Winter unusually severe-The pos suffering Gloomy prospects ahead for that class-The Government criticised, de., de.

Panis, 17th January, 1868. Sin :- Such a severe frost as that which has prevailed here during the first week of January, has not yet been experienced by the juvenile portion of our population, and even by grown up persons. The river Seine, ice bound and covered with snow, has been literally a nine days wonder. The thaw has however now set in, to the great satisfaction of the poor, who are unfortunately very numerous this year.

Although up to the present time the distress in the ranks of the working class in Paris has not assumed an alarmir g aspect, it must be born in mind that we have hardly, as yet, reached mid winter, and that many causes conbine to throw a gloom over the prospects of the new opened year. Very doleful accounts arrive daily from the north, centre and south of France. Industry and commerce are paralized by the uncertainty in which we are kept with regard to the political situation of Europe and the consequence is, that in all the principal manufacturing towns, numbers of working men are out of employment. It is not only at Lyons, Nantes and Toulouse that the authorities are besieged by hungry and shivering crowds, but also at Bordeaux, Lille, Auxerre and Limoges, besides other places; the relieving officers have been obliged to take exce; tional measures of precau tion. At Paris i self, the administration of the Assistance publique has just received from government a sum 400,000 fe's for the relief of the poor, but yet has great difficulty in fulfill-

ing its mission. Notwithstanding these prognostications of threatened misery, several of the official and semi-official journals of Paris, on the occasion of the new year, have been expatiating on the satisfactory condition of France. as compared with most of her neighthe French people, accustomed as Gounard's, called "Au Nountemps." they are by their government to leave to it the care of their nearest and dearest interests, be equal to the emergency ?-that is the question,

and a very doubtful one it is. It has become a bye word, that the Emperor's government has no policy, or rather, that it has on every questien two policies, contradicting each other. Incredible as this assertion may appear, a glance at the home and foreign policy of the French government, for several years past, will suffice to prove its exactitude. And such is the moment chosen by the government to give a striking instance of its contempt for the liberty of the press; at one " fell swoop," eleven of the leading journals of Paris, amongst others the Constitutionel the Journal des Debats and the Siècle are cited before the tribunal of correction for having published a summary of the debates of the Corps Legislatif! Whilst on the other hand the government's disregard to the right of the public is shown almost every day by the illegal arrests practised on respectable and inoffensive citizens, who ussuspecting, but curious, are led by chance into a crowd and there fall under the claw of a Constable. The other night twenty-six persons were thus arrested, and they spent forty hours in a filty dungeon, with thieves and vagabonds, without fire or food. Their only offence had been that of watching some boys sliding on the ice in one of the public squares. In America, in England or in any other civilized country, justice would be done to a respectable citizen thus illegally arrested and ill used by the police; but here no such thing,-the Sergent de Ville or policeman, is practically infallible and unimpeachable

The restrictions affecting trade in 'pium, cash, grain, pulse, sulphur, brimstone, saltpetre, and speiter, are relaxed under the followinh conditions:

1. Opium will henceforth pay thirty thelaper pecul import duty. The importer will
sell it only at the port. It will be carried
into the interior by Chinese only, and only as
Chinese property; the foreign trader will not
be allowed to accompany it. The provisions
of the treaty of Tientsin, conferring privileges by virtue of the most favored clame, so
far as respects citizens of the United States
going into the interior to trade or paying
transit duties, shall not extend to the article
of opium, the transit duties on which will be
arranged as the Chinese Government see fit;
nor in future revisions of the tariff is the same

2 Codper cash.—The export of cash to any foreign port is prohibited; but it shall be lawful for citizens of the United States to ship it at one of the open ports of China to another on compliance with the following regulation: The shipper shall give notice of the amount of cash he desires to ship, and the port of its destination, and shall bind himself, either by a bond with two sufficient sureties, or by depositing such other recurity as may be deemed by the customs satisfactory, to return, within six mouths from the date of clearance, to the collector at the port of shipment, the certificate is used by him, with an acknowledgment thereon of the receipt of cash at the port of destination by the collector at that port, who shall therete affix his seal; or, failing the production of the certificate, to forfeit a sum equal in value to the cash shipped.

Cash will pay no duty inwards or outwards but a freight, or part freight of cash, though no other cargo be on board, will render the vessel carrying it liable to tonnage dus s.

3. The expert of rice and sil other grans whatsoever, native or foreign, no matter where grown or whence imported, to any fereign port, is prohibited; but these commodities may be carried by citizens of the United States from one of the open ports of China to another, under the same conditions in respect to security as cash, on payment at the port of shipment of the duty specified in the tariff.

Saltpelre, sulphur, brimstone, and spelter, being deemed by the Chinese to be monitions of war, shall not be imported by citizens of the United States save at the requision of the Chinese Severnment, or for sale to Chinese duly anthorized to purchase them. No permit to lard them shall be is ned until the customs have proof, that the necessary authority has been given to the purchaser. It shall not be lawful for citizens of the Urf.ed States to carry these commodities up the Yang-tes Kiang, or into any port other than those open on the sea-board, nor to accompany them into tae interior on bothsif of Chinese. They must be sold at the ports only, and except at the ports, they will be regarded

as Chinese property.

Infractions of the conditions, as above set forth, under which trade in opium, cash,grain, pulae, sulphur, brimstone, saltpetre, and spoiter may be henceforward carried on, will be punishable by confiscation of all the goods who give it their unanimous and unqualifier concerned.
