UNION REPUBLICAN MEET-ING OF INDIANOLA.

Pursuant to a call, the Union voters of the city of Indianola met at the Court House on the evening of the 25th of January, 1868, and at 8 o'clock was called to order by A. Murdock, when G. W. Volk was appointed President and C. W. Hartup Secretary of the meeting. On motion a committee of five were appointed to draft resolutions and nominate candidates for the coming Convention. The following were ap-pointed a committee: W. Westhoff, A. Murdock, C. Kleinecke, C. F. Vollers, and R. M. Stevens, who reported the

following, which was unanimously adopted by the meeting:

Resolved, 1. That we consider the Constitution of Texas of the year 1845 the best guide for framing a new Consti-tution, provided that all parts thereof not unconditionally and strictly in ac-cordance with the reconstruction laws as passed by Congress be stricken out and replaced by provisions as required

by the reconstruction acts. 2. As the future welfare of our State as far as the morality of the population and the ability of self management is concerned, depends chiefly upon educaon, hitherto so deplorable neglected, we think it indispensable that the constitution provide for the immediate eatablishment of public schools throughout the State, wherefore the funds to be raised by appropriation and the sale of

public lands. 3. That it is impossible to develop the resources of our State without railronds, and as the thinly populated porsuch with their own means we also consider it becessary to apprepriate and sell part of the State lands to raise funds for the construction of railroads and

other public improvements.

4. As experience shows that States like ours cannot prosper without the influx of people from abroad, we deem it necessary to promote immigration by offering to the immigrants material sid, as well as the rights and benefits of citizenship within the shortest possible time. The necessary funds should be raised by taxing the unoccupied lands in the hands of private parties, or if that should not be sufficient, by selling part of the State domain to the U. S. G. verument.

5. As history teaches that consequen-ces most serious and disastrons to civilization and prosperity arise from quarrels of religious factions, backed by the civil laws; we deem it of vital importance that the Constitution should once for all deny the legislative body the right ever to pass any laws concerning the religious

and social life of the people of Texas.

6 As we do not doubt but that the foregoing resolutions will meet the ap-proval of the majority of coters here as-sembled, and as we know the men who Johnson, of Calboun Co, as condidates for the Convention from this District! and earnestly ask the co operation of all Union voters therein.

THE ELECTION.

INDIANS.

We have received a communication from the Board of Registration in Llane County, confirming all the horrible details heretofore published of the Indian outrages and murders in that section. We have published from time to time accounts of depredations on the frontier every few weeks during the past two years, and they have been denied by those whose duty it was to protect our defenseless pioneers. As we have been told to our face by men in authority that our Indian stories were mere tricks of frontiersmen to get troops among them, we know them to have been sincere in their belief, and that belief has gone in official reports to Washington where they have counteracted statements and petitions forwarded from this office and other sources to the proper authorities asking for relief.

One of the Registrars is absent on duty in the work of reconstruction, be leaves his family at home in comfort, happiness, and apparent security; in three short days he is summoned home to see his hopes blasted and his dear ones gone; a fond wife is outraged a thousand times worse than death by these fiends and then after being scalped and flayed alive, has her brains beat out with

J. S. Friend left home to go to mill during his absence his house was surrounded by these yellow devils, his wife shot then mutilated and scalped while alive. Two Mrs. Johnsons, Miss Townsend-just in the bloom of girlhoodand four children are taken captives The surviving relatives follow in dreamy heart-broken hopes of finding their dear ones. The bodies of the two younger Johnson children were found within four miles of their home, so horribly mutifated as to be nurecognizable save by remnant of clothes left them by their murderers. A little further on the in nocent Miss Townsend is represented by an indiscribable mass of flesh, tied in a position that the fiends could satisfy their brutal lusts, after which her brains were beaten out with rocks and her body otherwise mutilated in a heart rending manner. Mr. Smith an old man of seventy winters, and Jacob Hoffman another citizen are victims in the wake of these marauders.

The people yet remain in suspence as to the fate of the remaining captives. A perfect reign of terror exists throughout the frontier counties, the citizens are made paupers by the robberies, friendless by the murders, and homeless by the torch of these Indians who find an asylum on Mexican soil where they retreat to divide the spoils and recuperate for new expeditions.

The Indians never come to this region in large bodies. We have pointed out a method by which our frontier could be made safe beyond a peradven-

The commission appointed to investigate and report upon the best method of defense have recommended a plan similar ar to the one advocated by the Express with some practical improvements. A farther delay on the part of the Government is worse than criminal; and we hope those who have herstofore treated the reports of Indian depredations with contempt will make speedy reperat tion, by calling the attention of the an thorities to our necessities.

Treaty between the United States of America and the King of Hanover, concerning the Abolition of the State or Brutchangen Dues. Cocleded November 6, 1861. Ratifications by the President of the United States June 17, 1862.

Treaty between the United States of America and the Republic of Mexico for the Extradition of Uniminals. Concluded at Mexico, December 11, 1861. Ratifications exchanged at Mexico, May 20, 1862. Proclaimed by the President of the United States, June 20, 1862.

By the President of the United States of America: A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas a Treaty between the United States of America, and the Republic of Mexico, for the extradition of criminals, was concluded and signed at the city of Mexico, on the cleverth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty one, which treaty, as amended by the Senate of the United States, and being in the English and Spanish languages, is, word for word, as follows:
