THE CASHMERE GOAT.

No place in America is so well adapted for the Cashmere goat as the high, hilly regions to the northwest of this city. Below we give a letter from an enterprising Illinoisian from Constantinople, who proposes to introduce a flock of full-bloods into Illinois:

EDITORS PRAIRIE FARMER:—I am much pleased to report to you my safe return to this place from a very pleasant and interesting tour through Asia Minor. Although attended with privations, sufferings and peril, I succeeded in visiting the regions and home of the celebrated fleeco-bearing goat, known as "Cashmere," "Angora," "Tittick," "Camlet" and "Camel's hair," and wool-bearing goat, the most beautiful and valuable of the world. I saw thousands of them and learned many interesting facts, which I shall communicate on my return. I purchased 118; 61 bucks and 57 ewes, of the purest and best I could find, and sail on Monday up the Black Sea to visit another region to buy 50 or 75 more, so as to embrace and combine every variety, beauty and quality, for as they constitute the main wealth of those regions, so they can be made highly valuable to our country, adding a new and great source of wealth. It is admitted that this Fleeco, or "Tittick," as called here, is the most beautiful, lustrous and valuable wool in the world, and about 3,000,000 pounds is shipped annually to England and manufactured there by a few houses who have the monopoly, while the balance raised is made up in this country.

There are 1,200,000 to one and a half million of these white wool goats in Asia Minor, producing from 3 to 6 pounds of wool each, netting the people away in the interior from \$3 to \$5 per head profit for fleeco alone, 2,000 miles away from market. They are kept by shepherds in flocks of from 100 to 500 and 800, scarcely ever sheltering, feeding or caring for them save to lead to pasture and water. I am more thoroughly satisfied that our plains and prairies and waste lands will be most admirably adapted, and that we can, with better care and more knowledge, far surpass even Asia.

I gathered many interesting and valuable facts on my journey, which I shall give on my return. Among others the breeding of ewe kids.
I have also collected many valuable seeds for distribution; procured some of the celebrated Angora and silky fleeco cats, rabbits, and shepherd dogs, all white.

Agriculture in this country is most primitive. Original harvesting is still going on and will till fall. The country is full of interest, but lacks development and government. Among other things the Umd Buffalo here would be valuable to Illinois, for work in marshy lands; but the main feature of beauty, interest and wealth, are the goats in the interior, and I predict in not many years we will excel Asia in the Goat.

ISRAEL S. DIEHL,
CONSTANTINOPLE.
Mr. H. O. Morrill, of Baltimore, has constructed a marvelous clock. His extra time for the last fourteen years has been devoted to its perfection. The space necessary to display its capacity and operation is nine feet by eighteen feet. It runs eight days, and performs as follows: It wakes up a household. Strikes the quarters by four automotons on four bells. Sounds the alarm to awaken the master of the house. Lights a lamp, and kindles a fire in the stove. A carriage is seen coming along a mountain road, calls at a place of business, and gets a clock left for repair. The bell is rung to awaken the servant, who rises in presence of the audience, and draws the curtain of her chamber to make her toilet. The carriage is again seen upon the road; when near a rocky covert, a robber springs in front of the horses, and a fight ensues. A farmer by the roadside, not seeing the robber, commences to plow the horses, when a hunter in the distance comprehends the situation, fires his rifle at the robber, who escapes to the mountain, and the carriage, with its inmates, drives on to its destination.

Napoleon wanted his soldiers to see the great exhibition free of charge, or at a reduced rate. The commission refused to make any alterations in the arrangements. To accomplish his ends the Emperor ordered that a detail of soldiers should be made to guard the exhibition, and that the men should be changed every day.

During the recent fair at Sacramento California, the city was said to have been one vast gambling hell. All nationalities and all classes of society entered into the perilous sport with the most utter disregard of everything but how they might become suddenly rich.

NATIONAL BANKS.

It is understood that the Comptroller of the Currency, in his forthcoming annual report, will present some facts bearing upon the relations of the national banks to the Government, which will materially aid in exploding the reckless statements that the Government pays the banks twenty millions per annum for the privilege of issuing their own notes, and others of a like character. Mr. Hulburd has at his command the material facts covering the statistics of the taxation of the national banks, which he will probably present in such a manner as to unseat the eyes of many who are now blindly following the lead of those who seek popularity by denouncing the national system. The truth is that there is no interest in the country which pays so great a proportion of the taxation on the capital invested as the national bank interest.—Wash. Cor. N. Y. Times.

GOOD HAMS.

As the season is at hand for putting up pork, we give the following recipe for the benefit of our hog-raisers:
"After hams have been smoked, take them down, and thoroughly rub the flesh part with molasses, then immediately apply ground or powdered pepper, by sprinkling on as much as will stick to the molasses, when they must be hung up again to dry. Hams treated in this manner will keep perfectly sweet for three years. This must be done before the fly deposits its eggs, for after that is done, nothing will stop their ravages. The above has been practiced in our section for more than twenty years. No soaking is necessary. One pint of molasses and one or two pounds of black pepper is sufficient for any ordinary family. Try this plan, if you want good, sweet hams."—Correspondent of the Rural American.

The Value of Nettles.—Sow and plant nettles, says Mr. X. vier Garene, and all the lands in the South, and the wastes in other parts of France, will be converted into green and profitable fields. He wonders that the world is so slow to learn the great economic value of this robust plant, which will grow everywhere. Raise nettles, and in the young tops thereof you will have a delicious and early vegetable for your dinner table, and abundance of early green food for your cattle. The milk of cows is improved by a diet of nettles, and the beef of cattle fed on nettles is efficacy in restoring broken down horses to vigor. And in commerce their value is great, for they can be treated as hemp, and spun into lines and ropes and woven into cloth. France has grand schemes of planting in contemplation, and it may be that the long neglected nettle will be taken into favor.—Prairie Farmer.

Agriculture in Africa.—The work of recovering the Great Desert of Sahara, in Africa, is steadily going on in Algeria under the patronage of Napoleon III, and is accomplished by boring artesian wells. About one hundred wells are now flowing, reclaiming the desert wherever they are, and making the barren waste bloom into fertile gardens. In the district of Ouled Rir, stretching far southward into the desert there are now thirty-five wells, around which two thousand gardens have been formed, and one hundred and fifty thousand date trees planted. The conquest of the desert is steadily pushed with almost universal success by four military boring brigades, thoroughly equipped and provided with the necessary implements.—E.

Special dispatches to the San Francisco papers say that a fearful tragedy occurred on the day of the recent election at Little Lake, in Mendocino county, California; it appears that a feud had long existed between two families of the names of Coates and Frost, who resided in that vicinity. On the day mentioned several members of each family went to the town armed, and on meeting, the elder Coates fired upon and killed one of the Frosts. The firing at once became general between the families, during which five of the Coates family were killed and three wounded dangerously; while on the other side, Frost was killed and his son in-law, Duncan, was mortally wounded. Not a word was spoken by either party during the affray.

Professor Leone Levi reports the Holy Father anxious to improve the quality of the instruction given to the Roman youth. In the Archibishopric he has established a new professorship of commercial law to explain the code of commerce and the economical questions pertaining to the subject. In the university, fresh extension has been given to the study of mathematics, algebra, and geometry, especially in the form of practical instruction.

THE RECENT TOUR OF THE GENERALS—A MILITARY TELEGRAPH.

The recent tour over the frontier and along our lines of frontier defense by Generals Mason, McCook and Hatch, will be fraught with important changes and improvements in regard to our frontier protection. These gentlemen extended their trip to Buffalo Springs, and made a careful examination of all things connected with our frontier. In their report several important changes will be recommended. The Buffalo Springs Post will be removed to Jacksboro, Belknap to a better location, and Chadbourne to a point on the upper El Paso route, on the head waters of the Concho. This last is a most important change, as it gives protection to this route, now much used by cattle drovers, and which should be used, in the opinion of these military gentlemen, as the mail route. There would certainly be a great economy of troops in this change of the mail route. They will also report in favor of a military telegraph. This of all things is a military necessity. It will be worth a regiment of mounted men, besides its great advantage in keeping the peace of the frontier. This telegraph can be erected for a song, and will be a great piece of economy to the Government. If this military telegraph is one of the results of the tour of the Generals, it can be put down as the most successful campaign ever made on the Texas frontier.

SUING THE CITY.—Some disappointed individuals threaten to sue the city because the city refuses to take city scrip for taxes etc. City scrips are simply drafts upon the city treasury and could just as well have been issued upon the day they were issued if there was no money in the city treasury to meet these as at the present time. But now it is proposed to pay off these warrants or drafts upon the city treasury in a legitimate and honest way, and no honest man can object to it. By the time a person had sued the city and received judgment, the city may be prepared to pay these drafts and the parties would be saved lawyers fees and much annoyance by waiting upon the city. The city has no right to issue scrip as a circulating medium, or to recognize it as money. And there is but one way out of our financial troubles and that is the one adopted by the present city administration. It is an honest and just way, and every good citizen should lend it his hearty support.

The following extract from a speech made by General Sherman, at St. Louis on the 14th ultimo, is published for the special benefit of his rebel friends in these parts:

"How any Southern gentleman, with these facts plain and palpable, everywhere staring him in the face, and recorded forever in the book of history, can still boast of his 'lost cause,' or speak of it in language other than that of shame and sorrow, passes my understanding; and, instead of being reviled, I know that their lost cause will sink deeper into infamy, as time more keenly probes its hidden mysteries, and reveals them to the light of day."

General Q. A. Gilmore was before the Ordinance Committee yesterday for over three hours, and was examined on the subject of the bursting of guns. While conducting the siege of Charleston General Gilmore had abundant opportunity of testing the power of the various guns in use, and his examination yesterday was especially directed to his experience there.

A resolution has been offered in the Tennessee Legislature requesting the Governor to issue a proclamation for the election of a ninth representative in Congress from the State at large, in consequence of the enfranchisement of forty thousand colored voters. It is believed that the resolution will pass, and that the Governor will issue his proclamation, so that the election can take place about the middle of this month.

The Catholic Church in New York City are to subscribe \$100,000 a year toward the erection of the new cathedral on Fifth Avenue until it is completed. The assessments on some of the churches are to be about \$5,000 per annum; on others \$4,000; while the remainder

Greeley on the Austrian Mission. NEW YORK, December 2.—Greeley publishes a card declaring that he has not been officially notified of his appointment as Minister to Austria; therefore he neither accepts nor declines, but don't intend leaving this country pending the Presidential election.

From South America. LISBON, December 2.—The Brazilian Mail reports that the allies attacked the Paraguayans, killing one thousand and capturing two hundred. The allies lost eighty.

A Swindler. CHARLESTON, S. C., November 30.—A swindler, naming himself Coleman, bearing a forged letter of introduction from H. B. Claflin, of New York, obtained six thousand dollars in currency from the First National Bank of Charleston, besides a check for one thousand dollars on the First National Bank of New York, and the Suffolk National Bank of Boston. He decamped last Monday.

Mexican News. SAN FRANCISCO, November 2.—Pescuera is elected Governor of Sonora, confidence is restored; there is a strong movement in Durango in favor of an independent Republic. The Government troops are defeated in all the North-western States, and are expected to join the revolution. Martinez declines the Governorship of Sinaloa; Nunes is nominated.

European News. PARIS, December 1.—Marquis Mounier told the Senate that the stay of French troops in Italy would be brief to insure safety to the people.

The question between the Pope and Italy was one of distrust which conference would remove.

LONDON, December, 1.—The funeral of the Manchester Fenians took place at Cork to-day. The procession numbered eighteen thousand men, fifteen hundred women; several private smaller demonstrations made at Manchester, no disturbance whatever.

The practice which has prevailed with certain parties of using for private purposes envelopes stamped with the signatures of the Government officials is to be terminated by the application of the legal penalties against offenders. Several instances of the violation of the statute have recently been brought to the attention of those officials by the Post Office Department.

PUBLIC ACTS OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

CHAP. CLXIX.—An Act to provide Internal Revenue to support the Government and to pay interest on the Public Debt.

[CONTINUED.]

Sec. 110. And be it further enacted, That every manufacturer or maker of any of the articles or commodities, as aforesaid, or his chief workman, agent, or superintendent, shall at the end of each and every month make and sign a declaration in writing that no such article or commodity, as aforesaid, has, during such preceding month, or time when the last declaration was made, been removed, carried, or sent, or caused, or suffered, or known to have been removed, carried, or sent from the premises of such manufacturer or maker, other than such as have been duly taken account of and charged with the stamp duty, on pain of such manufacturer or maker forfeiting for every refusal or neglect to make such declaration one hundred dollars; and if any such manufacturer or maker, or his chief workman, agent, or superintendent, shall make any false or untrue declaration, such manufacturer or maker, or chief workman, agent, or superintendent, making the same, shall forfeit five hundred dollars.
