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THE LAST DAY.—On the last day of the election we publish the glorious news that our party is triumphing at Washington, and the last anchor of rebel hope—Gen. Hancock—has encountered a gale, and ere this is read, the immovable Grant has undoubtedly swept him away from his temporary throne, and made his idle dreams of the "White House" mere visions of the past.

While our friends at a distance are shaping the destinies of the nation. We, each individual of us, have a mission to fulfill, and we should spring to the work, ere it is too late. Our triumph is not sure, the battle is not won, until the contest is over. We have selected our Generals and placed them in the front ranks; shall we desert them now and leave them to the enemy!

REBEL INFAMY.—The champions of treason have circulated the report in the country that a riot exists in San Antonio and that the town is in the hands of ruffians who are killing all negroes who come in. This is preventing many from coming to the polls. We must rally our full strength in town by all hazards.

Good News.—The Drummer of the rebel clique, yesterday morning, stepped into a room where Horra's partner was, and announced: "good news! good news! Castroville is voting the Degner and Fischer ticket." Horra's partner very naturally remarked that "I'd like to know what good that will do me."

PERSONAL.—We regret to announce that Judge I. A. Paschal is pronounced beyond recovery by his physicians, and his brother, Judge George Paschal, of New York, has been telegraphed to come on.

HERALD EXTRA.—All during the dark and bloody days of the rebellion, when Union men were hunted down for their opinions and murdered for their loyalty, the Herald issued extra after extra, to bolster up the drooping spirits of the rebels; all of which were infamous lies. But the people were not deceived, nor will they be now, when they see such ridiculous handbills as were plastered over the city on yesterday morning, about the success of the rebels in Wilson.

BITING THEMSELVES.—The traitors are as mad as wounded rattle-snakes and unable to hurt anybody else, have turned to biting themselves. They snap and bite and foam at the mouth all to no purpose—they are beaten badly.

WILSON COUNTY.—This county is heard from, two of our citizens having returned from there yesterday, where they have been rallying the loyal forces. The county stood over sixty majority, Radical.

ONE MORE VOTE FOR THE UNION.—Let every man who prizes the right of being an American citizen, and who has not voted, vote the Republican ticket to-day.

THE GERMANS TO THE RESCUE.—Today is the last day of the election and every German, who has not voted and who holds a certificate of registration, should not fail to come forward and administer a rebuke to the Devine party by voting the Republican ticket.

WILSON COUNTY.—The vote in Wilson county stood 65 Republicans, 21 "White man," at 2 o'clock p. m., yesterday.

The vote stood 895 in Bexar, last night, 200 being rebel, the probabilities are that 1,200 will be the full poll of the county out of 1620 registered. So far the Republicans are ahead without counting the negro vote.

DEVINE, SWEET & Co. would die of joy if the Germans refused to vote. We would rather they would bite themselves to death because the Germans voted the Republican ticket.

SCENE IN A JUSTICE COURT.—Yesterday, (Thursday), King, the revamped rebel Justice of the Peace, through whom the rebels are attempting to wreak vengeance upon the loyal city officers, rendered a decision against Captain Payne for arresting the rebel cat-a-paw, Horn's partner, Old Charley King, haggard from long and persistent dissipation, rested his head upon his hand, and read off his decision, which had undoubtedly been furnished by some one of the rebel Judges. Carothers stood by enjoying the only triumph he will have during his impudent attempt to present himself as a candidate before the loyal people of Texas. Half a dozen hard-visaged rebels were also in attendance to see the matter executed; and a few loyal men were on hand to render any aid needed to Captain Payne, who has been selected as a victim to rebel spite. We learn that General Mason also appeared before this miserable farce of a Court of Justice, to give his evidence. King's Court is now the inquisition before which loyal men are to be tried. How long is it to be tolerated!

REBEL TRICK.—The Devine clique attempted an imitation of the Union ticket by getting some sickly yellow paper and illustrating their tickets. One of the tickets marked "for the Convention," has a portrait of the murderer Duff holding a horn in his hand, which is intended to convince all skeptics that they are running Horn's partner as a candidate. Just above Duff a scaffold is erected with persons hanging, on top of which stands big-mouth Sweet, with arms extended, remarking, "only three days in the circus."

The ticket "Against a Convention," is representing Devine holding a hoop covered with paper, before a mud hole (democracy), and little Fischer turning a summersault through the hoop into said mud; above the hoop is Major Brahan.

WHAT ARGUMENTS HAVE THEY USED? We call the attention of all honest men to the arguments used by the rebel-Carothers-Devine party to deceive the people and gain votes. First, that it was the question of negro suffrage the people had to vote on; second, that the Union men wanted the negroes to rule the white men. Then came a string of mean, contemptible prosecutions against the Mayor and his police for political effect. Then all sorts of printed lies and split tickets, and miserable tricks to deceive the ignorant. The prejudices of the Catholics were worked upon. And to frighten the loyal black man, he was discharged from employment. Not one manly word had been said from this revamped traitor party.

THE GRAVE YARD LIE.—The Devine-Carothers party started a lie among the Mexicans that the present city administration wanted to persecute the Catholics by refusing to bury paupers in the Catholic Cemetery. The administration is simply carrying out an ordinance which has been in existence for more than ten years. They would invade even the grave of a pauper for a falsehood to use against the Union party.

WON'T VOTE.—The rebels of Wilson county say they won't vote as long as the "nigger" votes. Then they will never vote.
