

New passenger tube "factory seconds" may be acquired without certificate as they have been removed from rationing.

New "factory seconds" are tires or, tubes which manufacturers has found to be imperfect and upon which he has placed special identifying mark or from which he has removed brand name. The tires have a price ceiling 25 percent less than for perfects.
