## Coxswain Roberts Has Seen Much Action

From evidence in letters and official documents of both British and American governments, Coxswain Alvis Leo Roberts, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Roberts, who lived here several years, has seen

much action on board one of Uncle Sam's ships. For the past two years Mr. Roberts has owned the gin at Westpoint, just over the line in Lynn county, but still get their mail here.

Young Roberts mentioned two major engagements, as well as some 16 minor ones. From what we could gather, the major ones were the transportation of arms and supplies to a northern Russian seaport, and the other was the invasion of Sicily. A British communique of several closely mimeographed pages gave a glowing account of the convoy to northern Russia, which was a fight with Nazi subs, bombers and torpedo bombers from the time they reached the Norwegian fiords until they landed in a north Russian harbor.

He did not give any details about the landing of troops in Sicily, and the part the navy and air force played in covering their landing, but most of our readers have had that fully explained in newspaper and magazine articles. There certainly was great co-operation by the three branches of our military service. He relates that it is hard to see how it happens that the loss in life in such engagements are not heavier.

He also sent a copy of Radio News Review, which seemed to have been published on board the USAT Evangeline. Alvis Leo is now on armed guard duty with a Brooklyn address.

He writes a very touching personal letter to his parents in which he begs them not to feel uneasy about him. He hopes to be home for keeps by next November.

## Letter From Sgt. Payne

Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Hamm, of Wellman, have received a very interesting V-letter from their friend, Sgt. Vernon C. Payne. The Hamm's seem to be doing their duty of writing boys in the service, and the boys enjoy letters from anyone here at home. The letter was dated Oct 25th, and you can judge for yourself where he is located:

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Hamm:

I received your letter several days ago and have been intending to answer it the first chance I got and so this is it. I can just imagine how glad you were to see you and am sure you felt the same way he did. It should have been a very interesting trip for that is one part of the States I have always wanted to see. It seems to take a war to put people to traveling.

Speaking of traveling reminds me that I am now on another continent since I last wrote you. I am now in Mussolini's (the spelling looks bad but you know who I mean) vegetable garden. It is a far cry from the country I thought it would be when I studied geography years ago. The majority of the people are very poor. They seem to farm very small farms and cultivate them by large hoes or use oxen for draft animals.

Ask the boys if they think they could do their farming with a large hoe? Grain, corn and fruit seem to be their principle crops. There are numerous hot pepper gardens. There houses are old and the country as a whole is war torn.

The people seem friendly and will stand by the road and throw fruit in your vehicle as you pass by. I cannot say whether this is their true feeling or just because we are the ones around. This is no bother of mine. I have enjoyed their grapes and apples so far. In one place where I was we lived under some walnut trees. Each morning I would walk out under the trees and pick up a pocket full to eat. At times I thought it must be Christmas time. Then there were other times when I knew darn well that it wasn't. I have had some tough times trying to keep dry but that is no problem any more. I know one night I found that water was running through the tent and pools forming all over my tent. I would take my shoe or rifle and dig a few irrigation ditches. When I thought my drainage system was adequate I would go back to sleep.

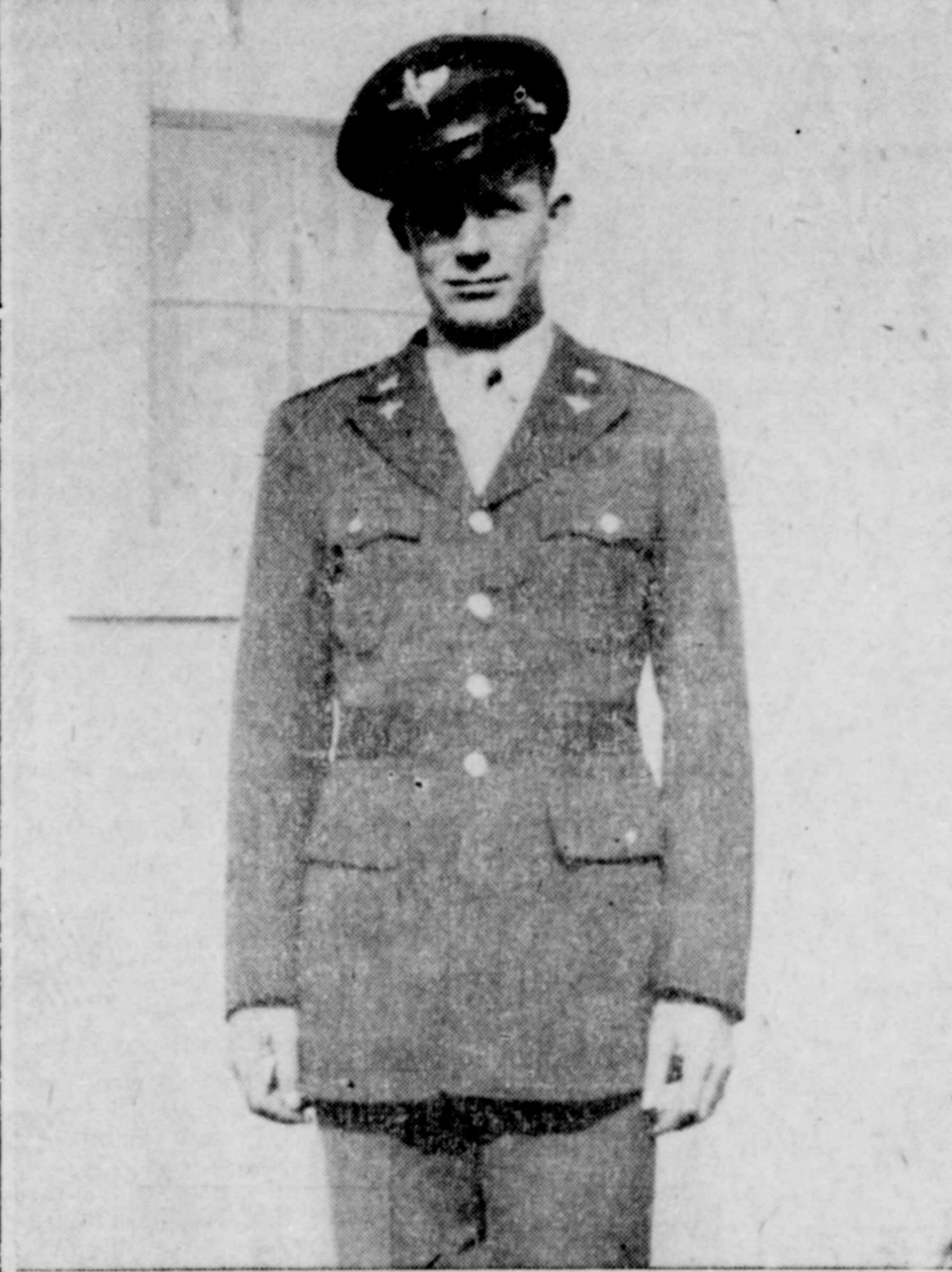
In North Africa this summer I lived in one of the best spots since being in the army. There were several of us living in a house with a waterfront. I never missed a day going in swimming and many days I would go in more than once. Our canteen supplies were good and I layed in a supply of cigars and the like. Things are fine with me and I am having many new experiences each day. I have a very good picture as to how Wellman looks at this time of the year. School has started and all the people are busy gathering their crop. I wouldn't be surprised before the year was out that you will have to hire some of the High School pupils to teach the grammar school.

I hope that all of you are well and are looking forward to a Happy Christmas. I must get busy before the Major begins to wonder if I am ever going to get back to work. Sincerely, Vernon Payne.

## Eighty-Three But An Health Unit Holds Meeting and Luncheon

The Five County Health Unit Board of Directors and Staff, held their quarterly meeting and luncheon at the Wines Hotel, Tuesday noon, with Dr. Paul G. Capps, chairman of the District, presiding.

Reports of various phases of their work were turned in, among which a very favorable report regarding the tuberculosis tests being made, there being some five thousand tests with only three or four per cent being positive reactions. In the very near future there will be an X-ray machine brought here to make pictures of those reacting to the tests. These pictures will be sent to the Health Department at Austin and the findings in chart form sent to the family physician of the patient. Dr. Capps stated to a reporter that he was well pleased with the progress of the work being done along the health and sanitation line. One case of diphtheria and one of scarlet fever have been reported in the county.

## Prosperity Seen For Terry County Farmers

A continuing period of prosperity for farmers in the Brownfield and South Plains territory for the next five to ten years is seen by Ray Coffman, manager of the farm loan department of the Great National Life Insurance Company of Dallas, who has been here surveying local conditions in connection with the broadening of his company's service to borrowers in the Brownfield trade area.

Mr. Coffman reports the agricultural outlook particularly bright for South Plains farmers who, he declares, are not only doing their full share in the war effort by growing in abundance the crops that feed the livestock of Texas but are making money at the same time.

He says that he has found that farmers are generally not only in the best financial position they have been in for some years but may expect to show good money returns for some years to come. He also declared that farm values seem now to be pretty well stabilized.

"Despite price ceiling now in effect or any brakes that may be applied in the future to control rising prices, good crops plus prevailing prices that are higher than in previous years will continue to keep South Plains feed growers in a period of prosperity," he said.

Mr. Coffman announced that the Great National Life Insurance Company, holding a firm belief in the future of the South Plains territory, is expanding its facilities for farm borrowers in this area. The company's farm loan department is prepared, he said, to offer prompt service in the Brownfield territory, with an appraiser on the ground, making it possible for loans to be closed in Brownfield. Life insurance protection for the borrower is available as a special feature of the company's loan plan.

While visiting in Brownfield, Mr. Coffman conferred with Robert L. Noble, the Great National Life Insurance Company's local loan correspondent, and W. R. Tilson, local land appraiser for the company. Both have offices in the Brownfield Building.

## Local Man Hurt In Explosion Here

Perry Bryant was critically injured, when an acetylene gas tank he was in the act of filling, in the battery shop where he was employed in West Main Wednesday morning, exploded. It appears the bottom of the large drum being filled was too weak for the pressure, caused its explosion. Bryant who was standing by it, was blown across the room. He received a broken jaw, loss of several teeth, and broken ribs, from the impact and fall. He was rushed to the local hospital. Two other men standing near were shoved several feet by concussion but not injured. Witnesses say Bryant had a very narrow escape from instant death. A brother, Claude Bryant, was injured by a similar accident some 3 years ago.

Miss Reast is offering a prize to the club that has the greatest number of representatives at the next council meeting the second Saturday in December at 2:30 P. M.

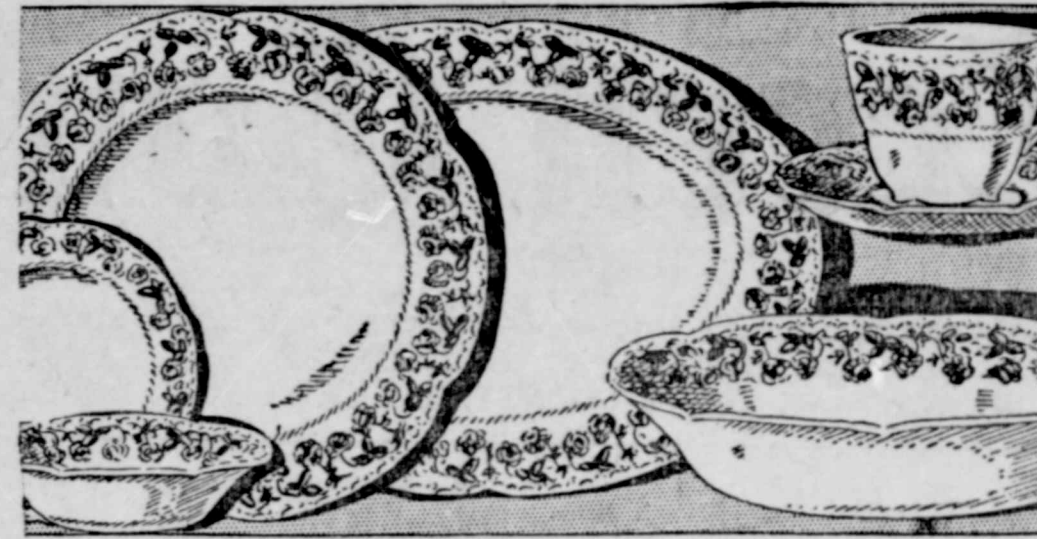
