#### Health Dept. To Start Tuberculosis Test

The health department will soon start a campaign to test all school children over the age of 11 for tuberculosis and any adults wishing to receive the test by the Vollmer Patch method.

## **Texas Bankers** Report On "Food For Freedom" Program

A publication prepared by the sent to all Texas bankers in 1942 suggesting ways in which they might continue and expand their methods of aiding to increase agricultural production and according to A. ## **Local Guard Participates** In Maneuvers

Last Saturday afternoon at 3:00 Agricultural Commission of the o'clock, Company D, local unit of American Bankers Associaton was the 34th Battalion ,Texas State Guard left the American Legion Hall in a 10-car convoy for maneuvers some fifteen miles west of Odessa. Arriving at Odessa, the unit joined other companies of the battalion which moved out of there as a body for the bivouac area. The 34th joined the 1st battalion at

The first problem the following morning was to secure a nearby dam and prevent its being blown up by a theoretical band of enemy paratroopers, represented by Company E, Big Spring. This problem having terminated more or less in favor of the enemy, the two battalions were formed and told that the enemy had overcome a theoretical reserve left to secure the bivouac area and had captured both the former and latter. The second and final problem was to recapture the area and release the reserve. This was accomplished under simulated bombing and strafing by CAP planes. At the conclusion of this problem the battalions, including the enemy company was formed and listened to a critique delivered by Corps. This concluded the maneuver and the various companies broke camp soon thereafter.

Taking everything into consideration, the local unit was outstanding in every respect. Of the five cars not ruled out by the bombing and strafing, four of them belonged to Company D. Special mention should also be made at this time of the excellent meals provided in the camp by Mess Sergeant Earl Denton and Privates Stubblefield, Blevins, Sears and McIlroy.

## We Must Maintain A Victory Scrap Bank"

Once gain the Texas Salvage committee, with Lewis C. Huff of Dallas heading it, has notified all Texas newspapers that again they are called upon to take the in a statewide as well as a nationwide drive to keep the scrap metal stock "bank" with plenty deposited metal to keep all the steel mills rolling. This drive has been designated as the "Victory Scrap

Drive." It will be remembered last spring that the scrap metal of the nation got dangerously low at the mills. Not a few mills had to shut down on account of the lack of scrap, which has to be mixed some 25 percent with raw steel to make the best grade of steel to be used for war work. At that time the associated newspaper campaign was launched, backed by all civic clubs, schools, and other patriotic organizations, and a great stock pile was built up in a few weeks.

We had a couple of piles in Brownfield that looked like would never be moved, but they are, and have almost dwindled to nothing appeared to some folks as an eyesore, but they must not now be so regarded, They are so many tons of tanks, guns, ships, and planes in the making at this time, it is announced that steel mills have around a two-months supply. We must not let any of them shut down this year.

The natonal, as well as the state committees realize that scrap is getting scarcer and scarcer, but there is still a lot in the aggregate. if all of us will see to it that every ounce of rusting steel and iron and other junk metals are put together. There is no reason at this time to junk useful machinery, or household appliances, but if it comes to that, we'd better sacrifice than to be slaves to the Nazis and Japs.







#### CHILD BEARING DEATHS STILL TOO HIGH

Austin, Texas, Oct. 14.—"Despite the development of scientific procedures that definitely reduce the hazards of child-bearing, maternal deaths in this country continue to remain much too high," Dr. Cox said today in a statement on maternal and child birth in Texas. "For example, during 1942 there were 494 deaths from this cause reported to the state department of health as having occurred in Texas alone. A review of these deaths shows that many of them were preventable. This is a tragedy which must be corrected."

It is an encouraging fact, however, Dr. Cox said, that during the last 10 years the ratio of maternal deaths to the number of live births in Texas has dropped from 7.6 to 3.8. This shows a marked progress in the prevention of maternal deaths consistently maintained in recent years. In actual figures, during 1942 there were 132,175 live births in the state with 494 maternal deaths while in 1933 a total of 103,806 live births resulted in 835 maternal deaths.

"A factor in keeping our maternal death rate at its present level is the failure to prospective mothers to realize their greater safety in placing themselves under continuous supervision of a good physician throughout pregnancy," Dr. Cox said. "The value of this type of care cannot be over estimated. Until this attitude on the par of expectant mothers is changed, maernal deaths will not reach the minimum which today is possible. In short, the individual has a definite responsibility to secure for herself that high professional care which is today available."



umn offered a pointed protest to a ber 11. federal law calling for the renegotiation of war contracts. What I wrote at that time aroused a deal of criticism. My article was frankly a forecast, saying what was likely to result from trying to enforce the Renegotiation Law. I am no prophet. gery patient. I only wish I had been able to foresee the worst. Discussing the needlessly rapid growth of government bureaus, 1 wrote: "The law governing the renegotiation of war contracts will (by itself) create four boards, many branch offices and possibly 200,000 jobs for auditors, investigators, etc." In this same connection I mentioned men had been needed to fill the No- ber 7th. vember draft quota; i.e., every man of draft age who took a soft government job exposed one more husband and father to military service.

#### Figures Disputed

After the article was published, an administration man whom I admire, a man of unquestioned competence and patriotism, assured me with emphasis that only a small fraction of the 200,000 jobs I had suggested would actually be created by the Renegotiation law. I do not know how many men finally were assigned to this job of fighting windmills but the pace set during the first ten months indicates that between 300 and 400 years will be required for its completion. This is true if the report of the Senate committee headed by Harry S. Truman of Missouri can

be trusted, and I think it can. Hearing that an unnecessary government bureau (composed of fewer men than was first feared) is hope lessly swamped with details, would be too small a matter to worry anybody, except for the fact that the very existence of the law hinders the war effort. It keeps contractors in a quandary that slows down production of military necessities; postpones victory.

#### The Actual Figures

The Renegotiation Law authorizes and directs the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of the Treasury and the Chairman of the Maritime Commission, whenever in his opinion excessive profits have been realized, or are likely to be realized, from any war contract, to recover such excess profits and revise the contract price.

Ignoring what, to one who is not a lawyer, looks like an unconstitutional assignment of judicial authority to executive officers, the lav made some 85,000 separate contractors subject to its provisions. > COTTON CROP IN TEXAS INDICATES A DECLINE

Austin, Oct. 9. - The United States Department of Agriculture today forecast a 1943 Texas cotton crop of 2,850,000 bales of 500 lbs. gross weight compared with 3,038,-000 bales produced in 1942.

The 10-year (1932-41) average production is 3,419,000 bales.

The indicated yield per acre of 173 pounds, compares with 192 pounds realized in 1942, 165 pounds in 1941, and 160 pounds the average 10-year period.
