

## UNITED STATES. Passed at the Second Session of the Thirty-Seventh Congress.

### TREATIES.

Prealy of Peace, Amity, and Commerce, be-tween the United States of America and Chiua. Concluded, 18th June, 1858. Ratified by the United States, 21st December, 1858. Proclaimed by the President of the United States, 26th January, 1860.

## By the President of the United States of America: A PROCLAMATION.

[CONTINUED.]

Article XVI. Townsge duties shall be poid on every merchant vessel belonging to the United States entering either of the open ports at the rate of four mace per ton of forty cubic feet, if she be over one hundred and fifty tons burden, and one mace per ton of forty cubic feet, if she be of the hurden of one hundred and fifty tens or under, according to the tohnage specified in the register; which, with her other papers, shall, on her arrival be ledged with the consul, who shall report the same to the commissioner of custoss. And if any vessel, having paid toninge duty at one port, shall go to any other port to complete the disposal of her cargo, or, being in ballast, to purchase an entire or full up an incomplete cargo, the consul shall report the same to thet commission of customs, who shall not on the port clearance toms, who shall not on the port clearance that the tunings deties have been paid, and report the circumstances to the co lectors at the other customhouses; in which case, the and vessel shall only pay duty on her cargo, and not be clarged with tenungs duty a second time. The collectors of customs at the open ports shall consult with the consuls arount the erection of beacons or light-houses, and where buops and light-ships should be blaced.

Arti 1: XVII. Citizens of the United States shall be allowed to engage pilots to take their vesse's late port, and, when the lawful duties have all been paid, take them out of port. It shall be lawful for them to hire at port It shall be lawful for them to make plusure servants, compradores, linguists, writers, laborers, acturen, and persons for whatever necessary service, with passage or cargo ever necessary service, with passage or cargo bonts, for a reasonable compensation, to be agreed upon by the parties or determined by the count!

Article XVIII. Whenever merchant ves-sels of the United States shall enter a port, sets of the United States shall enter a port, the collector of customs shall, if he see fit, appoint custom-house officers to guard said vessels, who may live on board the ship or their own boats, at their convenience. The local authorities of the Chinese government shall cause to be apprehended all mutineers or deserters from on board the vessels of the United States in Chin on being informed by the consult and will deliver them up to the consult or other officer for punishment. And if criminals, sugjects of China, take refuge in the houses or on board the vesgels of the United States, they shall not be harbored or concealed, but shall be delivered up to justice on due requisition by the Chinese local officers, addressed to those of the United States. It individual of dither nation commit act of violence or disorder use arms to the injury of others, or create disturbances endangering life, the officers of the two governments will exert themselves to enforce order and to maintain the public peace, by doing impartial instict in the premises.

Article XIX. Whenever a merchant vessel belonging to the United States shall cast anchor meither of the said ports, the angereargo, master, or consigues, shall, within forty eight hours, doposit the ship's papers'in the hands of the consul or person charged with his functions, who shall cause to be communicated to the superintendent of customs a true report of the name and tomage of such vessel, the number of her crew, and the matter, super argo, or consigues, if he proceed to discharge the cargo without such permit, shall locur a fine of five bunded dailars, and the gow's so discharged without permit shall his su'ject to forfeiture to the Chinese government. But if a master of any vessel in port desire to discharge a part only of the cargo, it shall be lawful for him to do so, pay government. Or, if the master so desire, he may, within forty-eight hours after the arrival of the vessel, but not later, decide to depart without breaking bulk; in which case he shall not be subject bulk; in which case he shall not be subject to pay tonsage or other duties or charges until, on his arrival at abother port, he shall proceed to discharge cargo, when he shall pay the dates on ressel and cargo, according to law: And the tonnage duties shall be held due after the expirati n of the sail forty-right hours. In case of the absence of the conset or per on charged with his function, the a pitch or supreage of the vessel may

consult or per on clasrged with his function, the a ptain or supervarge of the vessel may have recourse to the consul of a friendly power, or, if he please, directly to the amperintendent of customs, who shall do all that is required to conduct the ship's business.

Article XX. The amperintendent of customs, in order to the collection of the proper duties, shall, on application made to him through the consult appoint suitable officers, who shall proceed, in the presence of the captain, supercarge, or consignee, to make a just und fair examination of all goods in the act of being discharged for importation or laden for expertation on board and merchanivessel of the United States. And if disputes accur in regard to the value of goods subject to ad valorem duty, or in regard to the amount of tare, and the same cannot be rafficatorily arranged by the parties, the question may, within twenty-four hours, and not afterward, be referred to the said consulto allust with the apperintendent of customs.

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Article XXI. Foreign grain or rice brought isto any port of Chine in a ship of the United States, and not landed, may be re-exported without bindranes.

Article XXII. The tomage duty on vessels of United States shall be paid on their being admitted to entry. Duties of import shall be peid on the discharge of the goods, and duties of export on the lading of the same. When all such duties shall have been paid, and not before, the collector of customs shall give a port ricarance, and the consuls shall return the ship's papers. The duties shall be said to the shrolls authorized by the Chinese government to receive the same. Duties shall be paid and received, either in type elliver or in foreign money, at the raiof the day. If the consul permits a ship to leave the port before the duties and tounage dues are paid he shall be held responsible therefor.

Article XXIII. When good on board any nerchant vessel of the United States in port merchant vessel of the United States in port require to be transhipped to another vessel, wpplication shall be made to the consul, who shall certify what is the occasion therefor to the superintendent of customs, who may appoint officers to examine into the facts and permit the transhipped without written permits they shall be applied to be forfeited to the Chinese revenues.

Article XXIV. Where there are debts due by subjects of China to citizens or the United States, the latter may seek redress in laws and, on suitable representations being made to the local authorities, through the consul, they will cause due examination in the prees, and take proper steps to compel satis-tion, And if citizens of the United States mises, and take proper steps to compel stin-faction. And if citizens of the United States be indebted to subjects of China, the latter may seek redress by regressortation through the consul, or by suit in the consular court; but noither government will hold itself respon-sible for such debts.
