, he stated, and the quality is only average.

The yield is down one third from what was anticipated before harvest according to Tanksley. He stated that most cotton in the county is running between one fourth to one half a bale to an acre and some are lower than this.

Tanksley estimates Bailey County will have about 34,000 bales of cotton and says they were hoping to get about 50,000. He pointed out that indications show a stronger Cont. on Page 2, Col. 3

### New Fire Truck Arrives Fire Chief Receives Keys

After placing their application for a new Rural Fire Truck, the City of Muleshoe finally received it on Tuesday, December 16, during special dedication ceremonies held at the Catholic Center. Making the presentation of the keys of the fire truck to Fire Chief H.E. Reeder, was Texas Senator Max Sherman.

The keys were handed over during a dinner held at noon with members of the local government and service clubs present. Four representatives of the Texas Forest Service were on hand to present the fire truck to the city. They were Jim Hull, assistant director of the Texas Forest Service, Robert Fawin, Pat Ebarb and Russell Burd. Hull spoke briefly to the group, pointing out that the Rural Fire Defense program was established to provide basic fire fighting equipment and training for communities which have no fire protection and who also have limited funds. "Under the Texas Disaster Plan of 1973, the Texas Forest Service has primary responsibility for planning and coordinating natural-cover fire protection," said Hull.

Hull stated that "since September, 1973 about 100 units have been outfitted by the Texas Forest Service for use by local volunteer fire departments throughout Texas. The program is funded and authorized under federal and state legislation. Funding to date has been on a 50-50 cost share basis between

the state and the local communities. Recent increased federal funding will make it possible to extend the program to more communities."

Hull pointed out that there are four types of vehicles, including the one-ton pickup, such as Cont. on Page 2, Col. 2.

### Jaycee Shopping Spree



### Open-Burning Construction Rules Noted

AUSTIN -- December 11, 1975 -- Charles Barden, Executive Director of the Texas Air Control Board (TACB), announced today that his Agency has begun a program to better inform the agricultural community of Texas concerning air pollution control rules and regulations.

Barden said, when making the announcement, "This vigorous new effort will concentrate on two specific subject areas that directly affect all farmers and ranchers in the State. First, we want to impart full information concerning the prohibition of all open-burning without proper notice and control; secondly, insure that the agricultural community is aware of construction permit requirements under the Texas Clean Air Act."

Special letters have been sent to agricultural organizations and commodity groups inviting their representatives to attend a seminar, December 15, 1975, at the TACB Austin headquarters. The meeting agenda calls for discussion of both TACB Regulation I (Control of Air Pollution from Smoke Visible Emissions, and Particulate Matter). "Under the Texas Clean Air Act," Barden said, "any person who plans to construct any new facility or engage in the modification of any existing facility which may emit air contaminants into the air of this State is required to obtain a construction permit from the Texas Air Control Board before any actual work is begun on the facility, and to obtain an operating permit from the Air Board in order to continue to operate the facility after a sixty-day start-up period." ### Cotton Prices Advance

Grower prices were \$7.50 to \$15.00 per bale higher during the week ending December 12, according to Paul R. Dickson, in Charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office. Farmers sold mixed new crop lots of mostly grades 41, 32 and 42, staples 29 through 31, mikes 3.3 through 4.9 for 46.30 to 47.50 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41, 51, 32, 42 and 52; staples 28 through 30, mikes 3.2 and lower brought 37.75 to

39.40 cents. The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was active and growers offered new crop cotton in moderate volume.

Demand was very good, Dickson said. Prices paid growers for cottonseed ranged from 75 - 110 dollars per ton, mostly 75 to 85 dollars.

Grades 42 and 52 were the predominate grades classed this

week. Grade 42 accounted for 45 percent and grade 52, 27 percent. Bark reductions were assigned to 35 percent of the samples classed.

Staples 29, 30 and 31 were the predominate lengths. Staple 29 amounted to 26 percent; staple 30, 40 percent; and staple 31, 18 percent.

Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to five percent of the total. Mike group 3.3 through 3.4 accounted for six percent;

and 2.6 and below, 25 percent. Pressley tests indicated breaking strengths at Lubbock averaged 85,000 pounds per square inch.

About 105,000 samples were classed by the Lubbock Classing Office during the week ending December 12. This seasons total stand at 518,000 samples compared to 366,000 on the same date a year ago. Harvest slowed Friday because of fog and high humidity.

were told what to do.  
Quoting from Learned Hand the Senator said, "This essentially what Learned Hand meant when he said: Liberty lies in the hearts of men and women. When it dies there, no constitution, no law, no court can save it. No constitution, no law can even do much to help it. . . . The spirit of liberty is the spirit which is not too sure that it is right. The spirit of liberty is the spirit which seeks to understand the minds of other men and women. The spirit of liberty remembers that not even a sparrow falls to earth unheeded. The spirit of liberty is the spirit of Him, who, near 2000 years ago, taught mankind that lesson it has never learned, but has never quite forgotten; that there may be a kingdom where the least shall be heard and considered side by side with the greatest."

The senator stressed the fact that young people should not become disillusioned with their government, pointing out that they are the ones who will straighten it out.  
Sherman stated it is the responsibility of elected officials holding office to be representative of the people. "It is the people's office," he said. "I feel that while in the Texas Senate, I should be the voice of Bailey County. If you have these two working together, that is what makes the system work in a democracy." Sherman quoted Harry Truman who said "the sovereign is the people and an elected official is the servant."  
"While in office," Truman said, "I am the servant of the people and when I step out of office, I am actually receiving a promotion, I am going back to the people," emphasizing that the people are the backbone of the government.

Sherman said the government does reflect the society and that "our people's values that are true for individuals and family, some of which come from religion, need to be carried over into the government."

He illustrated this with a quotation made by a football star, Gayle Sayers who said, "I place myself third. God is first, the others are second and Gayle Sayers is third." Sherman says he feels this is the proper philosophy for all of us.

Sherman concluded his speech with a poem which he said he found in the Saturday Evening Post when he was about 14 years old. He could not give the name of the author, because it was unsigned. The poem read: "God give me eyes that I might see the work that can be done by me. God give me ears that I might hear the cries of those who need me near. God give me lips that I might speak comfort and peace to all who seek. God give me hands that I might do some large or simple task for you. God give me prayer that I might pray thy help and guidance every day. These things all else above, God give me a heart that I might love."

Mayor Alex Williams was master of ceremonies for the event Tuesday and introduced Bailey County Judge Glen Williams who gave the invocation. Ken Henry, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. Bob Stovall, president of the Rotary Club gave the welcoming address.

Guests attending the dinner were Judge Williams and members of the Bailey County Commissioners Court, City Manager Dave Marr and members of the City Council; Fire Chief H.E. Reeder and members of the Muleshoe volunteer Fire Department; Ken Henry president of the Chamber of Commerce; Bob Stovall, president of Rotary and Rotarians; Jim Burgess, president of Lions and members; Charlie Bratcher, Kiwanis president and Kiwanians, Butch Duncan, Jaycee president and Jaycees, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Bass who is Bailey County Democratic Chairman, representatives from the Texas Forestry Service, Jim Hull, Assistant director, Robert Fewin, Pat Ebarb and Russell Burd.

This year Eastern and supporting institutions presented more than \$89,000 in scholarships to qualifying students in New Mexico and other states. Scholarships are classified as ENMU Presidential, Conoco Presidential, fall continuing, freshman academic, 4.0 grade point average, and talent day.

Muleshoe received, to two and a half-ton excess property federal government vehicles have been used in the program. "The main thing Bailey County needs as soon as the cotton is harvested is any kind of moisture we can get," Tanksley said. He pointed out that dryland wheat does not have enough growth for grazing and that most farmers are busy preparing their land for next year's crops.  
"If moisture is not received during the next few months, we are looking at a drought going into Spring and farmers will have to go into heavy irrigation," Tanksley concluded.

WASHINGTON--Purchasers of new 1976-model cars can look for better gasoline mileage than the auto industry has offered in years, the Environmental Protection Agency reported.

A VOLT GUN?

The threat of an embargo of Texas cattle resulted from the Texas Animal Health Commission's refusal to adopt USDA's new restrictive measures in the brucellosis program. The TSCRA, long an opponent of the "over-kill" aspects of the federal regulations, actively supported the commission's stand taken at the September 4 TAHC

meeting in Austin. Hilmar Moore gave testimony of strong opposition to the adoption of USDA's ever tightening regulations at the hearing which preceded the TAHC's decision. One of the most damaging elements of the proposed embargo is the financial effect imposed on purebred operations, states the TSCRA. Major stock shows in Texas, which annually draw thousands of head of cattle to be exhibited and sold, would be vastly curtailed under an embargo. Purebred sales of all kinds would be threatened, since out-of-state

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# Grain Trade Team To Demonstrate In Russia

LUBBOCK -- "We do not know your grain sorghum, but we should!" was the response of Boris Runov, the Soviet Union's deputy agricultural minister, as he and members of a five-man U.S. grain sorghum trade team made tentative plans for demonstration feeding projects in Russia.  
The meeting with top Russian agricultural leaders climaxed a three-week seminar tour of Europe and Russia by the team, representing the U.S. Feed Grains Council, Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers board.  
Runov told team leader Elbert Harp, GSPA-TGSPB executive director, that his people "would

like to cooperate with you in demonstration work with poultry and pork to illustrate the value of grain sorghum."  
The grain sorghum promotion team is the first official market development team to be permitted to the Soviet Union. The invitation from Runov followed a visit last year by him and his top aides to the Lubbock area where they studied sorghum production and utilization.  
Team members included Harp; Jack King, GSPA-TGSPB research director; Dr. Lloyd Rooney, cereal chemist from Texas A&M University; John Baumgardner, animal science professor from Texas Tech University and Dr. Halvor Kilshus, U.S. Feed Grains Council European

director.  
While in Moscow, the team conducted a five-hour seminar designed to acquaint the top Russian agricultural leaders with the nutritional feeding value of sorghum. The talks, highlighted by slide presentations, covered the origin of sorghum, hybrid development, chemical characteristics of the kernel, feeding value of sorghum compared to corn and price comparisons.  
Harp pointed out that because grain sorghum is not included in the recent US-USSR grain pact, there are no sales restrictions. "Russia can buy all the sorghum it needs without prior approval of our government," Harp said. "But now they are

reluctant to buy sorghum because they know so little about it."  
"The Russian grain crop is reported to be at disastrous levels this year, which creates an unusually strong need for them to import more grain," Harp said. "This should be a good opportunity for grain sorghum sales in the future."  
The team's visit to Russia, arranged by U.S. agricultural attache Roger Neetz, is a part of GSPA-TGSPB's continuing market development program, carried out overseas through the U.S. Feed Grains Council. In addition to the Moscow seminar, programs were presented in nine European countries including Poland and Yugoslavia.

# TSCRA Files Suit Against USDA

FORT WORTH -- An injunction to prevent the USDA from imposing its threat of embargo of Texas breeding cattle was brought into federal district court in Austin by the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association today. The suit, naming as defendants Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz, APHIS Administrator F.J. Mulhern, and Deputy Administrator J.M. Hejl, and Paul Becton, in charge of Brucellosis for APHIS, seeks to obtain an injunction restraining the order to cut off federal brucellosis funds as well as to implement the embargo, according to TSCRA President Hilmar G. Moore.

The suit charges that the USDA has failed to meet requirements in not filing an environmental impact statement on the proposed embargo with the Environmental Protection Agency. Such a statement, required by law, entails a lengthy review and a hearing with an eventual ruling by the courts.  
TSCRA is suing for "declaratory relief and preliminary and permanent injunctive relief from the provisions and requirements of the Brucellosis Eradication Program of the United States Department of Agriculture."

The suit claims that the proposed action of embargoing Texas cattle and withholding funds for brucellosis control will significantly affect the quality of human environment within the meaning of the National Environmental Policy Act. The resulting increase of cattle numbers from such an embargo and the increase of the disease caused by withdrawal of funds and personnel would have an impact on the quality of the state's air, grasslands, soil and water resources, the suit claims.  
In requesting an environmental impact statement, the TSCRA is in general repeating its request of the past two years that a high-level, impartial feasibility study of brucellosis and its combating efforts be initiated by Congress.



### Mrs. Ed Cox Shares A Holiday Recipe

Mrs. Ed Cox, president of the Epsilon Chi Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority names Christmas cookies as her favorite Christmas recipe. Following is her recipe for Tiny Holiday Wreaths, given to her by Mrs. Spencer Beavers.

#### TINY HOLIDAY WREATHS

30 large marshmallows  
1 stick of margarine  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 teaspoons green food coloring  
3 1/2 cups of corn flakes and red dots on top.

Melt marshmallows and margarine in a pan. Then add vanilla and food coloring. When blended well, add corn flakes until they are covered completely with the marshmallow mixture. Then drop cookies on buttered cookie sheet and decorate with red dots in the center. Let them air dry for about 24 hours. This recipe makes from three to four dozen cookies.

## How Healthy Is Your Personality?

**COLLEGE STATION** -- Much more is known about how to recognize and to maintain physical health than is known about mental or emotional health, Roberta Dix, a family life education specialist, says.

"Physical health is body contained. Mental health is reflected in the individual's feelings, responses and reactions toward others," she noted.

Miss Dix is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In order to assess a healthy personality seven qualities can be used. Ask them of yourself in this manner:

--What is the movement of the personality? Is it toward or away from others? Is there more like than dislike for others? Is there warmth or coldness?

"Each of us has an opportunity to create a climate of warmth when we are near others. In such an atmosphere each individual becomes his best self."

--Is there a balance between the give-and-take in relation to others?

"The healthy personality is able to accept or take as well as give. Most of us get a great deal of satisfaction out of giving but find it hard to accept as easily as we give. Talking and listening, our daily practice of give and take, are very effective ways of checking to see levels of individual give and take," she noted.

--Is there some skill developed?

Skill or competence in handling materials is essential to building self-confidence and gaining the confidence of others. Confidence is reflected in the responsibilities we take on voluntarily or accept when assigned.

--Is there pleasure in creative privacy?

Good manners are good form, even on the high-ways.

"You are interesting if you are interested. The individual who enjoys his own resources, his own self, has real texture in the quality of his living. If you like yourself, you will be liked. Do you plan time for creative privacy?"

--Is there capacity to suffer disappointment?

Our maturity shows in the ways we react to unwanted, disappointing experiences: resentment--a childish reaction; realization that disappointments happen to everyone; learning to translate personal loss into an understanding of how other people feel.

--Is there a sense of possibility?

"The top-level personality is hopeful, optimistic. If there is hope, there is a feeling that things can be done."

--Is there a sense of something greater than oneself?

Recognition of the existence of something greater than oneself helps to avoid self-centeredness, uneasiness, unhappiness, and an unhealthy personality," the specialist said.

COLLEGE STATION -- More than 13 million dogs and cats were destroyed last year at animal shelters in the United States because nobody wanted them.

And you can add another five million to that figure to take into account those strays that are never caught and meet their death by starvation, disease or under the wheels of a vehicle.

What's the solution to this tragedy?

"Pet owners are chiefly to blame," contends Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "They let their pets stray so they often become lost. But the worst part is that pet owners take no precaution against accidental breeding of their animals."

To avoid accidental breeding, owners should either keep their animals confined or should have them neutered, advises the Texas A&M University System veterinarian. Special attention should be given to spaying female pets.

"Spaying is a surgical operation performed by a veterinarian that takes away the female's ability to reproduce," points out, Armstrong. "Unfortunately, the average pet owner is often unwilling to spend the time and money necessary to have this operation performed."

An alternative to the spaying operation may exist in a birth control pill that is now being developed.

"Of course, some pet owners don't want to spay their animals because they want to show their children the miracle of life," notes the veterinarian. "But there is another side of life that is tragic--life snuffed out in a tangled mess under the wheels of a car. Or straying animals wandering along roadside frantically looking for something to eat. Or the 13 million dead animals hauled out of animal shelters each year.







**AUSTIN** — Texas political parties are gearing up for the 1976 presidential elections—and the state's first (and perhaps only) presidential preference primary.

Republicans launched their primary plans several weeks ago, and organizations are forming to support candidacies of President Gerald Ford and former California Gov. Ronald Reagan.

Democrats met in Fort Worth last week to finalize delegate selection rules changes. They also approved a proposal to streamline their state conventions (making them double-header, two-day sessions, instead of one-day, 24-hour marathons).

U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and Alabama Gov. George Wallace are moving out front among Democratic presidential candidates in the Texas primary May 1 with preliminary petition-gathering and organization.

Liberal Democrats met in San Antonio Saturday to map their strategy to try to minimize the delegate strength of Bentsen and Wallace.

Former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough said he may become a candidate in the preference primary, although he will reach no firm decision before the end of the year.

Former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter is also making plans to enter the primary, as is former Oklahoma Sen. Fred Harris. Other candidates are undecided.

**Metric Conversion**  
Texas industry may be converting already to the metric system of measurement, according to testimony before a House sub-committee.

State agency spokesmen discussed with the panel a possible overhaul of the state tax structure if the change from the English system of measurement (feet, yards, pounds and pints) is adopted.

The U.S. is the only major industrialized nation

not using the metric system. Congress has been considering several bills which would convert to that system.

Some industry representatives said they feel the conversion ultimately is inevitable.

**Race Opens**  
Chief Justice Charles Barrow, 54, of the San Antonio Fourth Court of Civil Appeals last week mounted a campaign for an upcoming State Supreme Court vacancy.

Barrow so far is unopposed, but he said he will "run like a scared coyote," expecting another candidate will emerge before filing deadline. The veteran of 13 years on the intermediate appellate court bench paid his filing fee as a Democratic candidate.

**Lawmaker Pay 25th**  
Texas legislators are now squarely in the middle among those of 50 states when it comes to the payroll.

They rank 25th at \$600 a month, with \$30 per day living expense allowances during sessions.

California legislators are paid the most—\$21,120 a year plus a \$30 per day expense allowance, a leased auto and gasoline credit card and \$4,556 a month to pay for staff operations during annual sessions. New Hampshire pays \$100 a year—with no expense account.

**Courts Speak**  
Texas Supreme Court refused to force trial of a suit by 12 alien children seeking to throw out a state law which requires them to pay tuition to attend Houston public schools.

The high court also rejected Alamo Heights and Edgewood (San Antonio) school districts' efforts to require their taxable property values to be equalized with those of other districts.

In both the Houston and San Antonio cases, the court refused to accept petitions for writs of mandamus.

In another case, the Sup-

reme Court upheld Texas Woman's University rules requiring undergraduates under 23 to live in dormitories.

Reaching for a pistol in a belt is not assault with intent to murder, the Court of Criminal Appeals held in overturning a conviction and 25-year sentence of a Lufkin man.

A State Bar grievance committee has moved to suspend the law license of 229th District Judge O.P. Carrillo pending his appeal of an income tax fraud conviction.

**AG Opinions**  
The Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System may enter student loan cancellation contracts where graduates become employed by certain state agencies, Atty. Gen. John Hill concluded.

In another recent opinion, Hill said public community and junior colleges are required to set aside from tuition charges for vocational-technical courses only the six per cent designated in the Texas Education Code.

**Appointments**  
Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton has been selected to head the 15-state Southern States Speakers' Conference. Clayton also is chairman of the Southern Legislative Conference.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointed Dr. D. Jack Kilian of Lake Jackson to the Texas Air Control Board.

Atty. Gen. John Hill was named chairman of the National Association of Attorneys General's Committee on Environmental Control.

Rudy Davila of Austin is the newly-appointed director of the Division of Community Relations for the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

**Short Snorts**

State colleges and universities asked approval of 210 lower division (freshman-sophomore) courses at 49 off-campus locations and 1,510 upper-level or graduate courses at 177 locations. All but one of the state public senior institutions are requesting approval to conduct off-campus courses.

U.S. Rep. Alan Steelman of Dallas will formally announce for the U.S. Senate here January 5.

Gov. and Mrs. Briscoe accepted a national award for Texas' beautification efforts from Keep America Beautiful Inc.

New drivers licenses will contain a statement allowing the holder to designate any part of his body as an anatomical gift at the time of death.

The state General Land Office will study impacts on coastal areas of federal offshore oil and gas production on the Outer Continental Shelf.

**Hiring The Handicapped, Is It Good Business?**

Offering employment opportunities to the handicapped benefits the whole nation, reports the Texas Easter Seal Society. It provides the handicapped useful lives and lift them from despair and also removes them from welfare rolls.

Surveys show that handicapped persons are actually more willing to work and more productive on the job than the able-bodied. Handicapped workers are steady and reliable; they don't job-hop so employers save money on replacement costs. In many instances, handicapped persons actually improve morale in a plant; how do you measure the benefit of that?

Nearly all employable handicapped people need only the simplest kind of job modification -- special parking near entrances; ramps where they may not exist, although most modern plants are at ground level; raising or lowering workbenches; safeguards on machines to protect the blind (as well as other employees). Most of these adaptations could be handled by the plant carpenter in a few hours.

Hiring the handicapped does not affect the employer's health or accident insurance costs. A

survey of group health insurance companies showed that the insurance carriers do not tell employers whom they may hire. One major carrier says: "The fact that a handicapped person is employable is sufficient evidence to justify group underwriting." Workmen's compensation rates are based solely on the relative hazards of company's operations and on the company's accident experience.

The President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped reports that the average handicapped person who has received rehabilitation services returns seven times the cost of his rehabilitation in taxes he pays on his earnings.

Most major companies have positive policies about hiring the handicapped. These policies evolved not out of charity but out of the performance of handicapped people on the job. Businesses have, indeed, found it is good business to hire the handicapped.

"Agricultural exports provided jobs for more than a million people last year," points out a marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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

## Use Feed Additives Effectively, Safely

**LUBBOCK** -- While antibiotics used in swine feeding rations are being closely scrutinized for their safety and efficiency by the Food and Drug Administration, they are playing an increasingly important role in swine production.

Dr. Gilbert R. Hollis, area specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock, says that it is doubtful that swine producers could continue to produce pigs in today's densely populated, multiple-farrowing, and confinement rearing units without effective antibiotics and chemotherapeutics.

Research data available to date, Hollis says, demonstrate that when antibiotics are fed at the approved levels for the approved stages of hog production, there are no identifiable problems of health safety associated with the feed additive usage.

But, he warns, producers should see to it that antibiotics are used strictly according to Food and Drug Administration regulations in order to avoid incurring problems which would lead to their removal from the market.

"Loss of some of these antibiotics would certainly increase costs of production either by a reduction in pig performance or from the cost of developing

effective substitutes," Hollis says. "Under our present systems of production, feed additives are a valuable part of our total feeding and management program."

From an application point of view, he adds, the most effective feed additives are the ones that give the most consistent response. Like insurance, they provide the broadest protection over a wide range of growth-reducing circumstances and are the most useful as growth promotants.

Hollis says antibiotics are most effective in swine rations during the breeding period, just prior to and immediately after farrowing, and in baby pig creep and starter diets.

"It is very important that all drugs be used as they have been tested and approved. We should not jeopardize their future by using incorrect levels, by using combinations that have not been approved or by not following withdrawal requirements," he says.

Manufacturers of drugs, pre-mixes and complete feeds containing drugs are required by law to include special instructions for their usage on container labels.
