




Hare Awarded the Silver Rifle Medal

James Calvin (Uncle Jimmie) Green was born July 10, 1870 in Gonzales county, Texas. He departed this life April 2, 1944 in Brownfield, Texas.

At the age of 16, he moved with his parents to Georgetown. In November 1892, he was married to Ella Green Josephine Young. In 1904, he and wife and five children came to Brownfield, Terry county, as one of the original pioneer families.

Mr. Green, a retired farmer, has held various offices in the community; county clerk four years and county tax assessor for four years. He was circulation agent for the Star-Telegram here for some four years, until his eyes failed him.

He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Ivy Savage, 2203 28th St., Lubbock and Mrs. J. A. May of Clovis, N. M.; three sons, L. C. and C. L., both of this city, and G. M. of Crosbyton; 14 grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren.

Sometimes these warts get on our nerves with repeat after repeat in crime, but that's the law, and the best of us may want to invoke that law in our own behalf, some time. -EDS-

While there was much mouth ng and growling about why Gov. Coke Stevenson did not call a special session of the legislature to pass a soldier's vote bill, Coke just set tight and waited. He knew there was a bill pending in congress, and furthermore he'd been advised by the Attorney General's department that there vas nothing the legislature could do about the matter. Some of his political enemies got raw about the matter (especially those who could draw \$10 per day in the called session and while away the time at Austin at the same time) and this included some of the very high up who are looking for promotion, and want the vote of servicemen and their families to put them over. But Coke just kept his council and although bitterly attacked, just let 'em snort and cavort. And, as it is, the servicemen have a federal ballot that answers the question, and Texas taxpayers are saved some one hundred thousand dolars. Rah! for Coke.

-EDS----Up at Washington, it seems the administration joined by a handpicked supreme court, are still trying to tell southern people hew to hold an election, who can participate in them, and that without regard to qualification. The test is that negroes can vote in Democratic primaries in Texas, which has always been the white man's way of nomination. The State Democratic Committee, or at least some of them, have come out for a negro primary, if they wish one. This will not suit the ballheads at Washington, who are set on social equality, which neither the true negro of the south or the white man desires. Let us remembers that the white people of the south had their way soon after the Civil War, when there was a Yankee soldier on every stump, and a carpetbagger with his hand in every treasury. The federal government has no more right to try to control primary nominations in the south, or anywhere else, than we have to tell a Harlem negro how to vote. Party nominations should be left up to the party as to whom is the qualified voter. Old Hiitler don't have charge of this country yet, and we hope he never does.
