Because American planes crossed the International Date Line in attacking Wake, they got back from the raid a day before they made it. They were over Wake on Dec. back at their home base, Dec. 23rd, (Hawaiian Time.)

An undisclosed number of fourmotored bombers made up the striking force, which dumped 76,-000 pounds of high explosive and incendiary bombs on Wake. The raid was led by Col. Wm. A. Matheny.

#### Encouraging The Planting Of Victory Gardens

LUBBOCK, March-Encourag-Lejeune, New River, N. C., today ing the planting of victory gardens and farms, the Office of Price Adminstration has made provisions for purchase of rationed beans and peas for planting through use of a certificate from the County War Price and Rationing Board, district OPA officials said.

> Certificates for quantities needed for planting are to be presented to grocers and seed merchants. They will be good for the specified number of points at the rationed rate of eight points per pound, thus saving points coupons in ration book two for food pur-

The provision for use of certificates was made in a new regulation replacing temporary arrangement under which purchases could obtain beans or peas for planting by stating to the grocer or seed merchant they were being purchased for that purpose. The mer chant will use the seed certificate to replenish his stocks, just as he uses points coupons from ration

Point values of beans and peas are: up to 2 ounces, 1 point; over 2 and up to 4 ounces, 2 points; over 4 and up to 6 ounces, points; over 6 and up to 8 ounces 4 points; over 8 and up to 10 ounces, 5 points; over 10 and up to 14 ounces, 7 points, and over 14 and up to 16 ounces, 8 points.

#### Some Diseases On Increase

Austin, Texas, - Reporting on health conditions over the State of Texas, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said today that epidemic dysentery, meningitis and typhus fever have shown a sharp increase for the first two months of 1943. Reported cases of epidemic dysentery and diarrhea total eleven times the number shown for the corresponding period in a sevenyear average. Outbreaks of dysentery in several communities scattered over the State point to local failure to solve certain sanitation problems which could endanger the downward trend of typhoid ported as being three times the seven-year median and the State Health Officer emphasized the fact that rigid rodent control measures will require the wholehearted cooperation of every individual in the State, since this
