WHAT THE FALLING LEAF SAYS.

Every season has its lesson of life. The apring—for that is the true beginning—has one of unfolding; the summer, one of growth; the autumn, one of transition; and the winter, one of age and waiting. Perhaps, of these, if one be more suggestive than another, the lasson of the falling leaf is the deepest. The drying up of the vital essence of life—the fading, when the little day is nearing the sunset—touches the heart as nothing else can. But it ought never to make the heart sudder. But, in ceasing to be what I am, I may well remind you of what one has said who loves us, and takes us into his heart become all men living. If scorn, if we live only for ourselves. If ever in the autume a pensiveness steals over m, as the leaves flutter by in their fading, may we not wisely look up to their mighty monuments; and as we see how fair they are, how far prolonged in arch and isle, the avenues of the valleys, the fringes of the hills, so stately, so eternal; the joy of man, the comfort of all living creatures, the glory of the earth—remember that these are but the monuments of fading leaves, that faintly monuments of fading leaves, that faintly flit past us to die! Let them not die ber fore we read and understand their holy revelation; so that we also, eareless of a

"You can think as you like, therefore, about man, as he fades and falls; make the end of your life here as mournful as you please; dishonor death by evil names and images, as its shadow falls upon your race; but I sak you, once for all, to leave me out of your sad analogies. I might have done that in June, when my life was all to live; but in September, when it last had its day, as I begin to loosen from the apray where God has caused me to apring, the loosening seems as good as ever did the springing."

What ore Food Ferriburs.—It is stated that a hungry man who sits down before a pound of beefsteak, tender, juicy, and an inch thick, and eats it, will find upon analysis that sixty-five per cent. of his steak was water; that eighteen per cent. will go to give him an aldermanic fleshness; and that fourteen per cent. is assigned to warm him, and make him feel comfortable on a cold day. Of the flesh forming ingredients, according to Dr. Playfair, every one; on an average, requires ninety-two pounds annually to keep up a proper bodily condition. If it is not obtained from steaks, than it must be secured from something else. Cheese is a great flesh former (30 per cent,) and taken with heer, speedily conceals all traces of unsightly bones. Two ounces of flesh-formers per diem will keep a man alive if he is not forced to labor but hard labor requires six, or the but hard labor requires six, or the body will run short of starch and su-gar, and go behindhand in health and strength. In 100 parts of wheat there are 10 pounds of flesh, but there is nearly double the amount in the same quantity of oatmen!

The following items will interest the working men: It appounced that the Bay State Shee Company, of Worcester, Massachusetts, has recognized the true partnership of labor with capital, by dividing 25 per cent. of their profits to their three hundred employees. A co-operative building, society has been formed in Cleveland, Ohio, for the purpose of enabling poor men to build houses. A member of the North German Parhament has stated it to be his intention to introduce into that body a bill to regulate the hours of labor, the rate of wages and the employee ment of women and children in North German Bund.

The object is to have the water and buttermilk which remain in the butter thoroughly saturated with salt, and of course the more the butter is worked and freed from the buttermilk, the less salt will be required to salt it enough for preservation; but as enough salt to keep it will not usually make it salt enough for the taste of many customers, we must add more; one pound to twenty-foar of butter will not generally be too much for the public t ste.—Correspondence Westchester Republican.

TOTAL NUMBER OF REGIS-TERED VOTES.

We have been reliably informed that the registration figures foot up; total number of whites registered as 56,015; colored 47,259-in all 103,276. By this it will be seen that the white vote is about the same as at the last Governors election. We have no time to-day to make comment upon these interesting figures. This result gives a white majority of 8,756, which shows that the whites have not all been disfranchised and at the same time it shows that Texas is safe for the Union. Now what will the rebels do?
