The Flanders-Ives-Baldwin group feels the Republicans have a responsibility of their own as the majority party in congress and that they will get the blame unless the GOP does something about the cost of living.

In the meantime, the government is going through the motions of complying with provisions of the new voluntary anti-inflation law with no thought that it will be effective. Mmes. Farmers' Income

A Kansas farmer writes: "You quote the gross farm income for this year at 34 million dollars. What do you mean by gross income? If you figure the farmers' expenses you will find that he comes out about like he always does, at the little end of the horn."

In answer, the department of agriculture figures farm gross income as including the sum of cash receipts from farm marketing, government payments, the value of farm products consumed in farm households and the rental value of farm dwellings; estimate, 34.4 billion dollars for 1947.

Secretary Anderson in his annual report says realized farm net income, or difference between gross income and production expenses, is estimated at 18 billion dollars for 1947-also a record high-about five billions higher than even gross income in 1929.

Here's one reporter's opinion on what will finally happen to the tax re-duction bill. House Republicans are prepared to force the measure through nuch as Congressman Harold Knutson wants it, providing for something over a five billion dollar cut. Many congressmen admit privately the cut is too much but, well, it's an election year. But unless the senate slashes the tax cuts down to four billion dollars or under, President Truman will veto the bill and the Republicans will be unable to muster enough votes to pass, it over the veto.

Home Mortgage Rates

Several letters have questioned the accuracy of figures we recently quoted concerning home mortgage in the nation. The figures were accurate but were slightly misplaced due to typographical errors. Here are the facts.

Home mortgages have risen 416 billion dollars since 1940 to a total of 241/2 billion dollars at the end of 1946. For more than a decade prior to 1940 the home mortgage total averaged approximately 20 billions.


When FHA was established in 1934, it slashed home mortgage interest rates from an average of 7 per cent to 5 per cent. All banks and other lenders followed suit. So, based on 20 billion dollars a year in home mortgages, FHA was instrumental in saving approximately 400 million dollars annually in interest rates, or a total of some \$5,600,-000,000 in 14 years.

Budget for Agriculture

Insofar as agriculture is concerned, President Truman's 1949 budget requests of \$693,242,907 represents a decrease of about 50 million dollars from figures for the current fiscal year. Important to agriculture and the entire agricultural program is the President's recommendation of a federal charter for Commodity Credit corporation. Present charter expires June 30. CCC is vital to the farmers loan and price support program.

Cash receipts from farm marketings totaled about 2.6 billion dollars in January, slightly less than December, but 16 per cent above January, 1947, and a record for the month.

his action may defeat the very purposes he wishes to achieve. But his politics is as hybrid as the seed corn he WALLACE raises, and his anaouncement speech and platform

are confused and contradictory. His charge that the Marshall plan bypasses the United Nations was debated freely on the floor of the senate along with the emergency relief for western Europe. It was deemed impractical by both Demotrats and Republicans with three exceptions, Taylor of Idaho, the cowboy senator who may be Wallace's running mate; Pepper of Florida, and Langer of North Da-

With Russia using every effort to defeat the plan and possessed of the veto, it would be impossible to use the United Nations for the purpose at this time.

Wallace would have this country training, yet he would have the United Nations with an "international police force stronger than the military establishment of any nation." NEW LOOK IN HOMES- In a poll of the nation's builders taken at the annual exposition of the National Association of Home Builders in Chicago, two out of three persons said that expanding use of glass for indoor-outdoor living was the most important single factor in postwar housing trends.
