

#### Storm Damages **Building Here**

With the heavy rain that fell in Brownfield and vicinity last Friday evening, came damage to two buildings. The overhead conveyor, running from the Goodpasture elevator to the nearby railroad track, was blown down, and completely wrecked. It fell across a large grain truck, badly damaging the body.
