the Tenure of certain Civil Offices.

Be it enacted by the Senats and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That any person holding any civil office to which he has been appointed by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and any person who shall I creafter be appointed to any such office, and shall become duly qualified to act therein, is, and shall be entitled to hold such office until a successor shall have been in like manner appointed and duly qualified, except as herein otherwise povided: Provided, That the Secretaries of State, of the Treasury, of War, of the of State, of the Treasury, of War, of the Navy, and of the Interior, the Postmaster-General, and the Attorney-General, shall hold their offices respectively and during the term of the President by whom they may have been appointed and for one month thereafter, subject to removal by and with the sovice and consent of the

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, than any ever yet discoursed upon in San Antonio.

Or shull hold or exercise or altempt to hold or exercise, any such office or employment, he shall be deemed, and is bereby declared to be, guilty of a highuisdemeanor, and, upon trial and con-viction thereof, he shall be punished therefor by a fine not exceeding ten thon-and dollars, or by imprisonment not ex-ceeding five years, or both said punish-ments, in the discretion of the court.

TREATIES.

Treaty between the United States and Great Britain for the Suppression of the Slave Trade. Concluded at Washington. April 7, 1862. Ratifications exchanged at Lon-don, May 25, 1862. Proclaimed by the President of the United States, June 7,

By the President of the United States of America: A PROCLAMATION.

[CONTINUED.]

The United States of American and her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, being desirous to reader more effectual the means hitherto adopted for the suppression of the slave trade carried ou apon the coast of Africa, have deemed it expedient to conclude a treaty for that purpose, and have named as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

The President of its United States of America William it. Suward, Secretary of State;

And her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the right honorable Bichard Bickerton Pemell, Lord Lyons, a peer of her United Kingdom, a knight grand cross of her most honorable Order of its "ath, and her Envoy Extraordinary ond Minister Pienipotentiary to the United States of America;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following articles:

Article I. The two high contracting parties mutually consent that those ships of their respective maries which shall be provided with special instructions for that purpose, as hereinafter mentioned, may visit such merchant vosses of the two nations as may, upon reasonable grounds, he suspected of being engaged in the African slave trade, or of having, during the voyage on which they we ing engaged in the African slave trade, or of having heen fitted out for that purpose; or of having, during the voyage on which they are met by the said crisers, been engaged in the African slave trade, contrary to the provi-sions of this treaty; and that such cruisers may d tain, and send or carry away, such vessels, in order that they may be brought to trial in the manner bereinafter agreed

In order to fix the reciprocal right of search in such a manner as shall be adapted to the attainment of the object of this treaty, and at the same time avoid doubts, disputes, and complants, the said right of search shall be understood in the manner and according to the rules followings.

First. It shall never be exercised except by vessels of war, authorized expressly for that object, according to the stipulations of this treaty.

this treaty. Secondly. The right of search shall in no case be exercised with respect to a vessel of the navy of either of the two Powers, but shall be exercised only as regards merchant-vessels; and it shall not be exercised by a vessel of war of either contracting party within the limits of a settlement or port, nor within the territorial waters of the other party.

Thirdly. Whenever a merchant-vessel is searched by a ship of war, the commander of the said ship shall, in the act of so doing, exhibit to the commander of the merchant vessel the special instructions by which he is duly authorized to search; and shall deliver to such commander a certificate, signed by himself, stating his rank in the naval service of his count, y, and the name of the vessel has been meded in the African slave trade, or is fitted up for the said trade. When the search is made by an officer of the cruiser who is not the commander, such officer shall exhibit to the captain of the merchant-vessel a copy of she before mentioned special instructions, signed by the commander of the cruise; and he shall in like manner deliver a certificate signed by the commander by whose orders he proceeds to make the search. Ponrthly. It is further mutually agreed that the commanders of the ships of the two navies, respectively, who shall be employed on this service, shall adhere strictly to the exact tener of the aforesaid instructions.

Article III. As the two preceeding articles are entirely reciprocal, the two high sontracting parties engage mutually to make good any lesses which their respectias subjects or citizeens may incur by an arbitrary and illegal dentition of their vessels; it being understood that this indemnity shall be borne by the Government whose cruiser shall have been guilty of such arbitrary and illegal detention; and that the search and detention of vessels specified in the first article of this treaty shall be effected only by ships which may form part of the two savies, respectively, and by such of those ships only as are provision with the special instructions annexed to the present treaty, in pursuance of the provisions thereof. The indemnification for the damages of which this article treats shall be paid within the lerm of one year, reckoning from the day in which the mixed court of justice pronounces its sentence.

Article IV. Is order to bring to adjudication with as little delay and inconvenience as possoble, the vessels which may be detained according to the tenor of the first article of this treaty, there shall be established, as soon as may be practicable, three mixed courts of justice, formed by an equal number of individuals of the two nations, named for this purpose by their respective Government. These courts shall reside one at fight a Leone, one at the Cape of Good Hepe, and one at New York.

But each of the two high contracting parties reserves to itself the right of changing, at its pleasure, the the place of residence of the court or courts held within its own tearitories.

These courts shall judge the causes submitted to them according to the provisions of the present treaty, and according to the regulations and instructions which are contended to the present treaty, and which are contended.

Acticle V. In case the commanding officer of any of the ships of the naves of either country, duly commissioned according to the provisions of the first article of this treaty, shall deviate in any respect from the stipulations of the said treaty, or from the instructions of the said treaty, or from the instructions annexed to it, the Government which shall conceive itself to be wrouged thereby shall be entitled to demand reportation; and shall conceive itself to be wronged thereby shall be entitled to demand reparation; and in such case the Governmen to which such commanding officer may belong binds itself to cause inquiry to be made into the subject of the complaint, and to inflict upon the said officer a punishment preportioned to any wilful transgression which he may be proved to have committed.

For the purpose, the two high contracting parties agree that, in so far as it may not be attended with grievous expense and inconvenience, the master and crew of any versel which may be condemed by a sentence of one of the mixed courts of justice, as well as any other persons found on board the vessel, shall be sent and delivered up the jurisdiction of the nation under whose fig the condemned vessel was sailing at the time of capture; and that the witnesses and proofs necessary to establish the guilt of such master, crew, or other persons, shall also be sent with them.

The same course shall be nursued with regard to subjects or citizens of either contracting party who may be condemned by a cruiser of the other on board a vessel of any thirp Power, or on board a vessel calling without flag or papers, which may be condemned by any competent court for having engaged in the African slave trade.

Article X. The negroes who are found on board of a vessel condemned by the mixed courts of justice, in cenformity with the stipulations of this treaty, shall be placed at the dipp at of the Government whose cruiser, has made the capture; they shall be immediately set at liberty, and shall remain free, the Government to whom they have been delivered garrentying their liberty.
