THE LOAVES AND THE FISHES

ARCHIMEDES PRINCIPLE HELPS RAISE BATTLESHIP OKLAHOMA

A tug on a single rope rigged to several smaller ones can be multiplied by using a compound pulley. Archimedes demonstrated in salvaging a war galley sunk off Sicily in 285 B. C. The same principle was used in raising the U. S. S. Oklahoma, the 30,000 ton battleship sunk in the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor. Using 5-horsepower moors, for pulling power, instead of slaves as Archimedes did, General Electric engineers were able to take the Oklahoma from a list of 151 degrees to within 2 and one-half degrees of its natural position within 72 operating hours.

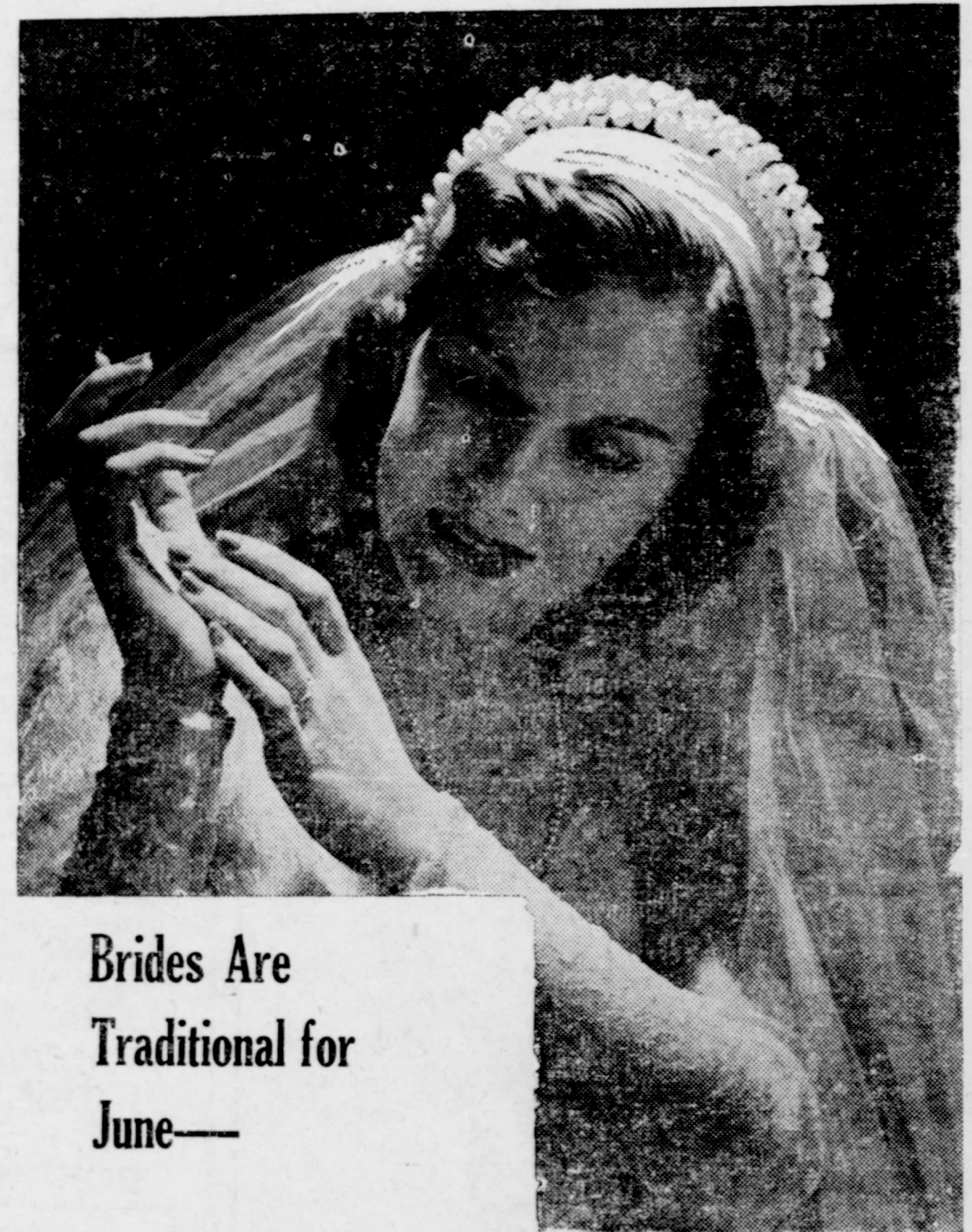

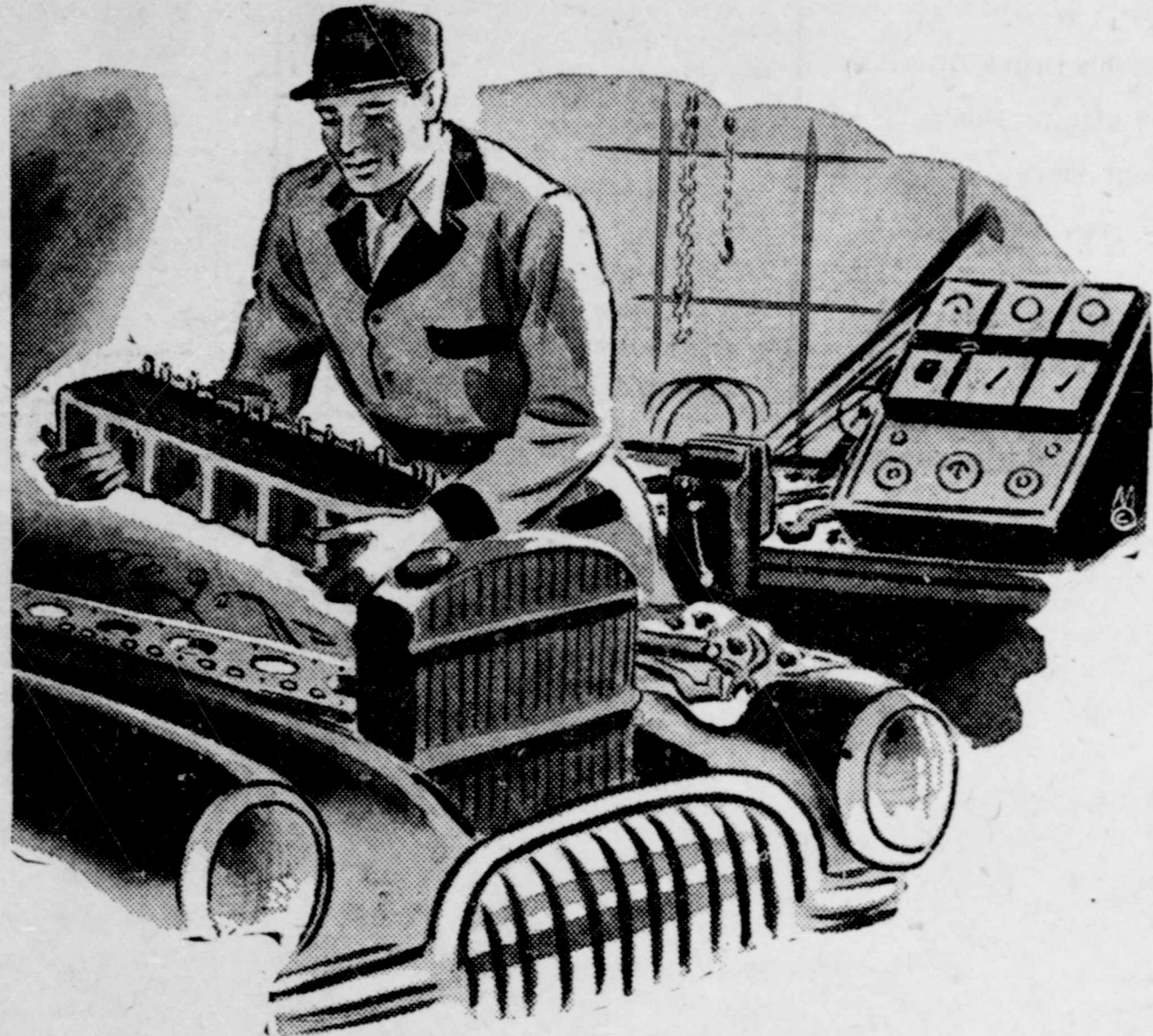
