### NOTES.

Proposals must be to carry the mail with  
celerity, certainty, and security, using the  
terms of the law, and they must be guaranteed  
by two responsible persons, certified to as such  
by a postmaster or judge of court of record.  
No pay will be made for trips not performed,  
and for such of such excursions not satisfactorily  
explained three times the pay of the trip may be  
deducted. For arrivals so far behind time as to  
break connection with departing mails, and  
not sufficiently advanced, one-fourth of the com-  
pensation for the trip is subject to forfeiture.  
Fines will be imposed, unless the delinquency  
be satisfactorily explained, for neglecting to  
take the mail from or into a post office, for suf-  
fering it to be injured, destroyed, robbed, or  
lost; and for refusing, after demand, to convey  
the mail as frequently as the contractor runs, or  
to be concerned in running vehicles on the route.  
The Postmaster General may annul the con-  
tract for disobeying the post office law, or the  
instructions of the Department. He may alter  
the schedule of departures and arrivals, and  
may order an increase of service by allowing  
therefor a pro rata increase on the contract pay.  
He may also curtail or discontinue the service  
in whole or in part, as a pro rata decrease of  
pay, allowing one month's extra compensation  
on the amount of service dispensed with.

## THE CONSERVATIVE OR CONFEDERATE CONVENTION TO BE HELD AT HOUSTON.

The ex C. S. officials, contractors, &c., of Houston, who are mostly office-seekers by profession, have for a long time been restless and uneasy. At last they have become so encouraged by the aspect of political affairs as to venture to call a convention of their sort to meet at that city on the 20th of this month.

Evidently they think that the military order against the reassembling of Hood's brigade and other like rebel organizations, has been set aside. They may be right as to this; still it would be best for them to ascertain the fact in advance by making direct inquiry at Headquarters. That would be the safer course, for it is not altogether impossible that the commanding officer might deem it improper to permit a Confederate organization, no matter by what name, disguised, made up of rebel officers (civil and military), contractors, blockade runners, editors and office-beggars; all of the disfranchised and unrepentant stripe, to meet to concert action against the laws and Government of the United States within the limits of his District.

No officer could well excuse his permitting a convention of the disfranchised to thwart the reconstruction acts, by virtue of which he holds his command. In order to give our readers some idea of what will be the probable material of this proposed Confederate or Conservative convention, we give the names of twelve of the twenty-four persons who called it—stating opposite each, such information as we have been able to glean as to the position they respectively held in the C. S. service, and the class of malcontents they are now supposed to represent:

**F. R. LUBBOCK**—Ex-Governor of the C. S. State of Texas; ex-staff officer of Jeff. D. Now a representative of the rebel auctioneers. Query—As to his people?

**W. F. OLDRAM**—Ex-C. S. Senator; ex-photographer under Maximilian. A representative of the rebel artists of Texas.

**S. W. HENDERSON**—Ex-Captain of a Company of Bankers in the C. S. service. A representative of the "sportsmen" of Texas.

**ANSEL SMITH**—Ex-Doctor, ex-diplomat and ex-C. S. Colonel. Now supposed to represent his original calling.

**GEORGE W. CARTER**—Ex-Clergyman of the M. E. C. (South), and ex-C. S. Colonel. Supposed to represent the malcontent Clergy of his Church.

**J. D. WATERS**—Ex-planter, and ex-donor of whole crops to the cause of the C. S. Supposed to represent the advantages of the "divine institutions."

**JAMES T. BRADY**—Ex-C. S. blockade runner and politician. Now a prominent representative of the privileged class (i. e., the recipients of valuable special grants from the Legislature.)

**P. W. GRAY**—Ex-C. S. fiscal agent. Now a representative of those who by taking office under the C. S. government sacrificed private interest to the public good, and of the owners of real estate in Houston.

**J. R. MORRIS**—Supposed to represent the public debtors of Texas.

**E. W. CAYE**—Ex-exporter of cotton under Magruder. Supposed to represent his partner, the doubly-pardoned E. H. Cushing, of Vermont.

**C. C. GILLESPIE**—Ex-C. S. Colonel and Methodist preacher. Supposed to represent the rebel editors of Texas.

**R. B. DEBRAY**—Ex-G. S. General. Supposed to represent the French holders of U. S. bonds.

This brief and necessary imperfect notice of one-half of the signers of the call, is sufficient. The remaining half consists of men of perhaps equal aspirations but of less note.

When the convention of the disfranchised, called by these office-seekers,

(if indeed it be permitted to assemble), it will present to the world a curious spectacle. It is to be expected that the more hungry of the delegates will be somewhat unruly—rather hard to be kept within bounds. It is essential to the success of the convention that it should keep up appearances, at least for the present. If any impetuous young Confederate from Connecticut or elsewhere North, should assume the lead—should try to out-Herod Herod in the way of being intensely Southern, as is usual with such—he will have to be curbed. The convention must be truly conservative of its real sentiments; or, in other words, must be reticent. It will not do for it to come out too plainly on certain topics. For example, it would be highly imprudent for it to express its convictions just now that the United States Government is only a *de facto* Government; or, to directly assert that the abolition of slavery is unconstitutional. It must proceed with caution, profess devotion to the Constitution, and content itself with making only a mild opposition to colored suffrage. That is enough for a beginning.

A declaration in favor of the restoration of the African slave trade, would be premature. So would be a declaration of the restoration of the Confederate State government, if made prior to the withdrawal of the United States troops. It is conjectured that the convention (if it meets) will nominate General Hancock for the Presidency.

### The Great Negro Insurrection in Virginia.

The Southern press has been circulating horrible stories about armed bands of negroes in Virginia who have threatened "our people with dire vengeance." Below is the *faux* of all the fuss:

Richmond, Va., December 30.—The exaggerated accounts telegraphed from this city relative to an expected rising of the negroes of the south-side counties of the State, have no better foundation than the fact that a few days since a squad of soldiers were sent to Halifax because a disturbance on Christmas was feared. The negro population throughout the State is in a quiet, as far as an armed insurrection is concerned, as they have been since their emancipation. Neither the military headquarters nor the Freedmen's Bureau have been advised of any apprehended trouble.

### TEXAS ITEMS.

The publisher of the Houston Journal was attacked a few nights since by a ruffian in disguise and severely injured, no cause for the attack is assigned.

We have eagerly read this Bulletin to find something to attack. Is Willdon from home?

The Houston Telegraph says: "President Johnson wins."

What an elephant?

Robbers in Houston are getting bold, indeed. By an account in our local columns it will be seen they have invaded the very headquarters of our City Marshal and carried off over a hundred dollars, which had been deposited in the city safe.—Ibid.

**CHOLERA**—The San Antonio papers announce the visitation, in that city, of cholera.—Austin Republican.

We thought we had denied the above assertion some thousand times; read again Major!

**HONORARY NOMINEES**—We are pleased to see the name of Judge Fayle as one of the nominees for the coming constitutional convention. The Judge has ever been a constitutional union man and holds an advanced position among reconstructionists. The other nominee is Mr. Bryant, the unanimous ridicule of the Rebel press of Houston hurled at Mr. Bryant, is all the indorsement he needs.

We are in receipt of the *Dispatch* a fine looking eight page daily paper published in Galveston by a corps of practical printers. All it lacks is a vigorous, fearless, able Radical in charge of its editorial columns.

**CHOLERA**—The Herald falsehoods about cholera continue to return to us from every direction, in our Texas Exchanges and our merchants complain of the wonderful depression in trade.

Democratic Conventions in Indiana and Ohio have endorsed Pendleton for President, denounced negro suffrage, Congress and the National Banks. Hendrick is the candidate for Governor of Indiana.

Nashville, Jan. 9.—Black and white riot at Pulaski; two negroes killed, five wounded; one white severely hurt. Further trouble apprehended.

Grand out Pouring of the Confederate Masses.

MASS MEETING OF THE CONSERVATIVE RADICAL SILENT PARTY.

GREAT ENTHUSIASM DISPLAYED.

The Confederate X Roads all Ablaze.

Go-Between President--Bull-Frog Prompter.

Several Speakers Address the Meeting.

FALSTAFF AND HIS RECRUITS.

Grand Failure to Connect.

EDITORIAL CORPS OF THE EXPRESS PRESENT EN MASSE.

In accordance with the vigorous appeals of the Herald, and several days previous announcement, the Conservative masses assembled in Earl's Hall on Monday evening.

Among the most prominent of our citizens present, were Bob Frinkle, ex-Confederate enrolling officer and professional bar-keep; Juan Barrera, ex-Constable; Nordhouse, ex-Justice of the Peace; Rosenheimer, ex-County Judge; Robt Clement and the Falstaffian hero Colquhoun and also professional Cartoonist for the Radical-secess party, whose capacity for growling and grunting is said to be sufficient for the entire party.

This grand out pouring was organized by motion of the ex-County Judge so squatty, that Dr. Carothers take the Chair upon which the 24 noses voted "I." This individual, Dr. Carothers, came with the vandal Yankees, but finding it profitable sold himself to the rebel party, held office under a rebel city and county administration, was turned out along with his friends and has recently acted as minister plenipotentiary to General Hancock with a petition signed by all the ex-confederates protesting against the action of General Reynolds; here we drop him.

Judge Duncan then rose and said that the only object being the appointment of delegates to the Houston, Conservative Convention; he moved that the Chair be authorized to make the appointments. As this gentleman stood before the meeting our memory went back to the days when meetings were held in the plaza, just in front of Earl's and at which the Judge urged the people to tare down the flag of the Union, and overturn the Government of the United States, he was then a young promising lawyer, he now hobbles about on a wooden memento of the rebellion; of all the men in the room we regarded the Judge as the most consistent champion of the lost cause; he not only urged the people into rebellion but made his words good by fighting for the confederacy, for which he has been rewarded by neglect while sneaking stay-at-homes have been advanced to public places of profit.

Judge Duncan was followed by an old man in a soldier's overcoat who flourished a stick in regular shillalah style, this character who had evidently not been trained to the occasion declared his dissatisfaction with so small a meeting pre-tending to speak for the people of San Antonio this speech was a perfect bombshell as no doubt the whole programme had been settled. So it was agreed to hold another meeting to ratify the candidates.

At this stage of the game the ex-county Judge performed a most graceful solo across the room giving some whispered orders to Judge Duncan, who moved that a committee of two be appointed to assist the President in choosing delegates to the Convention.

The President appointed the ex-county Judge and ex-confederate Brig Gen Young as such committee. General Young rose and gracefully declined the honor asking that his aged and experienced friend Major Colquhoun be put on in his stead, whereupon that falstaffian individual rose to his feet, and growled forth a tirade against politics and politicians, he said he had come there as a looker-on; he had found in

his experience that all politicians were dishonest and only wanted to make money; he didn't care who was on the committee so he was not--he snarled with a rumbling growl--the effect of this speech was spoiled by the second edition of Falstaff rising again and moving that the Chairman be added to the committee, showing that his tirade against politics was merely in keeping with his falstaffian character.

Falstaff was answered by the old irrepressible individual who denounced Falstaff for his speech and said that it was the ignorance of politics which enabled the aristocrats to lead some men by the nose; at this point of his speech the Chairman called him to order and said that no personalities would be allowed in the meeting. The old character flourished his stick and said he did not mean to tread on the Chairman's toes. The meeting then adjourned to meet on Tuesday night.

We were much disappointed at the absence of some of the leading spirits, Devine and others; we were also disappointed in not having an account from the Chairman of his pilgrimage to New Orleans, and the probable time when the ex-rebels are all to be reinstated.

The spirit of Parson Nasby was certainly abroad on the occasion for never were we so forcibly reminded of the "institoot," we almost imagined we saw the "P. M.," in the chair, and Bascom and Deason Program and Joe Bigler, officiating.

We return our thanks to the committee extended to the Express corps.

On motion, Alderman Newcomb, which was adopted, that the Mayor appoint a committee who shall confer with some one or more attorneys in regard to the revision of the city Charter and Ordinances.

On motion, the Board adjourned.
