by the Murder of Congressman  
Hamilton by his crazy son.

**HERCULIAN EFFORTS OF COPPER-  
HEADS TO GAIN A VICTORY!**

### THEIR UTTER DEFEAT.

Gen. John Beatty, the Republican  
candidate for Congress in the VIIIth  
District of Ohio (to fill the vacancy  
caused by the death of Mr. Hamilton),  
was yesterday elected by over one  
thousand majority. Last November  
Gov. Hayes had only 246 majority in  
the District. The result is especially  
gratifying and "auspicious from the  
fact that the Democracy threw their  
whole power, with Andrew Johnson  
at their head, into this first election in  
1868; that they did their utmost to  
get one fact to sustain their noisy  
clamor about Congress being repa-  
diated by the people. Here was a  
test case; it was Congress versus  
Johnson; a Congressman was to be  
chosen; the district was to say the  
least very close, and needed but the  
change of two votes in a hundred  
from last October to give them the  
coveted victory. They canvassed  
the district with great spirit; their  
new Senator (Mr. Thurman) led the  
long list of speaking, among whom  
was not Vallandigham. That they  
confidently looked for victory was  
shown by the outgivings of their  
leading press, of which we quote  
this specimen from The Boston Post,  
Mr. Johnson's special mouthpiece:  
Advice received to night from  
Republican sources in Ohio, indicate  
that Burns (Democrat) will beat Gen.  
Beatty for Congress in the district  
made vacant by the death of Mr.  
Hamilton. This will be the opening  
victory of the campaign. The political  
intelligence from New Hampshire is  
likewise encouraging. The Demo-  
cratic Committee have received infor-  
mation that warrants the belief that  
the Democracy will carry the State.  
Nothing but their own inaction can  
batter them, and the Democrats of that  
State never flattered.  
"This will be the opening victory  
of the campaign." Our friends in  
New Hampshire should accept the  
prophecy, and write down in March  
their indorsement of the glorious  
action of the Ohio VIIIth District.

General Sheridan's removal, which it  
was asserted, before it took place, would  
make him the next President, is much  
more likely to confer that honor upon  
his successor, if General Hancock con-  
tinues to evince the consummate civil  
prudence he has thus far exhibited. It  
did fair to place him among the small  
number from whom the Democratic can-  
didate will be selected, while Sheridan's  
supposed claims have gone into a total  
eclipse. [New York World.]

Detroit has forty-seven churches,  
worth about \$2,000,000.

An actress in Paris, of whom the pub-  
lic were beginning to weary, recently  
had a funeral wreath thrown at her by  
way of a hint.

Dr. Abner Jackson has just returned  
from Europe and assumed the Presiden-  
cy of Trinity College at Hartford.

The work of rebuilding William and  
Mary College will be completed in ses-  
sion for the October session.

Signs observed in the rapids above  
Horseshoe Fall are thought to forbode  
an early downfall of the rock forming  
that magnificent cataract.

Smyrna is shaky. The Impartial, of  
December 14, announces thirty distinct  
earthquakes in as many hours.

Gen. Anderson will preside at a tem-  
perance meeting that is to be held at  
Cooper Institute, New York, on the 23d  
of February.

A gold brick, weighing over eight  
pounds, having a coin value of nearly  
twenty thousand dollars, has been cast  
at Helena, Montana.

There are four hundred and sixty-four  
Penobscot Indians in Maine, and nearly  
five hundred of the Passamaquoddy  
tribe.

The Marsfield Club of Boston dined  
themselves on the anniversary of the  
birth of Daniel Webster.

It is said that a new French loan,  
amounting to 750,000,000 francs will be  
put upon the market soon.

Arizona has been visited by heavy  
rains, and all the low country has been  
flooded. The Indians are quiet.

On the 22d ult., the snow was from  
12 to 24 inches in depth on the railroads  
leading out of Cleveland.

Dr. Bellows writes, December 30,  
that he is just on the point of leaving  
Rome for Egypt and Palestine by way  
of Naples, Messina and Alexandria.

In noticing Capt. Mayne Reid's re-  
cent indignant refusal to read in public,  
a Canadian paper says that he tried it in  
London some years ago, and gave very  
bad reading indeed.

By a recent vote of the City Council,  
of Fremont, Ohio, no show will be li-  
censed until all the councilmen have  
been supplied with family tickets.

London is about to have the trial of  
a clergyman for having relieved the poor  
of a parish not his own. It would seem  
that the offence is not a common one.

In the caverns of Rosenberg (Bohe-  
mia), a large bed of garnets has been  
discovered. The precious stones are of  
considerable size, of several shades in  
color, and of great value.

President Salvate, of Hayti, avows  
his intention of preventing, by force of  
arms, thecession of the Bay of Samana  
to the United States.

Since the raid of the State constable  
on soda and slippery elm, under Col.  
King, many persons originally in favor  
of the office, have taken very little in-  
terest in its continuance.

Tit's Empress Charlotte has renoun-  
ced all her rights as widow of the Em-  
peror Maximilian, and merely reserves her  
private fortune, estimated at £500,  
000.

At a recent execution sale in Lincoln  
county, Tennessee, sixteen bales of good  
cotton sold sixteen cents per pound, and  
sixty barrels of corn in pens, brought  
only sixteen cents per bushel.

The person who recently committed a  
brutal outrage on a Mrs. Brown, in Glen-  
ville, Seneca county, was on Tues-  
day sentenced by Judge London to  
twenty years in the State prison.

A St. Petersburg paper says that the  
new French army bill materially in-  
creases the power of Napoleon, and is  
sure to prompt him to assume a bolder  
tone in regard to European politics.

The Superintendent of the United  
Presbyterian Board of Publication lately  
received from a friend \$4,000, in five-  
twenty bonds, for the purpose of pub-  
lishing the Bible, the Psalms being  
printed in metre.
