**OUR GALVESTON LETTER.**  
**Governor Pease and General Hancock—On Ditts—Flake's Bulletin and Judge Hamilton—Items and Weather.**

GALVESTON, Texas, Feb. 2, 1868.  
*Editors of the San Antonio Express:*  
Governor Pease in his recent calm, unimpassioned and able letter, setting forth so clearly and truthfully the evils resultant from the policy of General Hancock in turning over to the civil authorities for punishment and safe-keeping the desperadoes and cut-throats of this State, whose lawlessness and outrages have culminated in the murder of so many Unionists and good citizens, has gained the attention of the whole country to the deplorable and unhealthy condition of affairs here. The Governor's letter will have the immediate effect of obtaining from Congress prompt remedial action for the strong tendency to anarchy now existent in Texas, besides proving the necessity for an immediate change of commandant in the Fifth Military District. Ere this letter is published General Sheridan may be on his way hither. It is said that General Hancock did not see or hear of Governor Pease's letter till he had arrived at Brenham, en route for New Orleans. The Conservatives here state that General Hancock disapproved in strong terms of the course of Governor Pease, and threatened that on his (the General's) arrival at New Orleans he would "cook the Governor's hash"—whatever this may mean. How much truth there may be in the foregoing remark attributed to General H., I know not; I merely give the *en ditte* current here among our Conservative *quidnuncs* about the subject.

Flake's Bulletin, with a vindictiveness—not to say shamelessness and utter want of journalistic honor—characteristic of the narrow mind and bigoted and acrid temperament of a man whose sole object in life is money-getting—whose god is mammon and whose aspirations seem to be to deserve for his journal the merited epithet of "the Texas Police Gazette"—attacks in a leading editorial in this morning's issue, Judge Hamilton, in an infamous manner—alleging that Judge H. delivered a speech at the Union League on Friday night last, entirely at variance with the one uttered at the Mark House on the previous week; and that he, (Flake) fired with zeal for an outraged community and an incensed public, had the unbounded impudence to send a special courier to the temporary residence of Judge H., and then and there did demand of that gentleman, with broad, unblushing boldness, the truthfulness or falshood of the aforementioned allegation. Wherefore Judge Hamilton very justly replied to the fellow that it was none of Mr. Flake's business; thus closing an interview with an individual who possessed neither common sense or common courtesy. Mr. Flake becomes very indignant at the rebuff given his reportorial representative, and thereupon strikes wildly at the Loyal League and Judge Hamilton, being neither choice in his grammar or English.

In defense of Judge Hamilton from Flake's vituperative abuse and misstatements your correspondent need only say this—that Judge Hamilton delivered to the Union League on Friday night, last a speech entirely in consonance with one uttered on a previous occasion in this city, and satisfactory to every Union man assembled therein. On Saturday, (yesterday), while ill and indisposed, suffering from a cold and sore throat, Judge Hamilton was visited at his rooms in the City Hotel (not Island City House—error (?) No. 1 of Mr. Flake) by a German-looking gentleman, who stated, with the air of a man about to present a bill, past due, that he was sent by Mr. Flake to find out whether he (Judge H.) had delivered a speech at the Loyal League the previous night, and if so, whether he had made use of certain language attributed to him, or not? For a moment the Judge was astounded at the fellow's impudence and assurance; then replying, sternly, that

he desired the man to tell Mr. Flake that it was none of his business (not damned error (?) No. 2 of Mr. Flake) what he said in the League; and that it certainly was not respectful or gentlemanly on Mr. Flake's part to thus obtrude in matters which did not concern him. This, then, is the substance of what took place between Governor Hamilton and Mr. Flake's representative, wherefor the former was particularly attacked in the Bulletin—about which there can be but one opinion on the part of all fair-minded men, that Mr. Flake has overstepped the bounds of decent journalism, and has acted very much, on the whole, like an exceedingly long eared animal. One thing more, and I am done. Poor W.—who probably penned the article for the Bulletin on Judge Hamilton—was seen reclining home late on Saturday evening in that unfortunate condition—the bane of so many other wise good men.

## REBEL GROANS.

Our withering attacks upon the rebels are bringing them to one of their old tricks. They are sneaking around among Union men and deprecating "personalities," they advise respectable loyalists to use their influence in changing the tone of the Express. It is not because of their sense of decency, they make these appeals, but they are beaten; they feel it, and it makes them cry out. They smile over a rebel triumph, but write under our teeth. We do not use our gaul and wormwood because we like it, but because "we must fight the devil with fire." Union men will remember how, at the outbreak of the rebellion, these same subtle wire workers came to them, when Union men were in the majority here, and advised "for God's sake keep quiet, do nothing nor say nothing that will bring on bloodshed. As soon as Devine was on the bench and Sweet had organized his murderers, the scene changed; our throats were gripped. We were ground under the heel of these tyrants, every valley was watered and every hill side was saturated with the blood of our relatives. We take all such advice as gratuitous, weakening powders. If any traitor or weak kneed trimmer asks us to meekly fold our hands, while they are being tied by these murderers, we propose to show them the force of opposition. It will be remembered that, while Devine was in Mexico, the tone of this paper was dignified and moderate, because ex-rebels showed no disposition at that time to wish to regain their ascendancy; as soon as this arch-traitor set his foot in Bexar county the strife commenced, and while they keep up their infamous machinations, we will continue our attacks. The question is, shall three or four men, who imprisoned our relatives, borrowed our gold and compelled us to take worthless Confederate money in return, hung our citizens—we ask, shall they brow-beat the whole community, compel us to consider them respectable? We answer, No, not as long as the stars and stripes defend a free press.

## By Telegraph.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.]

WASHINGTON, February 7.—Mr. Thornton, the accredited Minister from England, was presented to-day. His speech to the President is complimentary and cordial, without pointed allusion to the questions pending between the two countries.

The question of impeachment being called, discussion was resumed. This discussion is becoming quite serious.

MEMPHIS, February 7.—Great excitement exists here on account of the failure of the Gayoso Savings Bank, which was the depository for working people. A party pursued the Cashier with a rope, but failed to find him. Another officer was shot at.

WASHINGTON, February 7.—Dickens visited the President to-day.

The Southern Railroad Committee reported the amount expended on the roads while held, to be \$45,000,000, exclusive of labor. The value of the property sold to the various roads amounted to \$7,000,000; remaining unpaid January 1st, \$5,000,000. The total value of the property restored to the railroads is \$78,000,000.

There was a full meeting of the Cabinet to-day, except McCulloch and Stanton.

The Customs receipts, ending the 30th ultimo, is \$10,000,000.

The Revenue receipts to-day is \$249,000.

The Postoffice Department has ordered the transmission of mails to and from Washington and New Orleans via Louisville.

LONDON, February 7.—Later Abyssinian advices are discouraging, forbidding the hope of a successful move this season.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., February 7.—The Insane Asylum was burned to-day. Four females, inmates, were burned to death.

NEW YORK, February 5.—Gold closed at 142.

PARIS, February 7.—The Monitor says: "The King of Prussia, on receiving the new Italian Minister at Berlin, congratulated him on his appointment as a new pledge of peace."

FLORENCE, February 7.—The Pope has ordered that *Te Deum* be sung throughout Italy for the victory at Montesa. Victor Emanuel forbids it.

A riot is reported at Padua.

The London Times admits that the arrest of George Francis Train was a mistake, but should be distinguished

from the arrests of ex-Irishmen who come to Ireland for treasonable purposes.

NEW ORLEANS, February 7.—In Special Order No. 27, dated yesterday, General Hancock, for the more complete and efficient protection of the northern frontiers of Texas, orders the establishment of four new Military Posts, to be named Forts Concho, Griffin, Richardson, and Burnham, subject to the approval of the Secretary of War. General Hancock ordered work on them pushed forward as rapidly as possible by the Quartermaster's Department, until completed. Colton active; sales 8,500 bales at 18 to 18 1/2.

WINFIELD SCOTT HANCOCK, Major General, &c. New Orleans, Feb. 9, '68.

HORN'S PARTNER IN PRISON.—This morning, at an early hour, Carothers, the Conservative candidate for Convention, was arrested under a military order against carrying deadly weapons. GEO. PEABODY'S SCHOOL FUND.

The Commissioners having charge of the two millions of dollars given to establish schools in the Southern States by the philanthropist whose name heads this article, are now in the South seeking favorable localities and public-spirited communities in which to plant the seed of learning, that it may expand and spread away over the land in order that posterity may gather the fruits of education as they drop from minds ripened through the beneficence of Mr. Peabody.

We hear of another instance of traitorous proscription, in this instance perpetrated by a well known professional man of our city, who drove off—without paying we are told—a colored man in his employ who had the independence to vote according to his convictions of right, and of course against the infamous rebel crew who again seeks to enslave not only him, but the poor of all nationalities, passing labor laws that takes away the rights of the working man.
