Indivi-duals lack the capital, and cannot sus-tain the risk of reducing, while the Government lacks the incentive and indent recommends the ap-Our correspon propriation of \$10,000,000 or \$20,000,000 by Cangress for the erection of reducing works in our silver mining States. This, he thinks, would set 100 miners at work where now there is one, and would only interfere with those companies which are putting up expensive works without knowning whether their mines will warrant the outlay or not.

THE MURDER OF ANOTHER UNITED STATES' OFFICER.

We have the following letter from gentleman fiving at Hillsboro, Hill county :-

HILLASORO, HILL COUNTY, Texas, November 20, 1867.

It falls to my lot to report to you another one of those horrid acts which have blackened the reputation of our State.

On Friday the 15th instant, Captain C. E. Culver, the Bureau Agent stationed at Cotton Gin, Freestone county, and his orderly, were murdered three miles north of Springfield, Limestone county.

It appears that Captain Culver had some little difficulty with one Wm. Stewart, and this same Stewart claims to have killed both Captain Culver and his orderby, and says they fired on him first; but, strange to say, they were shot with dfferent guns. Captain Culver's head was also severed asunder, done with an axe or some other sharp instrument. There was a large bullet bole through his right breast, and there was no hole in the shirts or vest Captain Culver had on at the time he was killed. It is strange that a large ball should pass through a man's body and not through the clothes he had on at the time. It is a great mystery. Would it not be well for good General Reynolds to have this thing choroughly investigated? The clothes Captain Culver had on are now in the and can be seen by any one. These anysteries are quite common in this part of the State.

Captain Culvet was an active member of the Union League of America, and was to open a Council in Springfield on the night of the 16th, and the rebels of that place had said he should not do it, and they made good their threat.

As soon as I learn further particulars I will write you. There were two freedmen reported to have been killed at Cotton Gin on the leth, and the rebels were disarming the freedmen in Freetone county on the day of the threat to kill Captain Culver.

BANKS, TRUST COMPANIES, SAVINGS INSTITUTIONS, AND INSURANCE COMPANIES.

SEC 82. And be it further enacted, That on and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, there shall be levied, collected, and paid by all banks, trust companies, and savings institutions, and by all fire, marine, life, inland, stock, and mutual insurance companies, under whatever style or name known or called, of the United States or Territories, specially incorporated or existing under general laws, or which may be hereafter in orporated or exist as afore States or Territories, specially incorporated or existing under general laws, or which may be hereafter in orporated or exist as aforeaid, on all dividends in scrip or money thereofter declared due or paid to stockholders, to policy holders, or to depositors, as part of the earnings, profits, or gains of said banks, trust companies, savings institutions, or insurance companies, and on all sums added to their surplus or contingent funds, a duty of three per centum: Provided, That the duties upon the dividends of life insurance companies shall not be decimed due, or to be collected until su hillyflends shall be payable by such companies.
