Receives Silver Star Award

By direction of the President, the Silver Star, was awarded on October 9, 1943, by General Millard F. Harmon, commanding the United States army forces in the South Pacific area, to Private First Class Blan Liles, for gallantry in action in the Solomon Islands, on July 27, 1943. When the machine-gun fire from an enemy emplacement held up an entire infantry battaion's progress, Pfc. Liles volunteered, with another soldier, for the mission to destroy it. Both men crawled to a position within 20 yards of the machine-gun at which point Pfc. Liles commenced firing, thereby drawing the attention of the enemy to himself. By this action he permitted his companion to close in on the hostile position and destroy it completely with hand

Doctor And Wife Murdered At Littlefield

One of the most brutal murders in the history of the plains, was committed early Tuesday morning, when Dr. Roy Hunt, prominent physician, and his wife were found bludgeoned to death in the bed room of their home in Littlefield. Their six year old daughter, leading her three year old sister in their nght clothes, ran to a neighoring house about 7:30 a.m., and reported that "a

bad man killed their father and mother." Neighbors immediately investigated, finding the bodies tied, gagged and horribly mangled. The little girl said she had gone into her parents room on being awakened by a noise, and the "bad man" pushed her into closet and throwed water on her. She did not exit till she ran to

the neighbors, saying "the man was masked." Evidence showed killing between 2 A. M. and 7 A.

Neely Advises Rigid **Culling Of Flocks**

One of the surest ways poultry producers can make use of available feed supplies is to cull all non-layers and low producers able labor, according to A. L. from their flocks, says Thomas Hartzog, county agent. Due to the Neely, agricultural teacher. "With feed supplies short, rigid culling of the flock is more important than ever before." he said. "By removing the low producing and unprofitable birds the owner will have relatively more feed for the higher producing hens and in this way can get more eggs from his feed supply.

"To get rid of poor layers, first remove all birds that are sick or otherwise unsound. A cripple or weak hen will not pay, and eventually will come down with disease. It is important, therefore, to remove birds that are sick or lame, decidedly undersized or un-

derweight, or that have deformities or weaknesses of their backs, legs, breast or wings.

"Good culling also calls for removing all mature hens that are yellow-legged and fat. Vigorous birds with red combs and wattles. bleached beak and legs, and a thin. pliable abdomen, are usu-



"Ability to cull s easily acquired, but is best learned thru actual handling of birds under experienced guidance. Poultry owners who cannot cull satisfactorily should call upon some neighbor or other experienced person to help them get the needed skill.

Austin, Texas, October 27-In a statement issued this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, it was discosed that in the near future an intensified state-wide educational campaign will be instituted for the control of venereal disease.



Sufficent quantities will be manufactured for each man, woman and child to have 22 pounds of toilet and household soap, according to information received by the Texas A and M college extension service. That is the equivalent of 16 large packages of soap chips or flakes, or 35 bars of laundry soap, or about 94 cakes of toliet soap.
