DISASTROUS CONFLAGRATION AT INDIANOLA!

Eighty Thousand Dollars' Worth of Property Destroyed!

FOURTEEN BUILDINGS BURNED!

SUPPOSED TO BE THE WORK OF AN INCENDIARY.

From the Indianola Bulletin Extra, Jano nary 3, 1868.]

We hasten to lay before our readers the particulars of a most disastrous conflagration that has just occurred in our city, destroying property to the amount of nearly \$80,000, About 4 o'clock this morning our citi

zens were startled with the cry of fire, and the ringing of bells. The fire originated in the building on Main street belonging to Mr. Dudley Schultz, and oc cupied by Shipley & Co., commission merchants. The wind blowing strongly from the south at the time, it immediately communicated to the adjoining building on the corner, of Messrs, Dove & Shultz, grocers, taking in its flery course the warehouse of Messrs. Dale & Ashworth; the flames, which no human exertions could subdue, then extending to the store and dwelling of John H. Dale, destroying in its curse the large building of W. P. Milby, in which was the auction room of Murdock & Milby, the Courty Clerk's office, and the drug store of David Lewis. The large and beautiful building known as the O. ler House, then took fire, and the entire building with nearly all its con-tents was totally destroyed. The flames then spread to the Custom House on the opposite side of the atreet, which was consumed. The adjoining house was pulled down, which, with the exertions of the citizens, prevented the flames from spreading further. The postoffice, which was also in Lewis' building, was destryed, but we learn that the books and mail

mercial purposes. Much praise is due to the soldiers stationed here for their noble exertions in subcluing the fierce and angry flames that awept from house to house with great rapidity. The sailors of vessels in port also leut a willing hand. Captain Davis, of the schooner Veto, and his mate and crew, rendered efficient sid, and deserve the thanks of the communite.

HOW HANCOCK'S IDEA OF THE Jury question works-Griffin's Jury order disregarded_its result.

Four weeks ago the District Court at Bastrop tried a murderer named Parces. The jury was organized in disregard of the civil rights law; twelve respectable (?) white juriors were empannelled ; the prisoner was charged with the murder of a negro woman ; white witnesses testified that they "saw Barnes put a rope around the woman's neck, and saw him pull on the rope-which was on a tree-until his vietim was suspended by the neck, saw this repeat ed several times, until the weman was dead." A physician testified that he "examined the corps of the woman and found the neck had been broken by violent jerks on a rope." In the face of this testimony, the fary, to the astonishment of almost every one, brought in a verdict of "not guilty."

This same man Barnes is under indictment for several other murders of negroes. Here we have the most outrageous example of the workings of civil law in a State where a large class of its citizens are denied all civil rights.

Such instances of human depravity is almost beyond belief; that twelve citizens could make such a decision, in face of such damning evidence, is startling; the facts however are given us by an eye witness, whose veracity is beyond question, We wish we could deny such horrid charges upon the fame of this fair State.

DISPOSITION OF PAUPERS. -The County and City authorities have combined to take care of the poor and sick of the city. An Almshouse and hospital has been established with ample accommodation for the reception of all thos who are wo thy and desire to take advantage of the charity of the city ; good bods are provided, comfortable quarters, good food and a most excellent and kind Matron to see to the wants of those who are sick or unfortunate. By agreement, all those who desired to be placed upon the pauper list, presented themselves in the County Court rooms to be examined by the city and county physicians, and have their cases passed on. In those cases of women with large families, who work hard for their support, an allowance per month was given, but in all other cases, the parties found worthy of assistance, they were offered a home in the Almshouse; this offer was generally refused and in one case the party became very indignant at being offered a comfortable place, food, clothing and medical attendance. Many of these people have drawn a monthly stipend from 275,50 425.62 the city and county, and with it lived in idleness and filth, even supporting soveral idle bangers on, and the burden to the city and county has been very heavy; the plan now is to aid all in a proper manner and not to pay the taxes of the people for the support of a set of idle spongers. Charity, dispensed by a corporation, must be public and impartial, no distinction can be nade in favor of those who are poor but proud. The prospect is that a great and unjust burden will be lifted from the expenditures of the city and county.

CHAP. CLXXVI.—An Act to establish a uniform System of Bankruptey throughout the United States.

SEC. 21. And be it further enacted. That no creditor proving his debt or claim shell be allowed to maintain any suit at law or in equity therefor against the bankrupt, but shall be dessend to have waived all right of action and suit against the bankrupt, and all proceedings already commenced or unsatisfied jadgments already obtained thereon, shall be deemed to be discharged and surrendered thereby; and no creditor whose debt is proable under this ack shall be allowed to prossecute to final judgment any sait at law or in equity therefor against the bankrupt, until the question of the debtor's discharge shall have been determined; and any such suit or proceedings, shall, a pon the application of the bankrupt, he stayed to await the determination of the court in bankruptey on the question of the discharge, provided there be no unreasonable delay on the part of the bankrupt in endeavoring to obtain his discharge, and provided, also, that if the amount due the creditor is in dispute, the suit, by lieuve of the court in bankruptey, may proceed to hidgment for the purpose of ascertaining the amount due, which ancount may be proved in bankruptey, but execution shall be stayed as aforesaid.
