Mr. Graves, familiarly known as K, was born in Jack county, Texas, in 1879. Later he went with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Graves, to the Union community, and from there to Brownfield. K Graves had a love for the outdoors and delighted in telling stories of the early history and adventures connected with the settling of the Pecos Valley. In 1937 he was appointed postmaster at Elkins, New Mex., and filled that position until spring of this year. For a number of years he has been an active and interested member of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association.

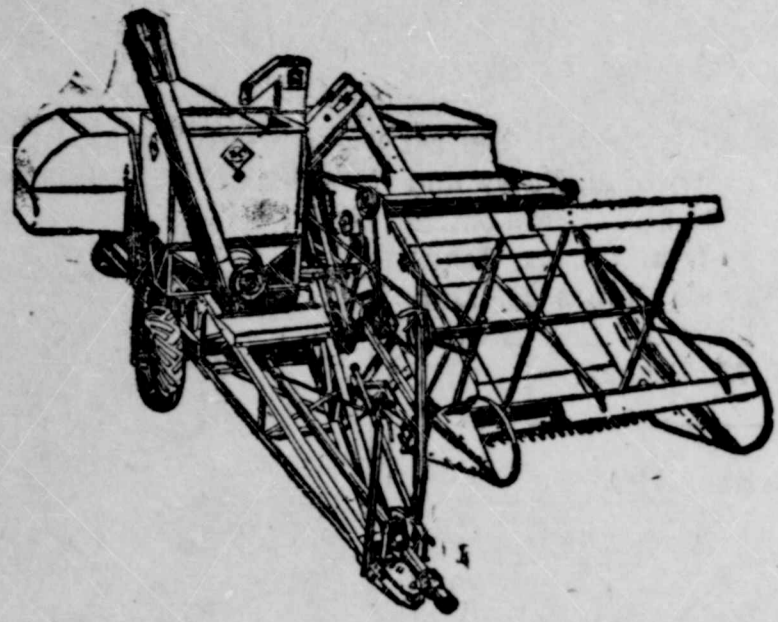

What about travel conditions?

Travel conditions are different than they were in pre-war days. Let's look at the facts: Throughout the land, tens of thousands of men and women of our armed forces are now traveling across the country by rail. The families of our fighting troops are taking trips to "see the boys" before they shove off for overseas. Executives and war workers of essential industries are traveling between various plants on important missions. 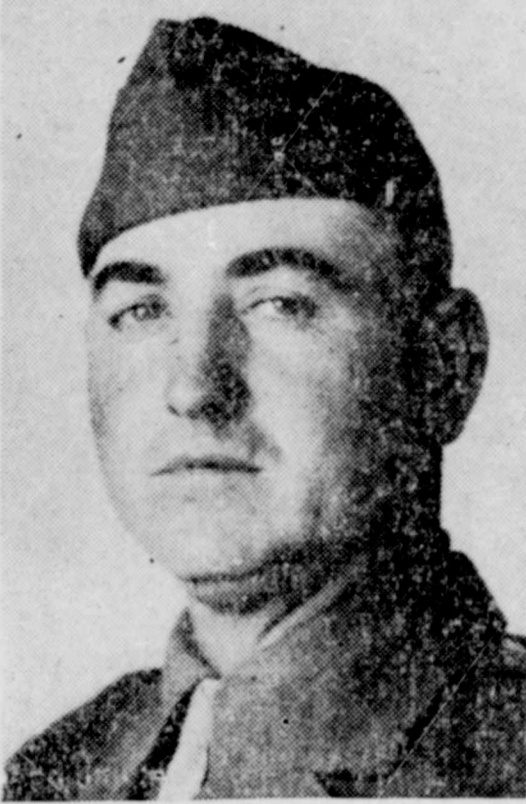

National Farm Safety Week

By The President of The United States of America

A PROCLAMATION
Nation greatly to acknowledge its special dependence upon skill and labor of its farmers in the gigantic task of waging war; and

WHEREAS the loss of life and limb by accident among our farming population has already reached an appalling figure, and the risks have lately been increased by longer hours of work and consequent fatigue; and

WHEREAS it is essential to our war effort that this waste of vital farm power be minimized in every way:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do hereby call upon the Nation to observe the week beginning July 23, 1944, as National Farm Safety Week. And I request all persons and organizations concerned with agriculture and farm life to unite in an effort, during this National Farm Safety Week, to stimulate among farmers a full realization of the need for constant attention to the old familiar precaution against the hazards of their calling, and also to awaken in them a sense of responsibility for the proper instruction in rules of safety of the many young and inexperienced persons now being employed on the farm in all parts of the country.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the city of Washington his sixteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord Nineteen hundred and forty-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and sixty-eighth.

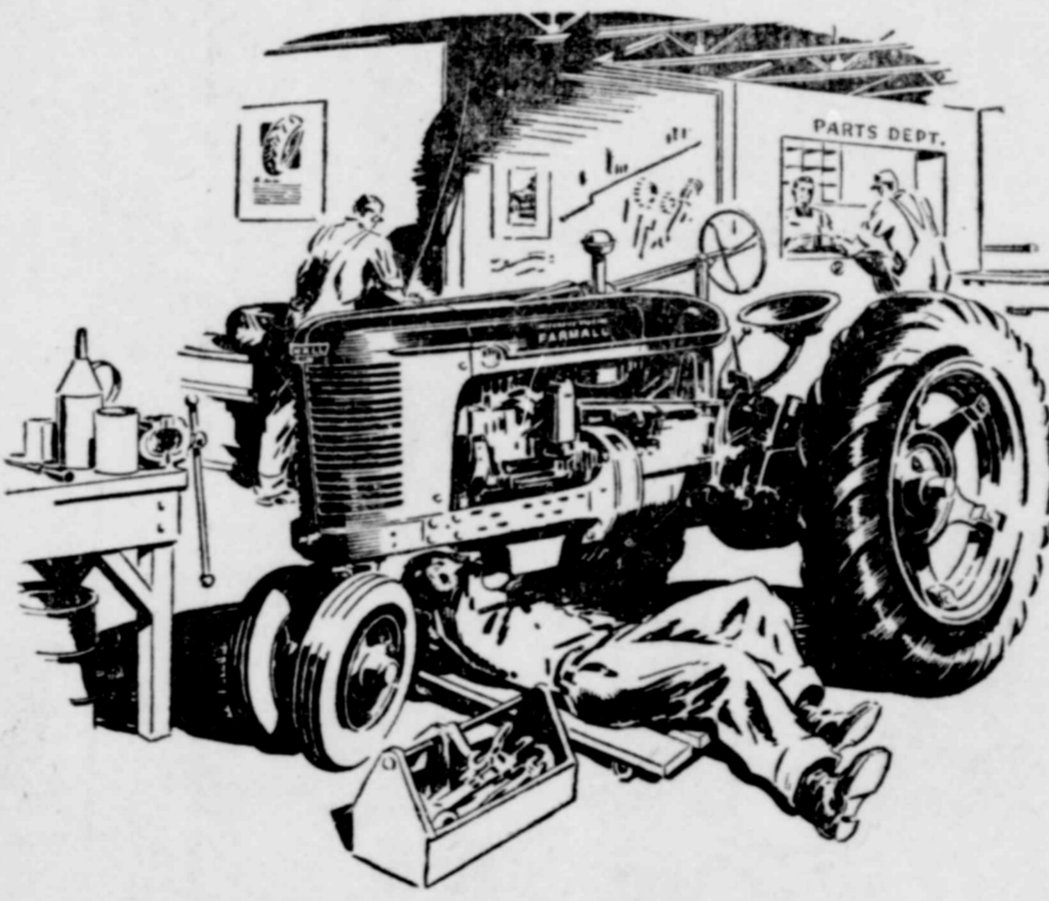
