manac is forecasting a summer for 1948 similar to that famous summer of 1816 when there was freezing, or at least a frost, every month of the year. Upon reading carefully this publication, I do not find such a statement, although it describes this cold summer of 1816. This fact might lead a reader naturally to think that a similar summer is expected in 1948.

What About Sunspots? There are many people who believe that a very close relation-

ship exists between weather conditions and sunspots. Those who are interested in the details of such a study should write to Professor H. C. Willett, Meteorology Department, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Massachusetts, or Professor H. T. Stetson, author of "Sunspots in Action," c-o Ronald Press, 15 East 26th Street, New York 10, New York. Briefly the Sunspot Theory is that when these spots are very brilliant and active, we suffer from either, or both, very hot and very cold weather. Cause of the 1816 Cold Summer After careful study of this famous 1816 summer, I concluded the cause of the low temperatures was the dust in the air covering the skies of the entire world. It was a year of several volcanoes in action. These might well have caused dust in the air which could shut off the sunshine. I further understand that certain other cold summers have come along in conjunction with many dust storms and other causes.

The above is not saying that 1948 may not witness a cold summer, but farmers and others will wise to plan upon normal whither, at least so far as temperature is concerned. As to rainfall, this seems to follow a cycle and many sections of the United States are now entering a dry cycle. Crops which can prosper with little rainfall are to be preferred during 1948.

Importance of Diversification The failure of certain crops due to a wet Spring or early frost, or too much or too little rainfall, may be expected almost any year. Bobbitt, chairman of the tidelands committee of the State Bar of Texas, accompanied Attorney General Price Daniel and US Senator Tom Connally to the White House, where they conferred with President Truman on the tidelands question. State ownership to such lands has been clouded since a California case.







Insurgent Republicans

Despite Sen. Robert Taft's powerful position as chairman of the GOP steering committee and of the congressional joint economic committee, he may find determined opposition to his stand against some of the President's recommendations.

For instance, stocky, bald and bespectacled Sen. Ralph Flanders of Vermont, who has been called "America's most enlightened industrialist," may oppose Taft's policies.

Senator Flanders, as chairman of a subcommittee of the joint economic committee, has investigated prices and already has declared "we have not found any alternative to some measure of controls at least on the basic item of food."

Another insurgent against the Taft leadership in the senate, this time on the question of universal military training, undoubtedly will develop in the regular session. Taft is staunchly opposed to UMT.

But Sen. John Chandler Gurney of South Dakota, otherwise a party regular, is supporting the administration on this issue as he has on all military matters.

The South Dakotan belies his militarism, for he is short, chunky and cherub-faced and his friends call him "Chan."

We want to thank all those who cooperated with us to conserve natural gas during the recent severe cold spell.

We think our customers are entitled to know why supplies of natural gas ran short.

The emergency was not due to any mechanical or human failures. All the pipe lines, and all the machinery in our compressor stations functioned properly. All employees discharged their duties faithfully throughout. We received good cooperation from those who supply us with natural gas.

The emergency shortage of gas was due largely to the simultaneous occurrence of two circumstances, either of which is most unusual in West Texas. The first of these situations was that temperatures dropped to sub freezing and to near zero and stayed there for about a week. Ordinarily, such cold spells do not last more than three or four days at most. The second situation was that the severely cold weather prevailed throughout our entire system at the same time. Ordinarily, a cold spell will move across our system from north to south or from west to east, with extreme temperatures prevailing in only a portion of the system at any one time.

Therefore, it was the combination of these two factors that caused the emergency-first, that the severe cold spell was so prolonged; and second, that the cold spell prevailed throughout our entire system at one time.

We added more horsepower to the capacity of the compressor stations in our transmission system in 1947 than in any year in the company's history. This was done in anticipation of heavy demands for gas during the winter of 1947-48. What we did not anticipate was the above unusual combination of circumstances. Even if we had been able to anticipate these circumstances, we could have done nothing about it, due to the difficulty of obtaining steel pipe.

The only community in which there was any interruption to residential gas service was Levelland, whereabout half of the homes were temporarily without gas. For two years, we have sought to build a larger-size pipe line to Levelland, but have been unable to get anyone to accept an order for the pipe.

Through your cooperation, you have helped us and yourselves. Except in the case of the short interruption at Levelland, you have made it possible for residential gas service to continue without interruption.

Thank you again for your cooperation and understanding.

Guns Replaced By Syringes In Mexican Cattle Disease War

A recent abrupt change in the Joint United States-Mexico war on foot and mouth disease, involving an about-face on the "no vaccination" policy previously adhered to, is the cause of grave concern in livestock circles this

side of the border. Government authorities have announced that under a new operating policy instituted in the Mexican cattle disease campaign, animals in foot and mouth disease infection areas will be quarantined and vaccinated. Slaughter of infected animals will be resorted to only "when necessary." Previously, all infected and exposed cattle in the quarantine areas were slaughtered because vaccination was not regarded as a dependable means of combating the disease.

From Chicago, reliably informed veterinary authorities reported that pressure to abandon large-scale slaughter of animals came from Mexican interests as early as last July. The complaint was that the slaughter program was proving a crippling impact on Mexico's economic and social

structure. These authorities said, however, that the actual decision to reverse the campaign policy "came as a sharp surprise to the American veterinary profession and to the livestock industry because former experiences with foot and mouth disease vaccination have not warranted trust in this practice."

Also from Chicago, the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association, official organ of the veterinary profession in North America, offered a partial explanation for the turn-

"Resistance to the eradication campaign," this publication explained, "increased so much and became so bitter that a Mexican veterinarian and a seven-soldier escort were murdered, and several sanitary squads were threatened with violence. Finally, late in November, the situation became so acute that reversal in eradication procedure was nec-

Root of the violence, the Journal suggested, lay in the fact that Mexican owners could see no end to the slaughtering of their cattle and oxen. Apparently many owners had thought the campaign would work miracles and could be completed with minimum sacrifice of animals.

It is currently estimated that it will take at least ten years to purge the infection area in Mexico. Less optomistic estimates hold that North American live-
