LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.
Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[Public-No. 4.] An Acr to provide for the exemption of

cotton from internal tax. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of Ameri-ca in Congress assembled. That all cotton grown in the United States after the year eighteen hundred and sixty-seven shall be exempt from internal tax; and cotton imported from foreign countries on and after November first, eighteen bundred and sixty-eight, shall be exempt

from duty. Approved, February 3, 1868.

[Public-No. 5.]

An Acr to suspend further reduction of the currency.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That from and after the passage of this act the authority of the Secretary of the Treasury to make any reduction of the currency, by retir-ing or cancelling United States notes, shall be, and is kereby suspended; but nothing herein contained shall prevent the cancellation and destruction of mutilated United States notes and the replacing of the same with notes of the same character and amount.

SCHUYLER COLFAX, Speaker of the House of Representa-B. F. WADE,

President of the Senate pro tempore Endorsed by the President: "Received January 23, 1868."

NOTE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE. -The foregoing act having been pre-sented to the President of the United States for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the House of Congress in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the United States, has become a law without his approval.]

[Public Resolution No. 8.] JOINT RESOLUTION to provide for a commission to examine and report on

meters for distilled spirits.

Resolved by the Scutte and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That a commission to consist of five persons, to be appointed by the Scotterary of the Treasury. hereby created, whose duty it shall be, in consection with the existing commission of the Academy of Science, to carefully examine all meters and mechanical contrivances or inventions that may be presented to them, intended to measure, test, and ascertain the productiveness of grain, or other articles prepared for disgress the result of their examination with such recommendation as they may deem expedient and most to the interest of the Government, on or before the

first of March next. SEC. 2. And be it further resolved, That pending the action of said commission, and until their report be made and a meter shall be by law adopted; all work on the construction of meters, under the direction of the Treasury Depart-And in the meantime no further contract for meters shall be made by the ecretary of the Treasury under the fifteenth section of the act entitled "An act to amend existing laws relating to internal revenue, and for other purposes," approved March second, eighteen

hundred and sixty seven.
SEC. 3. And be it resolved, That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized and directed to pay, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise copriated, the expenses incident to earrying out of this joint resolution and also a reasonable compensation for the services of such of the said commissioners as are not now officers of the United States or members of the said

[Public Res Lution-No. 9.] JOINT RESOLUTION providing for the sale Be it resolved by the Senate and House

of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy be, and is hereby, authorized to dispose of such iron-clad vessels, except those of the "Dictator," "Kalamazoo," "Monadnock," and "Passaic" classes, as is his judgment are not required by the interests of the service, at a price to be determined by appraisal, to be made by a board of not less than five naval officer, two of whom

shall be engineers; and report shall be made to Congress, as fast as said vessels are sold, of the amounts realized from such sales, and the parties to whom sold: Provided, That after such appraisal, public notice shall be given that proposals will be received for thirty days for the purchase of said vessels; and that the highest so proposed, being not less than the appraisal, shall be accepted: And provided further, That the proceeds of all such sales shall be paid into the treasury of the United States.

### INDIANS-MEDINA COUNTY.

A gentleman writing to us from Ca troville under date of February 15th says: "Indians are very plenty and on the increase at last accounts. On Thurs. day last, five were seen in New Fountain, one mounted and the other four on foot; they were within a few yards of the Church throwing their lances in the air and having a grand play. There has been no cessation of Indian hostilities for the past six weeks; they have been once in Castroville and from the number seen, the stock killed and stolen at various points it is almost certain that they have never been out of the county during the whole period mentioned."

This statement was sent to us accompanied by the following remarks by Judge Noonan:

"Shooks" statement respecting the Indians does not give a clear or full idea of their terril·le ravages. I presume, however, what he says will suffice, as the Government persists in the policy that there are no Indians, and that the people on the frontier, tell of these things for pastime merely—that their stories and representations are totally devoid of truth. Upon no other hypothesis can our military operations be explained. If the Government will send our citizens Spencers, each Indian killed will not cost Gillespie county, and in Kendall all the a million of dollars."

It is high time Congress did something for our bleeding frontier. A few weeks since we sent forward a petition. from the people of Gillespie, representing the condition of their section which has been duly laid before Gen. Grant. We hope soon to hear of some efficient plan for the protection of the Texas frontier.

## Hancock's Order in Regard to Election Returns.

The order of Gen. Hancock requiring one of the Board of Registrars to convey the returns to New Orleans, shows one of two things, either great ignorance of the country and condition of our people, or a desire to defeat the bolding of a Convention. His requiring a man with a return of fifty votes from the frontier of Texas to take them to New Orleans at a cost of at least \$200 to the Government is a criminal expenditure of the public money. This order will cost the Government at least fifteen thousand dollars, when the work might have been just as well done for fifteen dollars, Several of the Registrare are on their way to New Orleans, and the prospect is that the order will be complied with. But any counties failing to send forward by hand, should be relieved by special order and even proxies for registrars allowed. We hope Gen. Hancock will see this grievous error and correct it immediately so that reconstruction be not defeated.

### Medina County.

Glorious Medina, banner county of the State; your martyrs did not perish on the tree in vain. The result of the election in Medina astonishes no one but the Devine gang. A tremendous effort 1411. was made by the "white man's" party to earry Medina. Carotherse in company with the astute local of the Herald, hearing that Degener and Newcomb intended to speak to the people of Medina, procured a vehicle and reached the battle ground in advance. Carothers made a speech in reply to Newcomb and Degener and took especial pains to rake up Newcomb's Know-Nothing record and compare it with his own Democratio record. Circulars printed in the German appealing to the Germans to vote against the "negro party," were circulated. The result is two votes for Carothers and Fischer. Loyal men of Medina, with the ruthless Indian at their doors they have not forgotten their duty to the Union.

## Karnes County.

The result of the election in Karnes county gives as hope that it may yet be redeemed from its bad character, and that the Express has not worked in vain for its redemption to good order and loyalty. The Republican candidate received thirty-six votes, being twentythree majority over his opponents, and the Convention received forty-three votes. When we consider that no man has dared to publicly advocate the Republican cause in that county, this is a glerious result, and we hope the Union men of Karnes will organize and keep victory in their power.

Article X. Should one of the high contracting parties bereatter impose discriminating duties upon the products of any other nation, the other party shall be at liberty to determine the manuer of cetablishing the origin of iss own products intenped to enter the country by which the discriminating duties, are introduced.

Article XI. When any vossel of either party shall be wreeked, stranded. or otherwise damaged on the coasts, or within the jurisdiction of the other, their respective eltizens shall receive as well for themselves as for their vessels and effects the same assistance which would be due to the inhabitants of the country where the accident hat mad, and they shall be liable to pay the same charges and dues of salvage as the said inhabitants would be liable to pay in a like case.

If the repairs which a stranded vessel may require shall sender it necessary that the whole or any part of her carge should be unloaded, no duties of rustom, charges, or fees on such carge as may be carried away shall be paid, except such as are payable in like case by national vessels.

It is understood nevertheless that if, while the vessel is under repair, the case shall be paided and zent in a place of deposit

Instructions to City Assessor.

The following instructions drawn up by a committee of the city Conneil were adopted by the Council at its regular meeting on Monday night last, for the guidance of the Asser

Instructions concerning the Assessment of Tax on real estate in the limits of the city of San Antonio.

Insamuch as a large revenue has been lost to the city through the failure of Assessors to exercise due vigilance in the assessment of the tax on real estate, the following instructions for the taking of the assessment for the present year are hereby issued to the city Assessor, to wit:

1st. In assessing property which has been rented out in 1867 or any part thereof, or which is rented during the time of taking the assessment, the average amount per annum of such rent shall be considered as being equal to 12 per cent. interest of the real market value of such property. For instance: B's property was rented for \$100 per month or \$1200 per annum; the value of such property then would be \$10,000, a capital of \$10,000 at 12 per cent in-

2nd. Property which has not been rented during any of the period before mentioned, will be assessed on its prescommences to flow; frames for the ent marked value. In making assessments of this class of property the Assessor will take in consideration the location of such property, if in the heart the property consists of a building, its age, state and condition, and also the probable amount of rent such building could produce. Article XXIII. When the ships-of-war of the two contracting parties or those belonging to their citizens which are armed in war shad be admitted to enter with their prizes the ports of eitheir of the two parties, the said public or private ships, as well as their prizes, shall not be obliged to pay any duty either to the officers of the place, the judges, or any others; nor shall such prizes, when they come to sad enter the ports of either party, be arrested or soized, nor shall the officers of the place make examination concerning the lawfulness of such prizes, but they may hoist sail at any time and depart and earry their prizes to the places expressed in their commissions, which the commanders of such ships-of-war shall be obliged to show. It is understood, however, that the privileges proceeds It is understood, however, that the privi-leges conferred by this article shall not ex-tend beyond those allowed by law or by trea-ty with the most favored nations.

Article XXIV. It shall not be lawful for any foreign priviteers who have commissions

Treaty between the United States of America and the King of Hauver, concerning the Abolition of the Stade or Brunshausen Dues. Cocheded November 6, 1861. Katifications by the President of the United States June 17, 1862.

By the President of the United States of America: A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas a special Treaty between the United States of America, and his Majesty the King of Hanver, concerning the abolities of the Stade or Brunshausen Dues, was concluded and signed by their respects of Pienipotentiaries at Berlin, on the sixth day of November last, which treaty is word for ward as follows:

Special Trenty concerning the Abolition of the Stade or Brunshausen Dues.

The United States of America and his Majesty the King of Hanover, equally animated by the desire to increase and facilitate therelations of commerce and navigation between the two countries, have resolved to conclude a special treaty, to the end to free the bavigation of the Eibe from the folls known under the designation of the Stade or Brunshausen dues, and have for that purpose conferred full powers: the President of the United States of America upon Mr. Norman B. Judd, Envoy E. traordinary and Minister Pleuipotentiary of the United States of America to Prassia, and his Majesty the King of Hancver upon his Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Pleuipotentiary at the Boyal Prassian Court, the Lieuten ut Colonel and Extraordinary Aide de-Camp, Mr. August Withelm Von Reitzenstein, Knight Commander of the second class of the Royal Guelphic Order, etc., who, after having exchanged their full powers, and having found them to be in due and preper form, have concluded the following articles:
