LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[Public-No. 6.] An acr in relation to taxing shares in national banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of Ameri-ca in Congress assembled. That the words "place where the bank is located, and not elsewhere," in section forty-one of the "act to provide a national currency," approved June third, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, shall be construed and held to mean the State within which the bank is located; and the Legislature of each State may determine and direct the manner and place of taxing all the shares of national banks located within said State, subject to the restriction that the taxation shall not be at a greater rate than assessed upon other moneyed capital in the hands of individual citizens of such State: And provided always, That the shares of any national bank owned by non-residents of any State shall be taxed in the city or town where said bank is located, and not elsewhere. Approved, February 10, 1868.

[NOTE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE. -The foregoing act having been pre-sented to the President of the United States for his approval, and not having been retuined by him to the House of Congress in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the United States, has become a law without his approval.]

The nevs contained in our telegraphic columns from the Express Extra, of the 26th, is of the most startling importance to the country, and excites the most profound solicitation of well wi hers of the country for the sequel. Calm deliberation on the part of our statesmen, is necessary in the prosesution of the charges against the President, and every thing like rassion or prejudice must be sa redly kept out of the proceedings- The issue before the country has been avoided by the Congress of the United States, and until absolutely forced to do so, they have refused to take action against the President.

The sea before Congress is chartless, within the history of the world there is no precedent where a Chief Magistrate has been deposed for the good of the nation over whom he presided. Maligned and traduced upon all sides by the demagogues and disappointed men who have flocked to the standard of Johnson; the representatives of the people in Congress assembled, have sought to The issues thus sought to be avoided are new. Johnson has resorted to measures that have had the effect to try the tendons-to their utmost strength-of every provision of the Constitution. Provisions that have appeared irrelevent and mere verbage heretofore, now, under the efforts of Johnson to subvert the presiden. tial robes to personal ends, stand forth like letters of gold, and as safeguards around the people in time of peril, have fully proven the wisdom yea, inspiration of our fore-fathers who penned and framed these sacred tulwarks of liberty now enjoyed by their decendants of the third general

Excitement is dead.

The New York Tribune urges impeachment. The World scoffs at it. The Herald opposes the movement as generally absurd and disastrons to materia interests. The Times holds that the President is entitled to a decision from the Courts, holding that the impeachment of the President is wholly out of place, so long as the constitutionality of this Tenure-of-Office bill is in controversy. It is purely a question of the interpretation of the Constitution, and should be decided alone by the Supreme Court, the controversy being between two Departments, peither of which can decide the law itself.

The Times adds: Suppose House should impeach the President and the Senate should convict and depose him from office for having actually violated the law, and the Supreme Court should afterwards, in the due course of its Judicial action, decide the law to be constitutional, what would be the position of the President and Senate before the country? Must the President be punished for maintaining the authority of the Constitution against an invalid law, or is the Senate's judgment of Constitution to overrale that of the Supreme Court?

Whereas the people inhabiting that postion of Virginia known as West Virginia did, by a Convention assembled in the city of Wheeling on the twenty-sixth of November, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, frame fog themselves a Constitution with a view of becoming a seperate and independent State; and whereas at a general election held in the counties composing the territory aforesaid on the third day of May last, the said Constitution was approved and adopted by the qualified voters of the proposed State; and whereas the Legislature of Viginia, by an act passed on the Chirteenth day of May, eighteen burdred and sixty-two, did give its consent to the formation of a ness State within the jurisdiction of the said State of Virginia, to be known by the name of West Virginia, and to embrace the following named counties, to-wit: Hancock, Brooke, Ohio Marshall, Wetzel, Martin, Monongalia, Preston, Taylor, Tyler, Wool, Jackson, Wirt, Roane, Calhoun, Commer, Barbour, Tucker, Lewis, Bravion, Limanur, Randolph, Mason, Putuam, Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Cabell, Wayne, Boone, Logar, Wyoming, Mercer, McDowill, Webster, Pocahontas, Fayette, Raleigh, Gremibrier, Mourroe, Peudleton, Hardy, Hampshire, and Morroe, Peudleton, Hardy, Hampshire, and Morroe.

That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Interior to contract with the managers of superintendent of a suitable prison in some convenient State for the imprisonment and subsistence and proper employment of all prisoners who shall be convicted in said court of such offences, on the best terms that he can; and he shall, on or before the first day or each term of the triminal Court of the District of Columbia, inform said court in writing of the designation and location of the prison in which he shall have made provision for the confinement and support of prisoners; and said court shall sentence all persons who shall, during said term, be convicted of spek offences, to confinement at hard labor in the prison so designated.

CHAP. XI.—An Act making Appropriations for the Support of the Military Academy for the Year ending the thirtieth of June, eighteen hundred and sixty foor.

That the following sums be, at the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the Treesury not otherwise appropriated, for the support of the Military Academy for the year ending the thictieth of June, eighteen hundred and sixty-fourt.

For commutation of subsistence, five hundred and forty-s ven dollars and fifty cents. For pay in lies of clothing to officers' serv-ants, three thousand six ha dred and seven-ty-three dollars and fifty cents.
