OFFICIAL.

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES,
Passed at the Second Session of the
Fortieth Congress.

[PUBLIC—No. 6.]

AN ACT in relation to taxing shares in national banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled: That the words "place where the bank is located, and not elsewhere," in section forty-one of the "act to provide a national currency," approved June third, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, shall be construed and held to mean the State within which the bank is located; and the Legislature of each State may determine and direct the manner and place of taxing all the shares of national banks located within said State, subject to the restriction that the taxation shall not be at a greater rate than assessed upon other moneyed capital in the hands of individual citizens of such State: And provided always, That the shares of any national bank owned by non-residents of any State shall be taxed in the city or town where said bank is located, and not elsewhere. Approved, February 10, 1868.

[PUBLIC—No. 7.]

AN ACT making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the execution of the reconstruction laws; and for the service of the Quartermaster's Department of the Government, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1868, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the following sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the objects hereinafter expressed for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, namely:

To provide for the expenses of carrying into effect the "Act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States;" for the first military district, the sum of fifty thousand dollars; for the second military district, the sum of one hundred and ten thousand dollars; for the third military district, the sum of ninety-seven thousand dollars; for the fourth military district, the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and for the fifth military district, the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; making in all the sum of six hundred and fifty-seven thousand dollars.

To supply deficiencies in the service of the Quartermaster's Department, to wit: For regular supplies, three million five hundred thousand dollars.

For incidental expenses, seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

For the purchase of cavalry and artillery horses, four hundred thousand dollars.

For transportation of the army, seven million three hundred and fifty thousand dollars; making in all the sum of twelve million dollars.

Office of the Chief of Engineers: To supply deficiencies in the office of the Chief of Engineers, for blank books, stationery, and miscellaneous items, two thousand dollars.

Building corner of F and Seventeenth streets: To supply deficiency for fuel, compensation of fireman, and miscellaneous items, eight thousand dollars.

LEGISLATIVE.
For increased compensation to Congressional printer, to June thirty eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, one thousand and three hundred and forty-four dollars and forty-five cents.

To supply a deficiency in the contingent expenses of the House of Representatives for the present fiscal year, the following sums, namely: For stationery, fifteen thousand dollars; Provided, That from and after the third day of March, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, no Senator or Representative shall receive any newspapers except the Congressional Globe, or stationery, or communication therefor, exceeding one hundred and twenty-five dollars for any one session of Congress.

For furniture, repairs, and packing boxes for members, twenty thousand dollars.

For miscellaneous items, fifteen thousand dollars.

For folding documents, including materials, fifty thousand dollars.

For newspapers, twelve thousand five hundred dollars.

To supply a deficiency in the contingent expense of the Senate for the present fiscal year, namely, For clerks to committees, and pages, horses, and carriages, thirty-three thousand eight hundred and four dollars.

For additional messengers and laborers, fifteen thousand dollars.

JUDICIARY.

For salary of the marshal of the Supreme Court of the United States, from April third, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, to June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, at thirty-five hundred dollars per annum, four thousand three hundred and fifty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.
For amount required for salary of Commissioner, to March thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, one hundred and fifty-two dollars.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That so much of the first section of the act of March third, eighteen hundred and nine, entitled "An act further to amend the several acts for the establishment and regulation of the Treasury, War, and Navy Departments," as authorizes the President, on the application of the Secretary of any department, to transfer the moneys appropriated for a particular branch of that department to another branch of expenditure in the same department be, and the same is hereby, repealed; and all acts or parts of acts authorizing such transfers of appropriations be and the same are hereby repealed, and no money appropriated for one purpose shall hereafter be used for any other purpose than that for which it is appropriated.

[NOTE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE.—The foregoing act having been presented to the President of the United States for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the House of Congress in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the United States, has become a law without his approval.]

DISABILITIES—HOW TO REMEDY THEM.

The following communication was received by a prominent gentleman of this State, in reply to applications of persons thoroughly and unquestionably reconstructed, who were so much identified with the rebellion as to disqualify them as citizens under the various reconstruction laws and other acts punishing treason.

All loyal men who are under the ben of these laws, should at once prepare their applications for relief and forward them to members of the State Convent on from their respective Districts:

DEAR SIR:—In reply to your letter of the 30th ultimo, which has been referred by General Schenck to this office, we desire to say that the condition of the gentlemen to whom you allude is similar to that of hundreds in each State. The Congressional majority will at the earliest moment consistent with national interests, be glad to relieve them of their disabilities. In the meanwhile, the best method of obtaining such relief is to faithfully work for reconstruction as your friends are now doing, and patiently bear the temporary disability that the circumstances have forced upon them. Would it not be advisable that all applications for such removal, before being sent on here, should first receive the endorsement of the Constitutional Convention in each State?

IMPEACHMENT EXCITEMENT.

The news contained in our telegraphic columns from the Express Extra, of the 26th, is of the most startling importance to the country, and excites the most profound solicitation of well-wishers of the country for the sequel.

The news before Congress is chartless, within the history of the world there is no precedent where a Chief Magistrate has been deposed for the good of the nation over whom he presided.

The result is not a mere matter of conjecture; the safety of the nation is firmly in the hands of Congress, and the General of the Armies being not only honest, but, like Mr. Lincoln, inspired with republican simplicity, the triumph of the nation over the errors—to use no harsher term—of Mr. Johnson, are as certain as the setting of the sun.

The impeachment of Johnson will establish a precedent. In future a dishonest man to the Presidential chair, will, when principle fails to guide him, look back and see that a rod is over him which

can be used to bar dishonesty when attempted against the interest of the people. Even if a law of Congress is unconstitutional, if passed by a constitutional majority, the President must execute it; the Court alone can express an opinion as to its validity.

The Situation.—Our public affairs are at present nearer a solid and permanent settlement, upon a lawful foundation, than at any time since the death of Mr. Lincoln.

A dishonest and anti-republican President is at last out of the way, and reconstruction can now proceed without interruption.

Boerne, Kendall County.

Johnson presented to the Senate for Impeachment.

Senate appointed Committee to Examine Charges!

GUNS FIRED IN HONOR OF IMPEACHMENT.

Excitement subsided in Washington.

WASHINGTON, February 24.—The House session cut up into speeches of from 3 to 20 minutes; Emergency speeches generally explaining predetermining votes.

Impeachment resolutions passed by a strict party vote except Stewart of New York and Long of Ohio, who voted with the Democrats.

A committee was announced to Senate from the House relative to impeachment, consisting of Stevens and Bingham. The committee to prepare articles of impeachment, consisting of Boutwell, Stevens, Bingham, Wilson, Logan, Julian and Ward, has power to send for persons and papers, after which, House adjourned.

A most profound silence followed the announcement of the vote.

Stanton to day said he wished reporters would let him alone. Day closed with Stanton dining in War Department. The President at dinner, and Thomas at his home and everything quiet.

The President, is reported as saying, that he recognizes no one but Thomas as Secretary of War and meant to recognize no one else. He concluded his interview saying that God and the American people would make all things right and save our institutions.

The President appends to his message the nomination of Ewing as Secretary of War, asserting that he has not and does not intend violating the Tenure of Office bill, or any other law, and argues elaborately his rights even under that law to remove Stanton and appoint an ad interim Secretary.

The following are telegraphic specimens of to-days speeches:

Mr. Payne, of Ohio, had the floor, and said: I yield two minutes to the gentleman from Indiana, Mr. Schenck.

Mr. Schenck said: Mr. Speaker—My opinion is that in the emergency this House should speak but one word and strike but one blow, and I desire that blow should come first. I am tired, sir, of this protracted discussion, which postpones an hour what the people have long desired to see, the official death of Andrew Johnson, and I think we should vote his impeachment without delay. I am not surprised that he who commenced his career in drunkenness, should end it in crime.

It is stated that McCulloch will not

recognize Mr. Stanton's official requisitions.

Excitement is dead. The New York Tribune urges impeachment. The World scoffs at it. The Herald opposes the movement as generally absurd and disastrous to material interests. The Times holds that the President is entitled to a decision from the Courts, holding that the impeachment of the President is wholly out of place, so long as the constitutionality of this Tenure-of-Office bill is in controversy.

The Times adds: Suppose House should impeach the President and the Senate should convict and depose him from office for having actually violated the law, and the Supreme Court should afterwards, in the due course of its judicial action, decide the law to be constitutional, what would be the position of the President and Senate before the country? Must the President be punished for maintaining the authority of the Constitution against an invalid law, or is the Senate's judgment of Constitution to overrule that of the Supreme Court?

Washington, Feb. 25.—Reception at White House last night was remarkable for unusual crowd, absence of Radical officials and presence of foreign representation. Radicals in several localities fired guns in honor of House impeachment resolutions.

Paris, Feb. 25.—In Corps Legislatif, Havin, editor of the Siecle, persisted in reading a document which the President ruled out of order, the President declared sitting dissolved. Government members withdrew; liberals were forcibly expelled and the gas extinguished.

Washington, Feb. 25.—A special sent northwards, says, Grant in connection with Wilson, said officers of the army are a unit in support of Congress, not more than a dozen out of 2500 would obey an order from the President, unless it came through him, on reading of dispatches from Gen. Geo. H. Thomas declining Bvt Lt. Generalship, Grant remarked, just what I expected from Thomas, he is a good soldier.

WASHINGTON, February 25.—House.—Stevens and Bingham reported that they had performed the duty of informing the Senate of the impeachment resolutions.

A resolution was adopted that the report of the impeachment article, be devoted one day and then voted on, without debate or dilatory motions.

The impeachment and reconstruction committees were allowed to sit during the session; adjourned.

Senate.—At noon the clerk of House announced the passage of the impeachment resolutions.

Stevens and Bingham, committee, received.

Stevens said, Mr. President in obedience to the order of the House of Representatives we appear before you and in the name of the House of Representatives and of the people of the United States, do impeach the President of the United States for high crimes and misdemeanors in office and we further inform the Senate that the House of Representatives, will in due time exhibit particular articles of impeachment against him and make good the same and in their name we demand that the Senate take order for the appearance of said Andrew Johnson to answer said impeachment.

Ward said that the Senate will take order in the premises.

A special committee consisting of Howard, Trumbull, Morton, Conklin, Edmunds, Pomeroy, and Johnson has been appointed to examine into impeachment and report proceedings.

The Administration has abandoned the quo warranto against Stanton, as proceedings against Thomas to-morrow will cover all the grounds. Impression growing that Senate proceedings will be a tedious routine.

Philadelphia, Feb. 25.—The Key Stone State Club, the largest Democratic organization in the State, resolved itself into a Military organization.
