## Hardin Joyce, Jr., In Officers Training

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 8.—Hardin Joyce, jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Hardin Joyce, of Route 2, Brownfield, has begun training as a cadet in the army air forces training command school at Yale university. His training here is aimed to prepare him for the duties of a technical officer in aircraft armament and upon completing the course he will be commissioned a second lieutenant.

According to Colonel Raymond J. Reeves, commanding officer of the post, the new aviation cadet will study chemical warfare, electrical armament controls, small arms, explosives and ammunition, bomb racks and synchronization of machine gun sights and gun cameras. In addition to classroom work, much of his schedule will include intensive training for physical fitness, toughening him for terrain and temperature found in fighting fronts around the world. Part of his time will be spent in the field under simulated battle conditions.

After being commissioned he will be placed in charge of a crew of enlisted men specialists at flying fields in the United States, or overseas where he will maintain the armament of both fighter and bomber planes taken aloft by flying crews.

## Delbert J. Herod In Navy Training

A new recruit at the U. S. naval training station, Great Lakes, Ill., is Delbert Joe Herod, 18, husband of Mrs. Raba Lorane Herod of Brownfield.

Now undergoing "boot" training he is being indoctrinated into navy life, and is being instructed in seamanship, military drill, and naval procedure. Soon, he will be given a series of aptitude tests to determine whether he will be selected to attend one of the navy's service schools, or will be assigned to active duty at sea.

Upon completion of his recruit training, he will be granted a nine-day leave.

## JIGGS TANKERSLEY TELLS US OF SOUTH PACIFIC ISLE

South Pacific  
Feb. 2, 1944

Dear Jack: How is Brownfield and the paper business. I have a little time, something unusual, so I thought of writing and telling how much I and the boys enjoy the paper. We don't get much to read, and when I get a paper it goes around to every boy in my company. We have boys from every state and they all know about Brownfield. I got a hold of two funny books. Where they came from, no one knows. I guess a gremlin dropped them from a plane.

We hear a program on the radio every Thursday night from Tokyo. It is really a joke to us, but I think the main idea is to tear down our moral, but instead we enjoy it. Madame Tojo says how many planes the Japs shot down, and asks how we would like a nice cocktail with a pretty girl in our lap. That makes us wish a little, for we haven't seen a white woman since we left Australia, and we don't get anything to drink. Then they play the latest hit songs; and last they remind us about our sweethearts and mothers at home. But I know, some day, Jack, we'll be back, so I don't let that bother me. We check up on Madam Tojo every now and then. We count the bombers that go over and when they go back, and then get her report and find out how many she overestimates. I don't think they can count.

I can't say just where we are, but we're (several words censored) here. As for living, it is very uncomfortable. The best time is at night. It gets pretty cold and you can sleep like a log if there isn't any alert—that's about the most popular thing here. The Japs came over the other morning and it sure made us mad, because we were eating chow, but they just annoyed us a little; didn't do any damage. I don't see how they carry on jungle fighting; you can hardly walk through them. The low palms have vine-like leaves that run to the ground and have claws, or horns, that catch onto your clothing and hold you; and there is a million different insects, besides the mosquitos. You know, some of those mosquitos are getting foxy—they're getting twin tails, like the P-38. The mosquitos rule this place from 5:30 in the evening until 7 o'clock in the morning. I think more of my mosquito bar than anything else issued me. I think when I get back, I'll open a bar and name it "The Mosquito Bar—The Best Bar In Town," and everyone who has been in this theatre will agree.

Mom wrote that Guy will get to see me soon. Boy, that will be something. I haven't seen anyone from home since I've been in the rmy. I guess it will be bad, changing from a cold climate to a hot one, and I mean hot. I think Dr. Daniell is in Briabane, Australia, but I was stationed there for about three weeks and I didn't get to see him. If I go on a furlough, I'm going to look him up.

Australia is a pretty good place, but they drive on the wrong side of the street. They have some pretty girls, which are sometimes hard to get acquainted with, but once you do, you're o.k., and can have plenty of fun. I wish I was back there for awhile. We were in Sydney, about the best city, Brisbane, and Townsville. About their chief food is steak and eggs, which I like very much. I saw a man box a kangaroo and it was really funny.

Well, Jack, I must tell you about these native women. They wear a grass skirt (I would send you one, but they won't let us) and that's all. They pass by our camp every day, going down the alley for bananas and coconuts. They sure carry heavy loads. The men carry nothing. Some of them have babies on their backs, and when they want to feed them, they just throw a breast over their shoulder. Some of their

reasts come to their waists. They have any cow beat I've ever seen. We work about 100 boys and the majority of them are small and skinny, due to when the Japs were here—they ate their gardens and pigs, and left them nothing. They eat mostly rice cooked real fry. They can understand English pretty good, only when one doesn't want to work, they no savvy.

Well, Jack, I hope this hasn't been too boring. I'll write less next time. Tell all I'm o.k., and would like to hear from them. I know the Cubs didn't do so good, but they were fighting.

## CANNING SUGAR

Sugar stamp No. 40 in War Ration Book IV, good for five pounds of sugar for home canning became valid February 1, and will remain good through February 28, 1945 according to an announcement made by the Office of Price Administration.

OPA Officials state that the allowance will be a part of the total allowance for 1944 canning season. At present, it is contemplated that the maximum allowance will be twenty-five pounds with Stamp no. 40 good for five pounds and the remaining twenty pounds will be obtainable by application at the local War Price and Rationing Board.

## McCracken Family Poisoned; Two Dead And Two Very Ill

Mrs. Annabel McCracken, 38, was found dead Saturday morning in the home of her mother-in-law, Mrs. Ella McCracken, about 60, on East Tate Street, with whom the family had spent the night. Her husband, Forest McCracken, owner of a dairy a mile southeast of town, and his mother and daughter, Maude Alice, 10, were found unconscious by neighbors, who rushed them to the local hospital, where they have been in critical condition. The girl succumbed about midnight Sunday; Mrs. Ella McCracken remained unconscious for several days. Highway patrolmen rushed samples of the food of which they had partaken for supper Friday night, to the State Chemist at Austin, who, according to officers here, reported it contained arsenic. From information obtained by officers and Dr. Treadaway, attending physician, it was thought the poison was used through mistake, inseasoning the food at the fatal evening meal. McCracken not being fond of that part of the food, ate but little of it.

Another daughter, Stella Louise, 16, was at TCW, Denton, Texas. She arrived early Sunday morning. The two girls were daughters of McCracken's first wife, the former Stella Louise Treadaway, who died in 1933.

Mr. McCracken came here about seven years ago and has been operating a dairy southeast of town. Mrs. McCracken is survived by her mother, Mrs. J. L. Evans, El Paso; Five sisters, Mrs. H. E. Whittington, Canutillo, Texas; Mrs. J. S. Hightower, Henrietta, Texas; Mrs. W. R. Platter, Albuquerque, N. M.; Mrs. M. R. Simmonds, Niagra Falls, N. Y.; and Mrs. O. T. Hubbell, Birmingham, Ala.; three brothers, Clinton Evans, Briscoe, Texas; Bob Evans, Texhoma, Okla.; and Pvt. Ralph Evans, El Paso, Texas.

Maud Alice (Mickey) McCracken was born in Lefors, Texas as May 6th, 1933.

A double funeral was held Monday, Feb. 21st, at 3:30 P. M., at the Methodist church, conducted by Bro. J. O. Quattlebaum, assisted by Brother Walker and Bro. Brian, for both Mrs. McCracken and Maud Alice.

Maud Alice's survivors, besides her father and sister and grandmother Mrs. Ella McCracken, are: Mrs. T. L. Treadaway, Sr., grandmother; four aunts, Mrs. W. M. Adams, Mrs. J. W. Fitzgerald, and Mrs. W. A. Bynum, all of Brownfield and Mrs. Mattie Lee Long of Dallas, Texas; two uncles, S. J. Treadaway, Abilene, Texas, and Dr. T. L. Treadaway, Brownfield.

## NATIONAL RED CROSS DRIVE TO START MAR. 6

At a meeting, held in the office of Judge C. L. Lincoln, Wednesday afternoon, attended by the members of the executive committee of the American Red Cross in Terry county, plans were formulated for the annual Red Cross national drive to begin here on March 6th.

The quota set for Terry county is \$9,200, of which 26 per cent will be retained by the local chapter.

In the election of a chairman for the drive, Lee Fulton and Virgil Burnett were elected to serve with Judge Lincoln. The county chairman is selecting men or women to head each of the 11 voting districts, or boxes, in the county. Each chairman will appoint helpers to contact each person in his precinct.

There were 3,162 poll taxes paid. There will be a few exemptions, and a few to become eligible to vote this year. In reaching the quota set, we will have to raise on an average of \$3 per voter.

All monies will be turned to Leo Holmes, president of the local chapter, who will do all book work for the drive.

At the American Legion meeting last night, a committee was selected to act as Prisoner of War committee of the Terry county chapter of the Red Cross. They will familiarize themselves with provisions of the Geneva conference concerning privileges of the prisoners and the Red Cross responsibility for supervision of prisoners in war camps throughout the world, the treatment accorded prisoners on capture, their mail, their work and pay, and give information to their nearest of kin as to what kind and how they may send parcels to relatives, and to bring to prisoners' families the most up-to-date information on prisoners of war.

Do you know all that the Red Cross does for America's loved ones in every phase and branch of the war? For one thing, it provides life-giving blood plasma on the very spot where a man lies wounded. Field directors help to settle family problems. Red Cross directs its efforts to rehabilitate the wounded; getting food and mail to the prisoners of war. Through its offices are recruited army and navy nurses. It operates clubmobiles for men at isolated posts, supplies emer-

## H. H. WILLIAMS CASE AFFIRMED IN HIGHER COURT

District Attorney Rollin McCord states that he received a telegram from the court of criminal appeals to the effect that the H. H. Williams case was affirmed. McCord had appeared before that court and argued the case on February 9, when it was submitted.

**Brown's Parole Investigated**  
Attorney McCord also made an investigation on the release of Charles Brown, now charged with the double slaying of Mrs. Cora Smith and her step-daughter, Mrs. Dunlap, which shocked our city on the 1st day of February. McCord states that Brown was released on the recommendation of the prison officials and the doctor who had examined Brown as to his sanity, he had served more than one-third of his time and according to prison rules an inmate is subject to parole after having served that much of his sentence.

The board of paroles and pardons stated they acted on such recommendation of the prison officials, and that they always had the complete files of the case and were open for inspection.

## Highway Patrolmen Have Wreck Sunday

Finis Carter and John Wood, Highway Patrolmen, were rushing to Austin Sunday with specimens for test, in connection with the McCracken case, by the Dept. of Safety Laboratory. East of Abilene, about 5 o'clock, mist collecting and freezing on the the windshield of an approaching car, caused it to crowd the State Highway car off the pavement and it rolled over about three times and was a total loss. Abilene patrolmen let them have another car and only about an hour was lost.

Glen McLaughlin and George Gambill, chemists from State Department of Safety Laboratory, Austin, are here investigating the poisoning of the McCracken family. Dr. Capps, county health unit, and his assistant, Walter Breedlove, are also making tests.

## Much Waste Paper Being Salvaged

Mr. Neill reports that he has now accumulated about 1500 lbs. of old newspapers and magazines at his residence here, but desires that much more to complete shipment. This paper is badly needed by the government in wrapping and packing medicines and war gadgets for shipment overseas, and is urging people to save it. It is urged that all who can, to bring it in tied, in any size bundles to his driveway between Main and Broadway on 4th St., where he has fixed a storage.

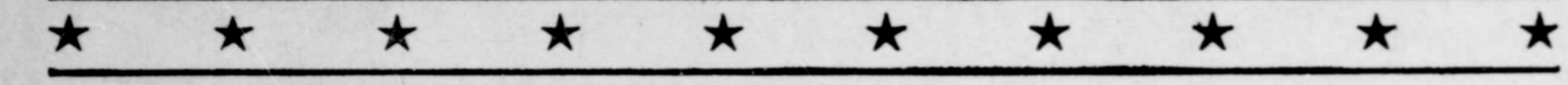

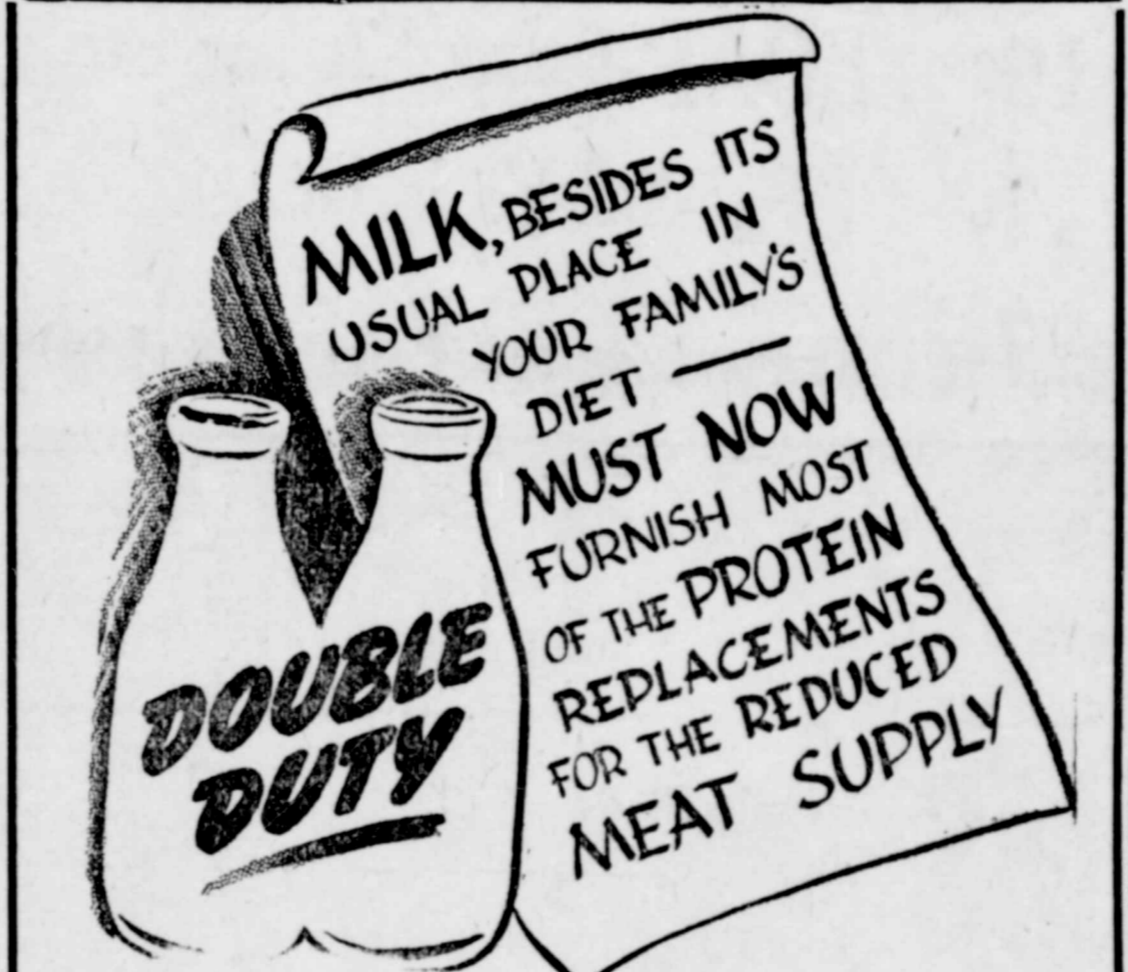
The house was called to order and each club president answered roll call with a report of their club work the past month. We also heard the reports of each council committee chairman as follows:

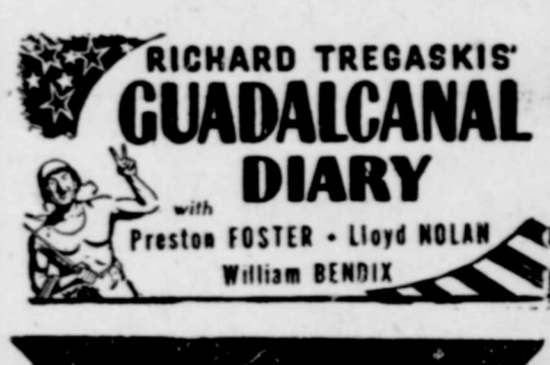

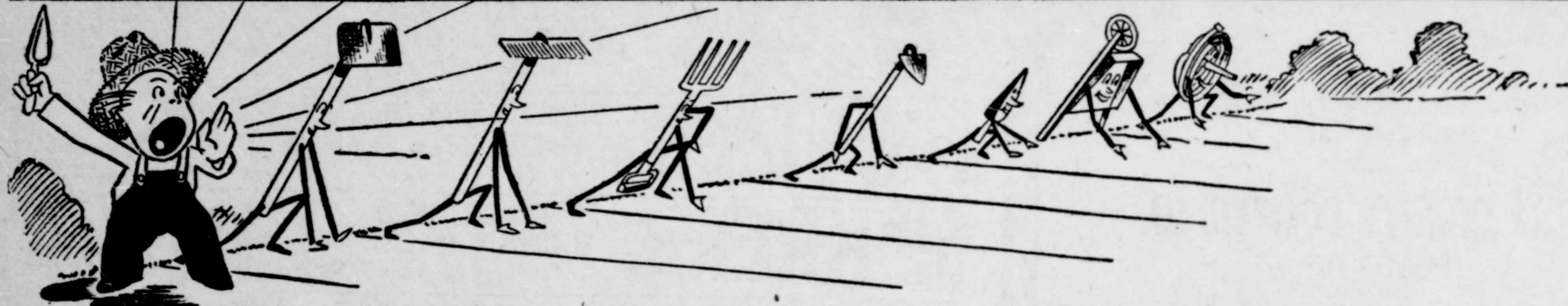
