Laboratorians at Muleshoe Area Medical **Center Saluted During Lab Week**

National Medical Laboratory Professionals Week (NMLPW), April 20-26, is a time to honor the more than 280,000 medical laboratory professionals across the nation who perform and interpret laboratory tests that save lives and keep people healthy, pathologists and laboratory technologists and technicians at M.A.M.C. are among the many unsung heroes of medical healthcare.

Using state-of-the-art technology and instrumentation, laboratory professionals help to prevent disease by detecting unknown health problems and by aiding in the diagnosis and treatment of existing conditions by giving accurate, timely test results.

To celebrate National Medical Laboratory Professionals Week, laboratories acr-oss the country will host open houses, tours, lectures, and demonstrations to help acquaint the public and other health professionals with the workings of the medical laboratory. M.A.M.C. plans to celebrate Lab Week by holding an open house Tuesday, a blood drive Wednesday, a raffle for \$200 from United to benefit the Hospital Floor Fund and a luncheon for the medical staff.

"We are proud of the work we do," said Tonya Lookingbill, lab manager. "We have been painstakingly meticulous in performing our jobs to provide dependable answers to your family physicians.'

Doctors rely heavily on lab tests to make diagnoses, thus laboratory professionals ale critical components of the health care system. Results of laboratory tests often identify the presence of disease in its earliest stages, when the possibilities of a cure are greatest and when treatment is least costly.

Yet, despite the important roles laboratory professionals play, and increasing demands for laboratory services, the profession is undergoing stress. In its most recent survey of laboratory wages and vacancies, ASCP reported that nearly 44% of laboratories report they are currently experiencing difficulties recruiting or hiring medical laboratory personnel, There are several reasons for the lab worker shortage, including rising retirement numbers among laboratory technicians, fewer schools of laboratory technology and the corollary decrease in the number of graduates.

With that in mind, laboratory organizations, including professional societies such as the American Society for Clinical Pathology (ASCP) and even laboratory equipment manufacturers are mounting active campaigns to recruit students to the profession.



wrong. I distinctly remember going to Fingers Fine Furniture when, married but not yet 20, we were living in Houston. We bought a square 70's style (the ghastly stuff that's all the rage now and called "modern") breakfast table with "square" chairs whose bottoms were covered with banana yellow plastic. I didn't say it was beautiful. But it was brand new, and it was a table. I rest my case.

Long story short, we just bought another one. It had become clear we were going to. I had already asked all the pertinent rhetorical questions.

"Pretty, yes, but what, pray tell, does it really do? It has no cool-sounding engine with straight pipes. The only time it'll make zero to sixty is in the truck on the way to the house. It won't crunch numbers or process words or tell you "Good Morning" if you program it right. I ask again, what does it really do?"

She glared at me over the first table we looked at. She liked it. Our girls liked it. Our boys liked it. The guys were praying we'd buy it so we could quit talking about it. After trips to a thousand more furniture stores, we went back to the first one and bought it. (The table, not the store.)

I get shaky in furniture stores. I think it's post-traumatic stress syndrome. We've not spent much time in such stores over the years, but I still remember the financial wrecks (by my reckoning) that occur there. I feel like I'm going back to the scene of a terrible accident. The furniture store needn't be named Fingers for you to feel its fingers filching deep in your pocket. So I should be thankful for

the fifty dollar garage sale china cabinet that has saved us from paying much bigger bucks for the mega-shekel model made to go with our table.

I thought we had a perfectly fine china cabinet. It was given to us also in the 70's by church friends in Abilene who took pity on a starving student ministerial couple. Seems like a slap in their face to so lightly toss it aside after only thirty years.

The new one is oak. Glass shelves. Glass in the doors. And the cats in the garage where it was stored were obviously quite taken with it.


The makeover of the fifty dollar one has not been cheap. Sand paper, sander to replace the one that gave up and died on this project, drawer rails, hardware, paint, stain, etc. That does not include the beveled glass we'll craft to replace what's in the doors.

I admit it. I think it's gonna be a nice, though not inexpensive, makeover.

It makes me think. When God saves us, he doesn't just lightly "refinish" his children. Through Christ he remakes us completely into a "new creation." For us, the gift is free. But for our Creator? No gift was ever more expensive.






