UNION REPUBLICAN MEETING OF INDIANOLA.
Pursuant to a call, the Union voters of the city of Indianola met at the Court House on the evening of the 25th of January, 1868, and at 8 o'clock was called to order by A. Murdock, when G. W. Volk was appointed President and C. W. Hartup Secretary of the meeting. On motion a committee of five were appointed to draft resolutions and nominate candidates for the coming Convention. The following were appointed a committee: W. Westhoff, A. Murdock, C. Kleinecke, C. F. Yollers, and R. M. Stevens, who reported the following, which was unanimously adopted by the meeting:
Resolved, 1. That we consider the Constitution of Texas of the year 1845 the best guide for framing a new Constitution, provided that all parts thereof not unconditionally and strictly in accordance with the reconstruction laws as passed by Congress be stricken out and replaced by provisions as required by the reconstruction acts.
2. As the future welfare of our State as far as the morality of the population and the ability of self management is concerned, depends chiefly upon education, hitherto so deplorably neglected, we think it indisposible that the constitution provide for the immediate establishment of public schools throughout the State, wherefore the funds to be raised by appropriation and the sale of public lands.
3. That it is impossible to develop the resources of our State without railroads, and as the thinly populated portions of the State are unable to build such with their own means we also consider it necessary to appropriate and sell part of the State lands to raise funds for the construction of railroads and other public improvements.
4. As experience shows that States like ours cannot prosper without the influx of people from abroad, we deem it necessary to promote immigration by offering to the immigrants material aid, as well as the rights and benefits of citizenship within the shortest possible time. The necessary funds should be raised by taxing the unoccupied lands in the hands of private parties, or if that should not be sufficient, by selling part of the State domain to the U. S. Government.
5. As history teaches that consequences most serious and disastrous to civilization and prosperity arise from quarrels of religious factions, backed by the civil laws; we deem it of vital importance that the Constitution should once for all deny the legislative body the right ever to pass any laws concerning the religious and social life of the people of Texas.
6. As we do not doubt but that the foregoing resolutions will meet the approval of the majority of voters here assembled, and as we know the men who are willing to act accordingly, we here with announce the names of Wm. M. Varnell, of Jackson Co., and Sam. M. Johnson, of Calhoun Co., as candidates for the Convention from this District and earnestly ask the co-operation of all Union voters therein.

Some wooden flower pots at New Springfield, Staten Island, were set on fire a few days ago by the concentration of the sun's rays through some fish globes, which were standing within local range.

Moses S. Beach retires from the management of the New York Sun in favor of Charles A. Dana, announcing the fact in a graceful valedictory. He still retains proprietary interest. For more than thirty years he has enjoyed control of the paper.

Democracy in Kentucky.
The Louisville Sentinel is an organ of the Democracy, and exercises not only a local influence in Kentucky, but in Southern Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, and also in Missouri and Tennessee. It upholds the ancient banner, and the immutable principles of the party. Its epithets are as forcible as those of Brick Pomeroy, or the Chicago Times. "Hell hounds" is the favorite epithet for Republican members of Congress; General Grant is referred to as "that miserable relic of a butcher's shop." It has a great fondness for Pendleton, who, next to Breckenridge, is, perhaps, the most acceptable man to the Democracy of Kentucky, whose principles are asserted by the Sentinel in ten fundamental truths, three of which read as follows:

"5. That armed coercion of any of the States is not warranted in the power to suppress internal rebellion; but that such act is usurpation of power, dangerous to the liberties of the people of the States attempting it, as of those warred upon; that it is an indefensible invasion of sovereignty, without excuse or pretext of law.
"6. That the General Government has power to suppress insurrections and rebellions within a State or extending through States, at the request of the government of a State; but that any and every attempt to render the action of States, in their sovereign capacity, (no matter what that action), as insurrectionary and rebellious, is a base usurpation of power and an infringement of the organic law.
"7. That war settles no question of right, but solely of numerical strength; that the Union, notwithstanding the result of the late war, is inviolable, if the States so proclaim it; or they are united, if through their sovereign pleasure, they desire to be united."

As a corollary to these truths the Sentinel keeps standing at the head of its columns the following motto:
"Respect of the Constitution, Exact Justice, Equal Taxation and Representation, Civil Government only, White Supremacy—
"OR ANOTHER FIGHT!"

The Sentinel bristles with fervid appeals to the Democracy to arm, of which the following are specimens:
"War is not a pleasant thing to contemplate; but war is preferable to slavery. One or the other, Democrats of the Constitution, you must choose.
"Democrats must prepare to fight! Democrats must fight!
"The people must rise in their power, and hurl the whole devil-breeding crew back into perdition!
"Every man must do his duty!
Every patriot must stand ready! Every rusty gun must be cleaned!
"Pray to God, if you will, to change the hearts of the scoundrels in power; but don't fail to mould bullets!"

A Romantic Story.
The St. Louis Republican tells the following:
During "Price's raid" in 1864, a skirmish took place on the line of Charleston and Howard Counties, some four miles from Glasgow, in which one of the rebels was left on the ground dangerously wounded in the neck. While in this condition, Miss Sarah J. Smith, a school teacher in the vicinity, happened to pass by. Seeing the wounded man, she went to him and staunch his wounds, probably saved his life. She remained with him until near nightfall, when he requested her to leave, as his companions would probably come in the night and take him away. If not, she would find him where he was in the morning, living or dead. He said he was known by the name of Tucker, but that his real name was H. C. McDonald, and that he was from Louisville, Ky. Next morning McDonald was gone, and Miss Smith knew nothing concerning him afterward. A few days ago, says the Glasgow Times, Miss Smith (who still resides in the neighborhood) received a letter from the administrator of H. C. McDonald, Sr., informing her that she was named in the will of the deceased as the legatee of \$50,000, in consideration of her having saved the life of his nephew and only heir, the H. C. McDonald named in connection with the incident of 1864.
