The Postmaster anticipates even heavier mail loads this Christmas than during the record-breaking 1946 holiday season. He said that local postoffices across the nation are already preparing for this peak load by recruiting extra mail clerks and carriers, collecting and overhauling delivery trucks, and

"We would appreciate it if people would stop in next week and purchase the extra stamps they are going to need for their Christmas cards and letters," he said. "This is one phase of Christmas shopping that can be completed early, and it will help us a great deal in speeding up traffic at post office windows during

The Postmaster recommended that Christmas cards be sent firstclass where there is any possibility that the address may be incorrect or incomplete, since ony envelopes bearing a 3-cent

stamp have forwarding privileges. Stressing the heed for complete and accurate addresses, he pointed out that thousands of cards and packages are days late arriving every Christmas season, or end up at the dead-letter office, because of insufficient address. He emphasized that zone numbers available to speed delivery.

Parcel post packages cannot be in weight, and are limited in size to 100 inches in length and girth

Christmas cards can be handled more readily if they are tied in bundles, with all the envelopes facing the same way and the tamps in the same corner. Progressive mailings over a period of several days evens out the work at the post office, he added.



Velma Atterberry, 16, after an all-day trial list Friday before Judge H. R. Winston and jury, was paroled to her eldest sister. The girl had entered a plea of guilty to the slaying of her father, John F. Atterberry at their farm home seven miles north of town early in November. The public was barred from the hearing.

Mrs. H. G. Johnson, the older sister, is the wife of a well-to-do farmer of the Lampasas section.

Detailed evidence, submitted mostly by members of the family and close relatives, tended to establish a course of unsavory conduct on the part of the deceased over period of years, culminating in the daughters' drastic ac-

#### **Texas Milk Income Highest On Record**

ing the highest cash income from To Use milk in the history of the State and 1947 returns are expected to exceed by a substantial amount the 1946 record-breaking total of \$103,382,000, according to the Milk Industry Foundation.

The growing importance of the milk industry to the State's economy is further evidenced by the new peak value of \$136,582,000 set on Texas' 1,330,000 milk cows which produced a total of 1,899,-000,000 quarts of milk in 1946. Annual milk production per cow averaged 1,428 quarts.

Expanded utilization of Texas milk as fluid milk for drinking and cooking has increased the overall value of the State's milk output as farmers receive their highest price for milk used in this form. Latest annual figures for Texas show butter production at 16,577,000 pounds, American whole milk cheese at 7,802,000 pounds and ice cream at 32,727,000 gallons.

Milk and its many products supply the essentials of good nutrition at low cost. The milk industry is constantly striving to give consumers a high-quality product at the lowest possible cost through distribution economies and small profits, on a national average less than a third of a cent per quart of milk.

According to Government statistics, milk is a better food bargain today than ever before showing only about half the gain in price reported for "all foods."

#### Wheat Grindings And Flour Production

Wheat grindings plunged 12 per cent from August to September dropping to 3,809,000 bushels, according to Bureau of the Census reports to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

The seasonally-adjusted index prepared by the University Bureau sagged 15 per cent during the month, since the dip was more than is usual in the August-to-September comparison. In spite of the monthly lag, grindings were half again as large as prewar (1935-39) production with the index at 152.

Wheat flour production slacked off 12 per cent but passed up year-ago September production by 5 per cent . Some uneasines has been expressed by mill men over early 1948 activities. Flour mills may be forced to close or run on a part-time basis next spring for want of wheat, which is one danger sighted in the present export buying.

Old spring plants of tomatoes, eggplant, okra and peppers, if fertilized, worked, mulched and watered, will yield excellent fall crops.

There will be no cotton marketing quotas and no acreage allotments for the 1948 cotton crop, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
