FARM FIRES VERY DESTRICTIVE

Farm fires in the United States claim approximately 3,500 lives! and destroy an estimated \$100,-000,000 worth of property annu

According to the Gypsum Asociation, Chicago, a new consciousness of the extreme hazards of costly blazes is appearing because, right now, fires are constant threats to full production of food for war. They have become the concern of authorities alive to the problem of conserving the nation's agricultural wealth.

Currently, attention is being given to the greater use of fireproof building materials for repairs and allowable building on farms. The postwar construction period in rural areas is expected to reveal fire protection as one of the prime considerations for new farm homes and utility buildings.

The association disclosed that though farm fires have numerous origins, eight causes are responsoible for 85 per cent of the total losses on farms. These include defectiv chimneys and flues; sparks on combustibe roofs; lightning; spontaneous combuston; careless use of matches; smoking; careless use of gasoline and kerosene; defective and improperly installed stoves and furnaces; faulty wiring and misuse of electrical appiances.

Care and correction, the association cites, can help cut down materialy the number of destructive farm fires. More general use of fireproof building materials will offer added safeguards.

> An aid to producers is the concerted effort of distrubtors to keep the supply of eggs flowing steadily into consumer channels as a nutrition wartime food, Todd said, adding that aggressive merchandising has thus proved an important factor in increasing egg consumption. "For instance," he stores, one of the larger purchasers of Texas eggs, show this company paid producers \$916,462 for eggs purchased in the state last year."

Even greater cooperation by distributors and consumers is needed now, the poultry official said, to assure farmers a profitable market for their surplus production during the next few weeks and thus insure that a feast will not be followed by a famine. "Each of us can help," he concuded, "by eating more eggs during this period. Remember they are a "whole" food, complete with proteins, essential vitamins, fats and minerals."

One of the early reports reaching the Texas A. and M. College venture made by the marketing committee of the Lipscomb County Home Demonstration Council. Within four days after preliminary arrangements had been made with' the importer, the order for 400 dozen pineapple was complete. In all, 315 families places orders, Wanda Kimbrell, Lipscomb County home demonstration agent, has advised the Extension home industries specialist. Myrtle Mur-

The pineapple arrived three days later. To replace those which were smashed or spoiled, the importer shipped an additional eight dozen, but only 23 were damaged in transit. One member of the marketing committee utilized the bruised fruit that same day.

Many of the pineapple weighed five to six pounds, and none weighed under three. The purchasers also were well pleased with their pineapple, which were of the sugarload variety.
