#### HOW TO STRAIN HONEY.

Texas is the greatest natural honey State in the Union, but the article is produced only in a back-woods way. There are thousands of gallons of delicions wild boney ungathered every year, which if properly harvested would make quite an item in our home market, and our surplus could be profitably shipped to New Orleans or elsewhe We clip the following method to strain honey from an exchange:

"Two vassels are required—one larger than the other. For small lots milk pane than the other. For small lots milk pass can be used. Suppose we fill up a tenquart pan with honey in the comb; two or three thin pieces of wood are put in the bottom of a twelve-quart pan, so that there will be a space for water under the pan containing, the honey; put this pan into the larger one, fill up the space with hot water and put them on the stove. The comb will soon melt and rise on the ton; where all is melted set it away to The comb will soon melt and rise on the top; when all is melted set it away to cool. As soon as it is cool, cut a small hole in this crust of wax and pour the honey direct into the jars. No further straining is required, and the honey will be found to be of the same flavor as before the heat was applied. Pack the jars in a box, with sawdust, and they are ready for market. In this way they can be shipped any distance by freight, as safely as cases of wine or other liquids."

SWEET TOMATO PICKLES.-We print the following receipt for the benefit of our housewives. We know it is the best receipt of the kind. They can cut it out and keep it until tomatoes con

it out and keep it until tomatoes come again;

"Slice one gallon of green tomatoes, and put a brandful of sait to each layer of tomatoes. Let them stand twelve hours, then drain off the liquor, and add to them two green peppers and from two to four outons, sliced. Take two quarts strong cider vinegar, a little more than one-helf pint of molasses, and two tables spoonfuls of whole mustard, and a teaspoonful of allspice, same of cloves, and heat until it begins to boil. Then put in tomatoes, outons, and peppers, and let them boil ten minutes. Pour them into a stone jar and seal tight, and put them in a cool place for a fortnight; after which they will be ready for use, and will keep a year without scalding."
