Yanks Build A Flyable German Gotha Glider

A NINTH TROOP CARRIIER BASE, May 29.—On an Italian airfield hastily evacuated bythe Germans, 13 American soldiers who had never seen a complete enemy glider, pieced together bits and pieces of wrecked German gliders and built a flyable Gotha 242.

Working under constant threat of enemy air attack, without blueprints, plans, drawings or technical information, the mechanics of the Ninth Troop Carrier Command, transformed a mass of smashed aircraft into a true copy of the factory-built Gotha, except for a set of American instruments.

Other than the knowledge that the Gotha was a twin-boom, highry 21 soldiers and two pilots, or freight of 5,300 pounds, they had little information to go on.

Allied military authorities, needing the glider for study, assigened 1/Lt. Nicholas F. Miller, now commander of a Ninth Troop Carrier glider echelon in England, to begin the job. In five weeks the task was finished.

One of the most difficult sections to reconstruct was the twinboom tail section. Sourvenir-seeking soldiers and slashed the tail surfaces to obtain swastikes.



A tug on a single rope rigged to several smaller ones can be multiplied by using a compound pulley, Archimedes demonstrated in salvaging a war galley sunk off Sicily in 285 B. C. The same principle was used in raising the U.S. S. Oklahoma, the 30,000 ton battleship sunk in the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor. Air Corp Reserve Wants Boys

Enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve is again open to qualified young Americans now 17 years of age-who want to win their wings on the "greatest team in the world"-an AAF air combat

Young men of 17 who want to fly with the AAF may apply at any AAF Examining Board for enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve. Upon passing the preliminary qualifying physical and mental tests, they will become members of the U.S. Army Air Force on inactive duty. This means that they will not be called for training until they have reached their 18th birthday. If at work, thye may remain on the job until they are 18. If in high school, they may elect to complete the semester they entered prior to their 18th If they are high school graduates, not over 17 years and 9 months of age, they may elect to take advantage of the Army Specialized provides free college training for; men approaching military age.

When called, they will first be given basic training. During this period, they will take aptitude tests to determine whether they will be classified for training as gunner, pilot, bombardier, or navigator.
