## Local Man Has Bottle Of Confederate Whiskey

A. J. Jordan, of North A street, is keeping as a family relic a full guart of whiskey, authenicated by affidavits made in Crockett, Texas in 1890, that it is double stilled corn whiskey, made in 1864, in the Louisiana State Laboratory, especially for Confederate sick. Mr. Jordan's father, H. R. Jordan who died in 1914 at the age of 84, was the original purchaser, while he was a Confederate soldier and kept in intact as a "Relic of the Lost Cause."

He paid \$10.00 in "Louisiana Money" for it. Upon his death his widow kept it till her death in 1921. Upon the death of an older brother, it passed to A. J. in 1941. The original label, was written in pen and ink. Certificates show it have been re-sealed, because of decaying corks in 1893, 1902. 1921 and 1941. It is now 83 years

## Old Courch of Christ Building Removed



## Save Grain In The Dec. Poultry Flock

Every month is important in the poultry business, but December, 1947, is another grain saving month, and merits special attention, W. J. Moore, extension poultry specialist for Texas A and M College, suggests to producers that they keep only high-producing ens and use intelligent management to save grain as well as maintain an efficient flock.

He says to cull the laying flock regularly and dispose of all low producers as they are cuiled out. The immature and slow-developing pullets can be culled, too.

Another suggestion is to keep the egg yield above 50 per cent production rate. Feed a complete ration to furnish proteins, minerals, and vitamins to balance the nutrients in grains. Feeding only grain to a laying flock is a grainwasting practice. The grain keeps the hen alive, but does not furnish her all the necessary ingredients for economical egg produc-

A poultry pasture is a grain conservation measure, also, and saves on the feed bill, Moore reminds.

As a last suggestion, he recomnends providing good hoppers that prevent waste and not overfilling with feed for the hens to

## Lay And Ming Start

Drove out to the Lay farm Sunday after church services, and had a splendid meal with them and other relatives visiting from Coahoma and San Angelo, B. R. had his dad's cotton harvester, and we got to see it work.

We figured on this operation just about every way we could think of and always come up with figures in favor of the harvester, especially if you have planted storm proof cotton, and Lay had. Over on their north farm that Carl Ming operates, the draw section had to be hand picked as there were too many rocks, which they feared would get in the cotton and perhaps cause fire.

True there was some cotton left on the ground, but some of it was We are calling this feature to there when the machine started. And no hand pickers that we know of will pick cotton up off the ground. Where they were then operating the machine, it took about ten rows to make a bale. but was getting much better toward the house. It was expected that eight rows would make a

One of the advantages of machinery has already been demonstrated in dirty cotton. A bale of harvested cotton will have about 300 pounds less dirt than a hand picked bale, after a sandstorm or two have hit the field. Some one at Lubbock with a flare for figures come up with the information that a machine will gather all your cotton at one operation at about 30c per hundred. Hand gathering

By Gov. BEAUFORD JESTER

It is my solemn duty to acquaint the citizens of this State with the grim prediction of traffic deaths and injuries during the coming Christmas Holiday season. The Texas Department of Pub-

lic Safety predicts that 100 persons will die, 2,870 persons will be injured, from accidents on our streets and highways during the eleven day period, December 20-31. It is expected that the final 1947 traffic death toll will reach 2,100- the worst toll in Texas

These predicted deaths and injuries are not inevitable. They can and must be prevented. Such sickening slaughter and suffer-

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BEAU-FORD H. JESTER, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby urge each citizen to impose upon himself such discipline and a sense of responsibility for the welfare of others that his acts behind-thewheel may not lead to the death or injury of his fellow man. I also call upon the Texas Safety Association to coordinate public support effort with the official safety work of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the State Highway Department, the State Department of Education and other official agencies with traffic responsibilities. He in turn contacted Leo Holmes of the Brownfield State Bank and Johnnie Kendrick of the First National Bank and told them of the discovery. Investigation of the firms' account unearthed some 16.

Production of ceramic tile, for instance, reached the highest rate in history during September and is expected to go even higher before the year's end. "When the ship reaches the port of entry telegrams are sent to the next of kin advising them of the return of the remains," Lt. Col. S. H. Partridge, Chief of the American Graves Registration Division at Fort Sam Houston, said. "The purpose of this telegram is to give families ample time for funeral arrangements, to contact other relatives, and to give us a check on whether the next of ki will be available to receive the re-


