In an article upon the Wise-Pellard affair, headed "The Southern Gentleman," the Washington Chronicle says:

There is a South, a real South, which has its hold upon our effections. It is the South of our ferefathers; the land of broad savannas, and beautiful mountains and crystal streams; of tropical fruitage and golden persons; the land of Pouse de Leou's fountain of sternal youth; of De Soto's grand discovery of the mouth of the Father of Waters; the land of Pocahontas, of Washington, Jefferson, of the Father of Waters; the land of Pocahontas, of Washington, Jefferson, and Henry; of Sumnter and Marion; the land of romantic traditions and brave memories, renowaed in bettle and in song. It is the South of the Star Spangled Banner, whose warriors were soldiers, not assassins; whose statesmen were gen-tlemen not ruffians. It is the Bouth before it had become brutalized by slavery; before it had abandoned the teachings of the men of '76 of glorious memory.

There is another South, a modern parody upon that ancient and honorable name; a technically organized miscege-nation of pomposity, fisitulence, bravado, and treachery, of which it is difficult to apeak without compromising one's self respect, by merely necessary characteri-sation. It is a compendium of injereprecentations and misnomers. Its assumptions are all the reverse of what they pretend to be. Its high tone is a swagger; its lofty bearing a strut; its chivalry a sham; its honor more thread-bare then that which is said to hold among thieres. It is made up of igno-rance and lying treachery and bravade and hatred of segro. Even its code of bonor has dwindled into a Coreican vendette, and that which would once have been a duel is now an accessination Contempt for human life and human rights and as necessary concomitants stempt for law, society, and public

opinion, are its characteristics.

This new South has furnished the world with a new morality, a new history, a new theology, and a new ethnology, a new corner stone of empire, and a new difinition of that good old word

A regererated South will be a different land from the country described in he above paragraph. New England thrift will root out Southern laziness ad common schools make us a free and intelligent people. Labor raised above the slave level will become honorable, and the chivelry of the plough and the anvil will supercede the chivalry of the gold-headedjeane and bowie-knife. While we acknowledge the truthfullness of the Chronicle's picture, we claim there is another South; differing from the South of the revolutionary fathers only in time, and from the South of the rebellion i all things; a redeemed and regenerated South, a loyal South, which during the horrid years of reliellion suffered more than tongue can speak or history ever tell, for the sake of the old Union. That new South composed of new made freedmen, and loyal white men, is struggling manfully for political existence, holding sloft the old flag of the Union. This is to be a South of freemen; a South of free homes; a Republican South.
