DEATH OF GEN. GRIFFIN.

A telegram was received at head quarters in this city on Sunday evening aunonucing the death of Brevet Major General Griffin at Galaceton at 11 o'clock on the same day. The gad new did not get abroad over the city until next morning, when it cast a gloom over the community and caused a sincere feeting of sorrow in the breast of every Union man. Geo. Griffin had been in command of this State about one year. He entered into the duties of his taying position, requiring civil as well as military sagacity, with characteristic energy; he acquainted himself with the sentiments of the people and understood perfectly the questions and necessities of the He had far reaching perception in regard to reconstruction, and was above the reach of any political chicanery; he knew his duty and did it fear-lessly; he knew it to be his duty to protect the loyal men of Texas and he did so as far as he could. Had General Griffin been in absolute command and able to have made those changes and established such rules which by his keen perception he knew the situation de manded, Texas would have been far or the way to loyal reconstruction, and peace, law, order and confidence reigned thoughout our borders. His jury order which brought out the most violent abuse on the part of the rebels was a wise and just order, and did much to check the rebel arrogance which had waxed strong under the administration of Governor Throckmorton. General Sheridan placed the same confidence in General Griffin in the administration of affairs in this State as he did when he ordered him to relieve Gon. How sad it is to record the death of uch a man, cut down in the prime of life and in the midst of bis usefulness, with the garlands of balf a hundred vicis that such a man should be swept from the world just as he had a prospect enjoying that peace which his go ord had helped to win. No more wil his brave heart kindle with patriotic zeal in the cause of his country. No nore will his bright eye shine like star in the front of battle.

POLITICAL CONJECTURES-NEGRO SUFFRAGE.

Our telegraph in its spasmodic acion is often prolific in conjecture but slim in facts. A Washington dispatch remarking upon the result in Maine goes on to conjecture that "the creat central States of New York, Pennsylvania, and Ohio, are now claimed as certain, and the defeat of egro suffrage in Ohio scems coneded." It don't tell us what the reat central States are certain for, but we suppose the inference is left lates, is worth just as much as San Antonio copperhead conjecture upon the same subject.

The assertion that negro suffrage will be defeated in Ohio is to be proved yet. Even if negro suffrage s defeated in every State north, it would not change the political status of the negro in the South; he has the suffrage and it can never be taken from him no more than can his liberty. That step forward can never e retraced so far as the Southern States are concerned, and the solution in the other States is only uestion of time; and when the Sonthera States are fully represented in Congress we believe that it will be settled by congressional action. Wignies a Convention between the United States of America and the Republic of Peruwas concluded and signed by their respective Plenipotentiaries at the city of Lima on the twentieth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight bundred and sixty two, which Convention, being in the English and Spanish languages, is, word for

eixiy.two, which Conventions being in the English and Spanish languages, is, word for word, as follows:—
Convention between the United States of America and the Republic of Peru.

Whereas differences having arisen between the United States of America and the Republic of Peru, originating in the capture and confiscation by the latter of two ships belonging to citizens of the United States, called the "Lizzie Thompson" and "Georgiana"; and the two governments not being able to come to an agreement upon the questions involved in said capture and confiscation sinvolved in said capture and confiscation, and being equally animated with the dealer to maintain the relations of harmony which have always existed, and which it is desirable to preserve and strengthen between the two governments, have agreed to refer all the questions, both of law and fact, involved in the capture and officación of said ships by the government of Peru, to the decision of some friendly Power; and it being now expedient to proceed to and regulate the reference is above described, the United States of America and the Republic of Peru haye for that purpose fnamed their respective Pleulpotentiaries — that is to say, the President of the United States has appointed Christopher Robinson their Envey Extraored ditary and Minister Pleulpotentiary to Peru, and the President of Ere of Peru Don Jose Gregorio President of the United States has appointed Ohristopher Robinson their Envoy Extraoradinary and Minister Plenipolentiary to Peru, and the President of Peru Don Jose Gregorio Per Soldan, Minister of State in the office of Foreign Relations and President of the Council of Ministers, who, after having exchanged their full powers, found to be indue and proper form, have agreed upon the following articles:
